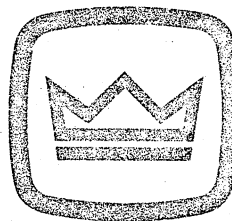

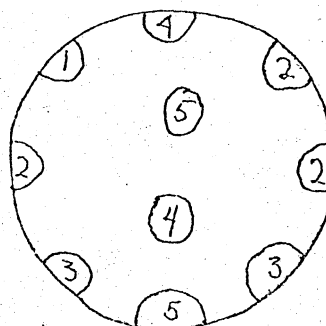

BARBECUE SAUCE FOR RIBS

1½ cups orange marmalade  
1/2 cup Realemon Bottled Lemon Juice  
1/4 cup soy sauce  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 garlic cloves, crushed

Combine all ingredients and bring to a slow boil; simmer for three minutes. Brush on ribs (or chicken) as they bake. Makes two cups.

LILLIES-OF-THE-VALLEY

When should Lillies-of-the-Valley be moved? Dig up clumps to move in early spring just as pips show above ground. Disturb the roots as little as possible and reset at the same depth. To thin a crowded old bed, dig out (bucket-sized) clumps every foot or so and fill holes with rich soil amply fortified with old barnyard manure or dehydrated manure and peat.

TAKE CARE OF YOUR TEETH
