

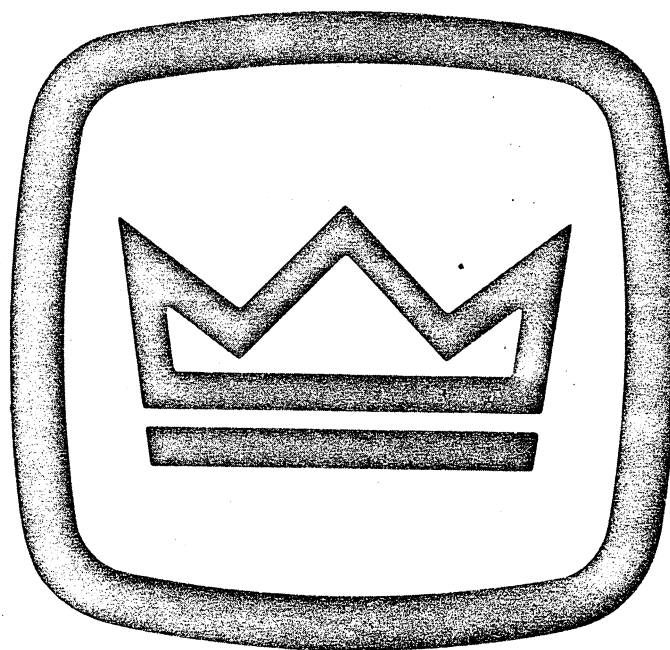

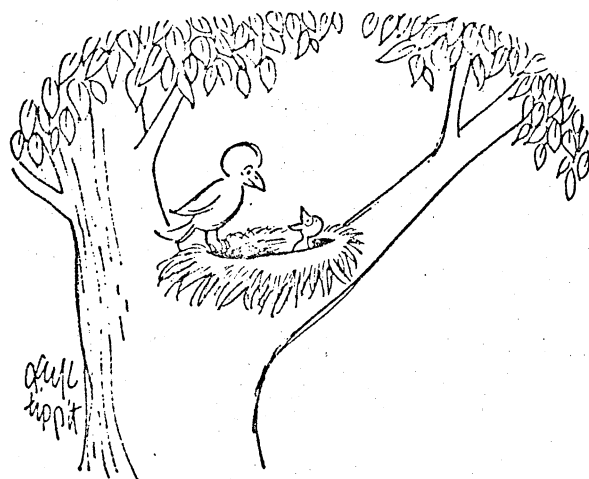
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MY! HOW WE'VE GROWN!

CROWN has recently acquired another piece of property, "Plant 2." Increased sales (and production) in the past year have pressed Plant 1 to the walls.

With the relief of the old Plant 1 machine shop, Engineering has accumulated a drafting room and Production Engineering received office space. Purchasing and the Library have moved across the hall to what used to be the Engineering workshop.

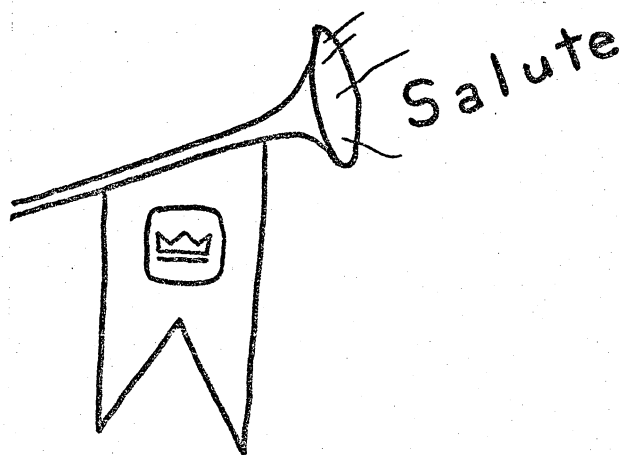
Plant 2 now provides Plant 1 with more stock area. This suitable exile for the machine shop personnel has provided them with twice the floor space possible in Plant 1. 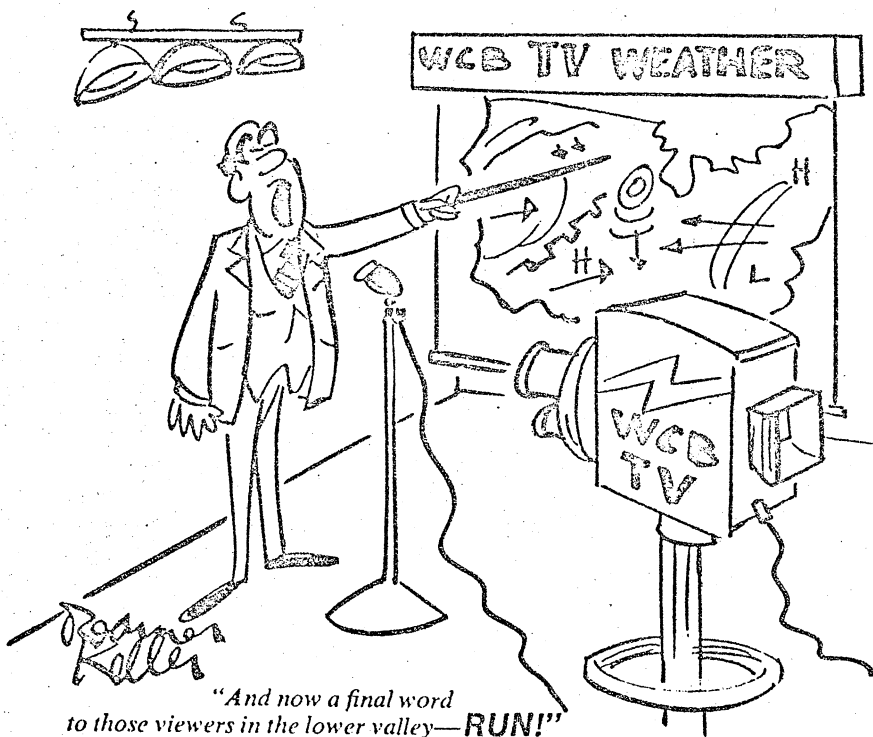

The bicycle will move backward.

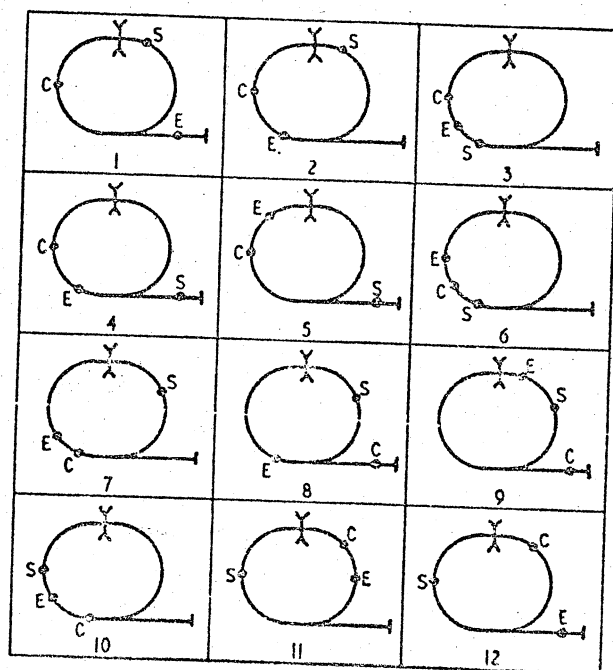
This can be deduced by viewing the point of the strings attachment move vs movement of the bicycle. The point's movement always coincides with the bicycles direction.

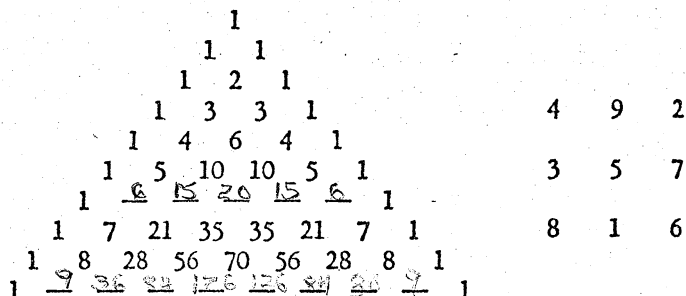
Remember that physics deals with rules of causality and as such is only expressable in a local sense. Physics is only simple when viewed locally.

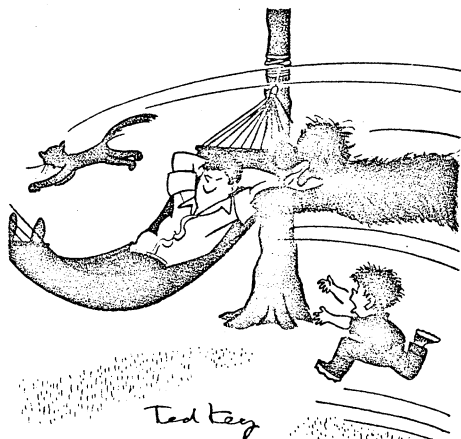
A second "newcomer" to the department

HANDLE COMPRESSED AIR WITH CARE

Handling an air hose filled with compressed air could be like handling a loaded rifle. Both are special tools that will do the job. And both could cause serious injury if used improperly.

Although accidents due to compressed air are uncommon, they are apt to be serious when they do occur. For example, it is the practice of many workers to dust themselves off with compressed air after the day's work. The compressed air hose is readily available and it does a good job of cleaning. Unfortunately, the hazards connected with this outweigh any possible advantages.

There is danger of the air entering the body through several normal openings. This could cause a rupture of the lungs, the stomach, or the intestines. This is a high price to pay for the cleaning of your clothes, especially when your clothes can be cleaned by a safer method.

When compressed air is used to clean parts held in the hand, there is danger that particles can be driven into the skin or through the air at another person.

In addition, the compressed air may contain large amounts of impurities. If this air enters the body, the foreign matter could result in infection and illness.

To avoid possible injury or illness, observe the following suggestions:

- Never point the compressed air hose at anyone.
- Do not repair air tools or change from one tool to another without shutting off the compressed air supply.
- Do not use compressed air for sweeping the floor and cleaning off the work bench or the material where you are working. If it is necessary to use compressed air to clean your work, always wear suitable eye protection and follow normal safety practices.

Using compressed air improperly is like placing a loaded rifle in the hands of a three-year-old child. The results are almost predictable. Handle compressed air as you would a loaded gun.

SUBJECT: Investment opportunity

I don't know if you would be interested in this but I thought I would mention it to you because it could be a real 'sleeper' in making a lot of money with very little investment.

Al Klinger and I are considering investing in a large cat ranch near Guadalajara, Mexico. It is our purpose to start rather small, with about one million cats. Each cat averages about twelve kittens per year; skins can be sold for about 20¢ for the white ones and up to 40¢ for the black. This will give us 12 million cat skins per year to sell at the average price of around 32¢, making our revenue about \$3 million a year. This really averages out to \$10 thousand a day--excluding Sundays and holidays.

A good Mexican cat man can skin about 50 cats per day at a wage of \$3.15 a day. It will only take 666 men to operate the ranch so the net profit would be over \$6,200 per day.

Now, the cats would be fed on rats exclusively. Rats multiply four times as fast as cats. We would start a rat ranch right adjacent to our cat farm. If we start with a million rats, we will have four rats per cat each day. The rats will be fed on the carcasses of the cats we skin...this will give each rat one quarter of a cat. You can see by this that the business is a clean operation---self-supporting and really automatic throughout. The cats will eat the rats and the rats will eat the cats and we will get the skins.

Let me know if you are interested; as you can imagine, we are rather particular who we want to get into this, and want the fewest investors possible.

Eventually, it is our hope to cross the cats with snakes, for they will skin themselves twice a year! This would save the labor costs of skinning, as well as give us two skins for one cat.

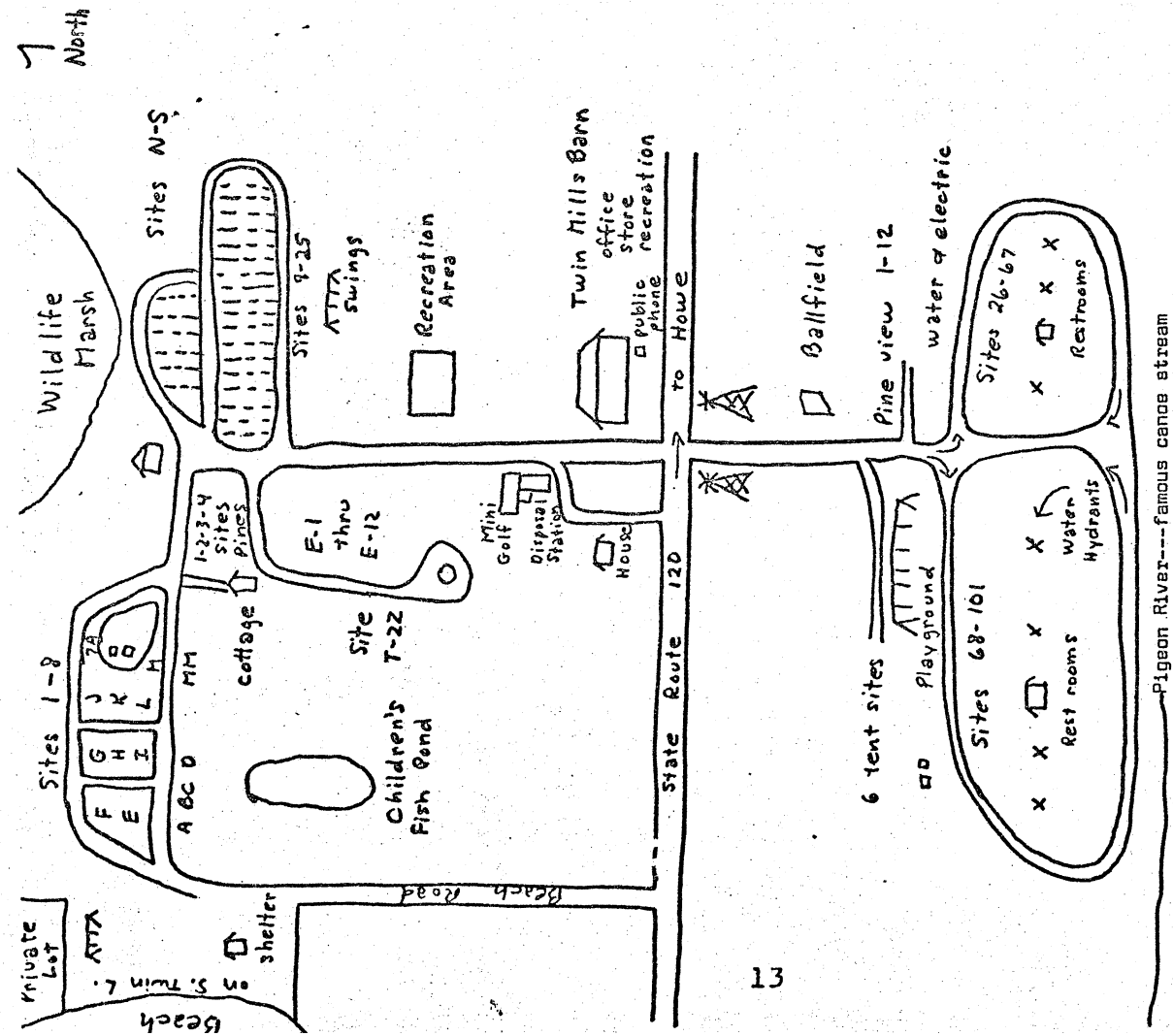

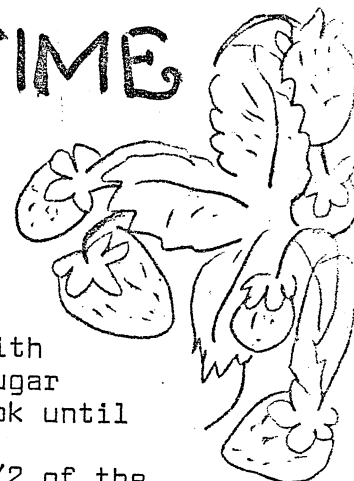
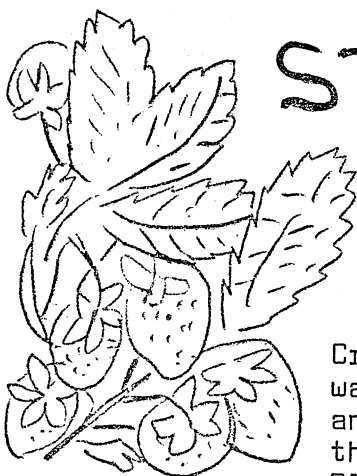

STRAWBERRYTIME



VERY GOOD STRAWBERRY GLAZE PIE

4 cups fresh strawberries
1 cup water 3/4 cup sugar
3 T. cornstarch red food coloring
1 baked 8" pie shell

Crush 1 cup of smaller berries and cook with water; about 2 minutes, sieve. Combine sugar and cornstarch; stir into berry juice; cook until thick and clear; add coloring; Place 1/2 of berries in pie shell, pour 1/2 of the sauce over berries, repeat with remaining berries and sauce. Chill, serve with Whipping Cream.

STRAWBERRIES MANHATTAN

Wash, but leave hulls and stems on:

Large strawberries

Heap into serving bowl. Chill.

At serving time, place on the table in separate bowls:

The chilled berries:

Sour cream

Brown sugar

Let guests spoon berries, sugar and cream onto their plates—and dip away.

Although fresh strawberries have become available throughout most of the year, we specially think of them along with warming days, outdoors, and happy times. They remind us of our childhood . . . the best part. And whether we have memories of eating them fresh from the field, dipped quickly in powdered sugar, or heaped with whipped cream in a shortcake, they're indeed a cherished fruit.

NO-COOK STRAWBERRY MOUSSE

Combine:

1 cup strawberries, crushed

1 cup sugar

Stir until sugar is dissolved. Into this, fold:

1 cup heavy cream, whipped

Then fold in:

2 egg whites, stiffly beaten

pinch of salt

Pour into refrigerator tray and freeze until firm.

Makes about 1 qt.

STRAWBERRIES IN ALMOND YOGURT

In a medium bowl, mix:

1 8 oz. container plain yogurt

1/4 cup sugar

2 tsp. vanilla extract

1 or 2 tsp. almond extract

Fold in:

2 pts. strawberries

Chill well. Serves 4-6.
