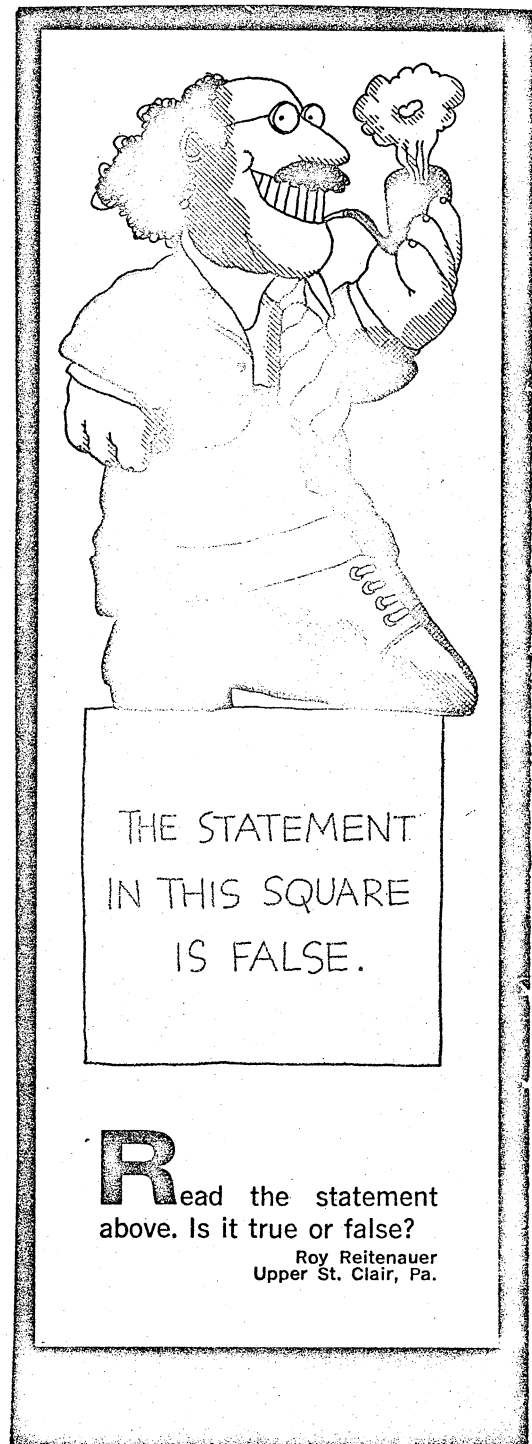

POTATO SALAD

10 to 12 small to medium boiled potatoes
 7 hard-boiled eggs
 2 or 3 medium-sized dill pickles
 3 stalks of celery
 1 medium onion Salt
 1 small mango Butter or Oleo
 Kraft Miracle Whip Vinegar

Cut and mix potatoes, pickles, celery, onion, mango, and egg whites, and salt to taste. Mash egg yolks and a pat of butter (or oleo), add salt, 1 teaspoon of vinegar, and mix with Krafts Miracle Whip, add to potato mixture. Makes a large bowl full.

CARE OF LEATHER SURFACES

Leave your leather table top or desk surface alone as long as you can do so, except for dusting with a soft, clean dust cloth (untreated). If, in time, the leather becomes dull, wax with a good hard wax. NEVER use liquid waxes on leather.

TIP FOR MOMS

Use colorful plastic pails to serve popcorn or potato chips to children. Snacks are easier for children to hold, carry, and pass this way.

FAVORITE QUICK SUPPER

Measure 3 cups flour into large bowl; answer telephone; take bowl off small son's head, sweep up flour. Measure 3 cups flour into large bowl. Measure ¼ cup shortening; answer doorbell; wash shortening from son's hands and face. Add ¼ cup shortening to flour, mix well; rock crying baby for 10 minutes. Answer telephone. Put son in tub and scrub well. Scrape flour and shortening mixture from floor, adding enough tears to relieve tension. Open one can of beans and serve with remaining strength. L. Miller

TIP ON PIE CUTTING - To make a neat job of cutting a pie that is piled high with meringue, first grease the cutting knife with a little butter.

BROWNE BANANAS

About 25 minutes before serving:

Preheat oven to 450°F. In oven, in 8"x8" baking dish, melt 3 tablespoons butter or margarine. Grate peel from 1 large orange and then squeeze juice; stir both into butter. Roll 4 medium bananas in mixture in baking dish; sprinkle with ¼ cup packed brown sugar; bake 15 minutes or until golden brown. Serve hot. Makes 4 servings.

CARE OF FURNITURE

Immediately remove any liquids spilled on surfaces and always use a blotting rather than a wiping action.

Never use nail polish remover on furniture as it will soften the finish.

Lift objects to move them - never drag them across the finished surface.

Avoid exposing wood surfaces to extreme heat, cold, or humidity.

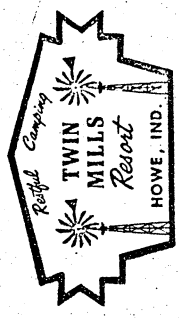
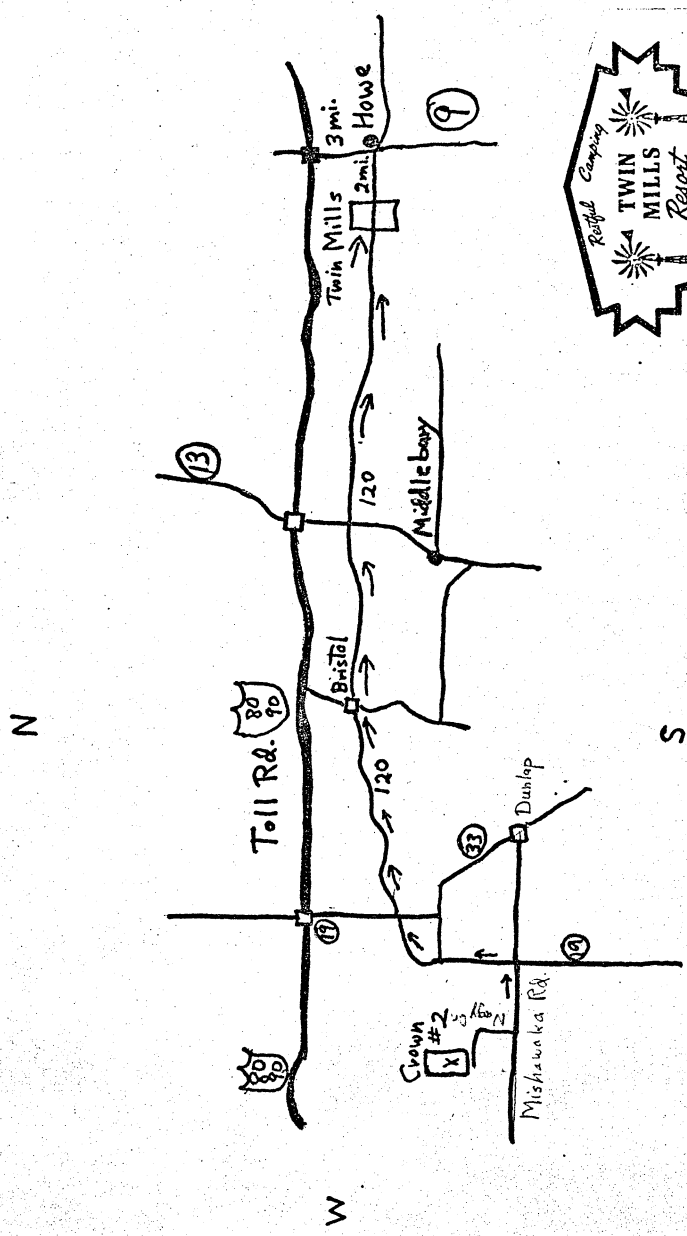
For cleaning and polishing use a soft, lint-free, absorbent cloth from which buttons and seams have been removed. Do NOT use cheese cloth, as this may contain an abrasive starch.

When dusting, waxing, or making minor repairs, always work with the grain of the wood.

DIFFERENT TOPPING

For a perfect hamburger topping, blend ripe olives and soft butter or margarine. Spread on grilled hamburgers.

USE LEFTOVER BEEF - Leftover roast beef may be used in breaded slices. Spread slices with mustard and coat with fine bread crumbs. Fry in hot butter, browning both sides.

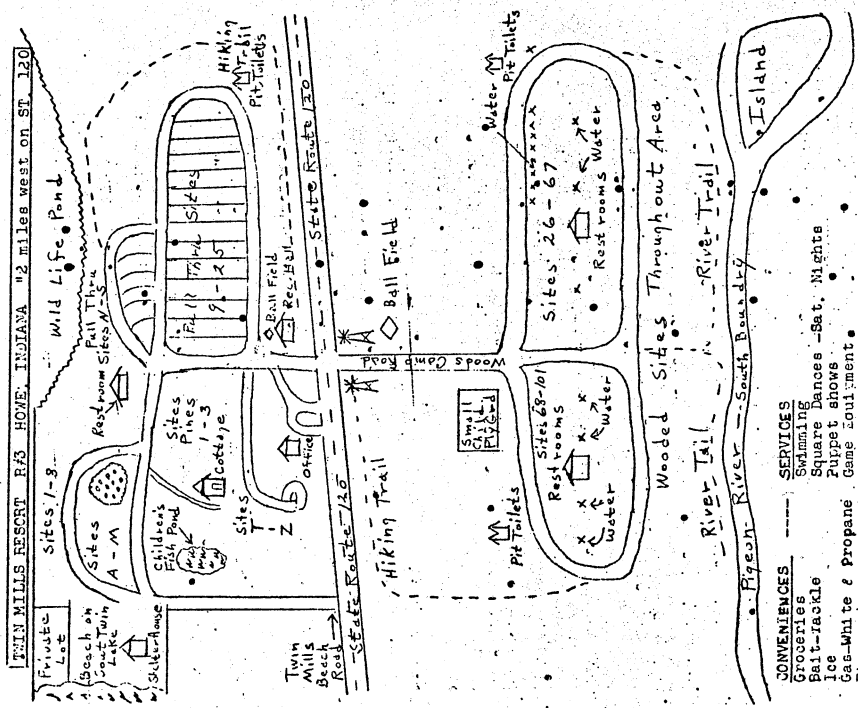

FREE CAMPING

A new fringe benefit for Crown Employees? Yes, It certainly looks like it. Our company president owns some land on Dewart Lake and a good share of it is not being used. If you look at the map on the accompanying page you will see the Dewart Lake layout with the Moore's land on the lakeshore.

As you can see the mobile homes and small buildings are up near the lake (about 100' back from the shore.) Then there is a park or picnic area between the trailers and the pond. On the road side of the pond there is the camping area.

The camping area is wooded with a slight sloping from the road toward the pond. The pond is a good place for children to explore for frogs and tadpoles without being dangerous. Firewood is very abundant throughout the area. It is wooded.

Mr Moore proposes to put in a toilet and a well and if there is enough interest electricity can be run to the site. This is the key to the whole thing, is there enough interest to justify this project.

There is a rowboat which could be used by the campers and a small motor can be put on it. Also as shown on the map there is a ramp where you can put your own boat in the lake.

At the Marina there is a milk and bread type of store and in Milford four miles away Augsburger's Supermarket on highway 15 is a good place to shop.

The camping area is isolated from all surrounding people by fences, swamp area or the road. The privacy you desire camping with your family will be yours. Incidentally, you need have no fear of imposing on the Moore Family because you are also isolated from them.

Dewart Lake is an excellent fishing lake. Mr Moore has been improving the lakefront for swimming also one of the islands has a nice shallow sandy beach. And water-skiing is allowed on this lake.

Just think of it, a picnic, a swim, a little water-skiing, then some late evening fishing capped off by a campfire. Sounds like a great day doesn't it. By the way, since it's hard to water-ski behind a rowboat you'll have to solve that problem yourself.
