crown industrial products

The Industrial Sales Department was formed by the CROWN management to give CROWN a broader product base and selling base for its high quality products. We manufacture products that are for Hi Fi use as well as Industrial use. You may wonder what an industry would do with a CROWN DC-300A. A typical example would be a large shaker table to run vibration tests on a piece of equipment, a very high class battery charger used for research of electrodes to determine which electrodes would give the best long life characteristics. These are just a few examples of what an industrial sale means to CROWN.

How does CROWN go about reaching industrial people in manufacturing facilities across the country with the product information necessary for them to be able to buy CROWN? We have established the Industrial Selling Division which has a representative network that is very similar to the Hi Fi representatives only it is comprised of men whose sole function is to call on industry and sell them CROWN products.

The Hi Fi division, with Jim and Ken in charge, sells through manufacturers representatives, but those representatives in turn sell to retail Hi Fi dealers who in turn sell to the general public. This is the difference between the Industrial Sales Division and the Hi Fi Sales Division.

In the Industrial Sales Division, there is more work required by CROWN in communicating directly with the end user and the manufacturer, trying to serve his needs with our products. Quite often there is engineering consultation that is required also more product information than in the Hi Fi Division. CROWN has engaged an advertising agency, Welsh-Bencsics, to put together a catalog system for the Industrial user. The agency is also responsible for developing a mailing list to mail catalogs and product information to Industrial buyers.

Some of the products that the Industrial Division sells that we presently manufacture are; the Dyanlec tape transports, the Scott Engineering tape transports, and the Art Vetter tape transports. These manufacturers in turn include our tape decks in their standard systems. For instance, Dyanlec builds a military troupe entertainment system that is installed in submarines and ships to provide background music for the enlisted personnel's enjoyment. The A. R. Vetter decks are used in an FM recorder system that Art Vetter builds and markets to hospitals and the instrumentation field. An FM analog tape recorder has the ability to record DC signals, as well as AC signals. Beltone Electronics buys our D-60 amplifier in large quantities for use in an audiometer which is a device that tests hearing in speech and hearing classes. The Beltone account is a direct result of our participation in the National Speech and Hearing Show in San Francisco last year.

What is the sales outlook for this fall in the Industrial Sales Division? Because we are signing up new representatives and creating new catalog materials, the sales perspective is not as great as it will be after the division is operating for several years. So production can rest assured that the Industrial Sales Department has not begun the burial proceedings as yet. Give us a year or so.

The overall goal of the Industrial Sales Division with respect to CROWN is to help the Company level production so that the influences in the Hi Fi market during the Christmas buying season can be leveled and we can have a firmer base of products upon which to establish our Company.

From time to time, various people have asked me what a "Systems Analyst" actually is. PHILOSOPHY: Sketch the development of human thought, estimate its significance. Compare with the development of any other kind of thought.

The answer is that the young man on his third choice of a door has a probability of 9/10 that he will choose the lady. The pair of doors concealing two tigers is eliminated by his first choice of a lady, which leaves 10 equally probable possibilities for the entire series of three choices.

If the doors conceal two ladies:

Lady 1 — Lady 1 — Lady 1

Lady 1 — Lady 1 — Lady 2

Lady 1 — Lady 2 — Lady 1

Lady 1 — Lady 2 — Lady 2

Lady 2 — Lady 1 — Lady 1

Lady 2 — Lady 1 — Lady 2

Lady 2 — Lady 2 — Lady 1

Lady 2 — Lady 2 — Lady 2

If the doors conceal a lady and a tiger:

Lady 3 — Lady 3 — Lady 3

Lady 3 — Lady 3 — Tiger

Of the 10 possibilities in the problem's "sample space," only one ends with a fatal final choice. The probability of the man's survival is therefore 9/10.

This cryptogram represents a subtraction. Since the answer does not contain a digit at the extreme left, then D must equal 1. Now, if D = 1, E must equal 1 or 0, for $10 + E - 1 = N$; that is, $9 + E = N$, and N cannot be greater than 9, for it is a digit. But E cannot equal 1, for D = 1; hence, E = 0. It immediately follows, since $9 + E = N$, that N = 9. Thus, so far, we have result (1).

Now, to subtract T from 0, we must borrow one unit of a hundred from F; thus, $F - 1 = U + O$. Since we have already used 0, 1, and 9, and U and O are integers, then F may be 8, 7, or 6. If F = 8, then $U + O = 7$ and $U + O = 5 + 2$; if F = 7, then $U + O = 6$ and $U + O = 4 + 2$; if F = 6, then $U + O = 5$ and $U + O = 3 + 2$.

Assuming that F = 8, then let U = 5 and O = 2. We then have result (2).

From the ten's column, $10 - T = G$, or $10 = T + G$. Since we have already used 0, 1, 2, 5, 8, and 9, the possible combinations are $6 + 4$ and $7 + 3$. It may be easily shown that the combination $6 + 4$ is impossible; thus, let T = 7 and G = 3. We then have result (3).

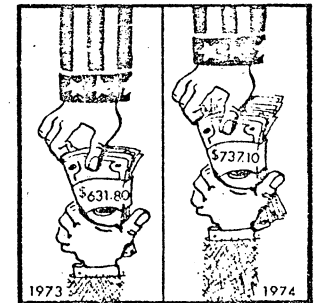
"I am extremely pleased to approve this measure. It should be good news for millions of our citizens," said President Nixon as he signed into law H.R. 7445, a bill extending the Renegotiation Act of 1951 for one year.

But the President wasn't talking about renegotiation. He was describing a little rider that had been piggy-backed onto the bill to pay out some \$3.2 billion more in Social Security benefits next year to some 30 million people.

It may be good news for the beneficiaries, but not for the employers and employees who will have to pay the increased taxes.

This year's maximum Social Security tax is \$631.80 on an employee earning \$10,800, plus a matching contribution by his employer. Next year it jumps to \$737.10 or a combined \$1474.20 on every \$12,600 job.

Let's see now. There was a



10% increase in Social Security benefits in 1967, 15% in 1969, 10% in 1971, 20% in election year 1972, plus this new 5.6% increase. Then automatic cost-of-living increases begin in 1975.

If Congress doesn't quit this overexpansion of Social Security, a lot of people are going to figure it's cheaper to retire than work.

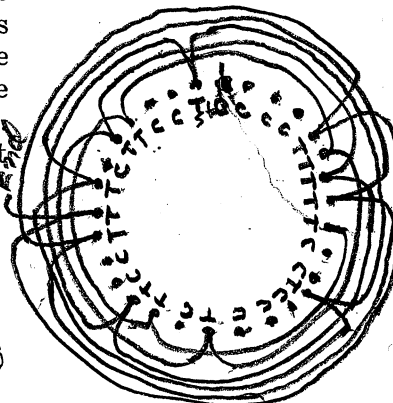
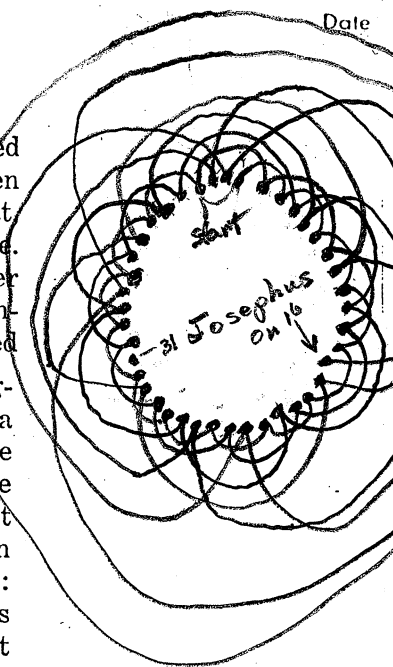
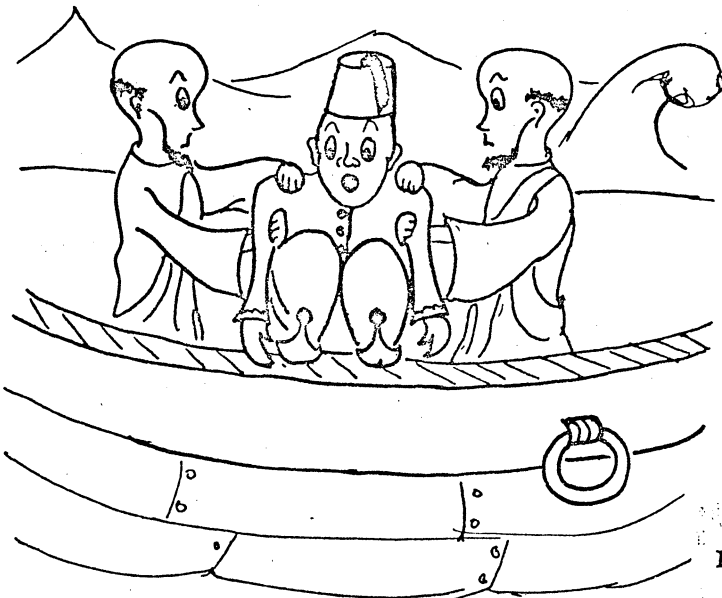

It seems that there is in nature many cycles of life. Life spans are measured in cycles and the evolvement of life itself within this cycle contains a cycle.

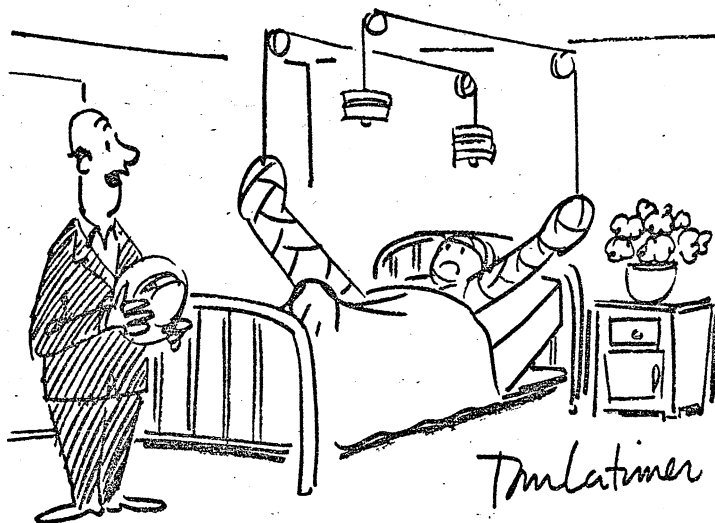
