HAM RADIO REPORT by Don Florea

In this article, I would like to show you how you can become involved in Amateur Radio. Within the next few weeks, we again will be offering a novice code class for the beginner. This class will be offered during the first half of the noon hour, probably from 12:10 to 12:30.

I suppose the biggest question is, "How do you learn code?" or "Isn't it hard?". Code, like any other skill, takes concentration and determination. After all, look how long it takes a person to learn to type. The person must first be able to locate the correct key for each letter; from then on it is just a matter of practice. The same applies to code. You must first learn how to make each letter from the sounds you hear and then practice until your mind unconsciously does the work for you.

To help prepare yourself for code class, I could suggest the following hints: First, break the alphabet down into groups, such as A-E, F-J, K-O, P-T, U-Z. Then work on memorizing a group of letters a day until the whole alphabet is learned. Then once you have the letters in your mind, try to spell words or code the words you use. In this way, the only transference to be done in code class will be to break the sounds into letters.

Below is the alphabet in Morse Code. Sound each (-) as a dah and each (.) as a dit. In this way, you can make each letter sound as it does when it is sent over the air.

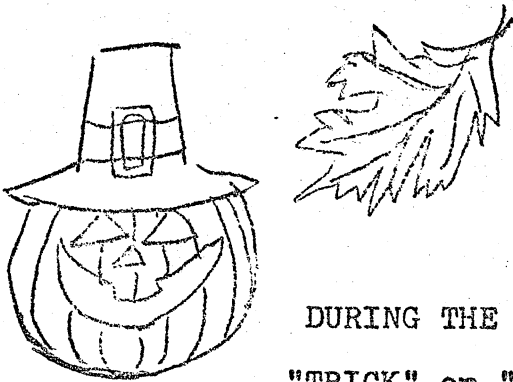

1. The cost of insuring contact lenses against loss or damage is a tax deductible expense.
2. The cost of divorce is not a tax deductible medical expense even though the divorce was prescribed by a doctor for health reasons. (Sorry-Men)
3. By transferring all rights of ownership in life insurance policies to the spouse, the insurance proceeds will not be taxable in the deceased husband's estate.
4. The first \$100 of dividends received during a year is not taxable.
5. The U.S. Government is sponsoring, through FHA lenders, such as banks or finance companies, an energy conservation program which is designed to promote home fuel efficiency by offering home improvement loans at decreased interest rates. However, all financial institutions in our area have declined to participate and are charging from 14% to 16% interest on home improvement loans.
6. If both husband and wife are working, the cost of child care is tax deductible up to \$200.00 a month. That's the ceiling for out-of-home expenses for one child. (The ceiling is \$300 for two children; \$400 for three or more.) This deduction is not allowed for amounts paid to individuals who are related to the taxpayer or spouse. Also This deduction is available only if a joint tax return is filed. If the combined adjusted gross income exceeds \$18,000, the deduction drops \$1 for every \$2 you have over \$18,000. (Note-A bill is pending to raise this figure to \$30,000.)

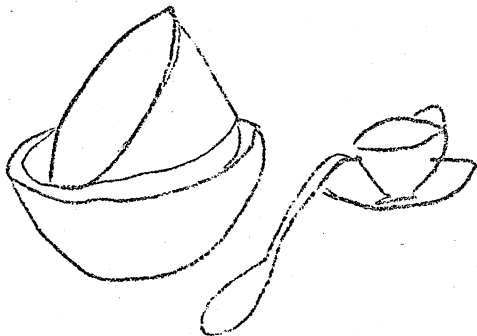

One final tip: serve your coffee with cream that has been brought to room temperature. This cools the coffee as little as possible—and wins heart-warming praise from your guests!

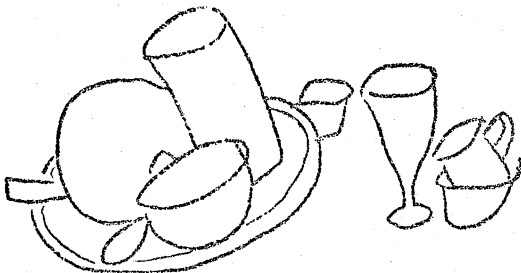

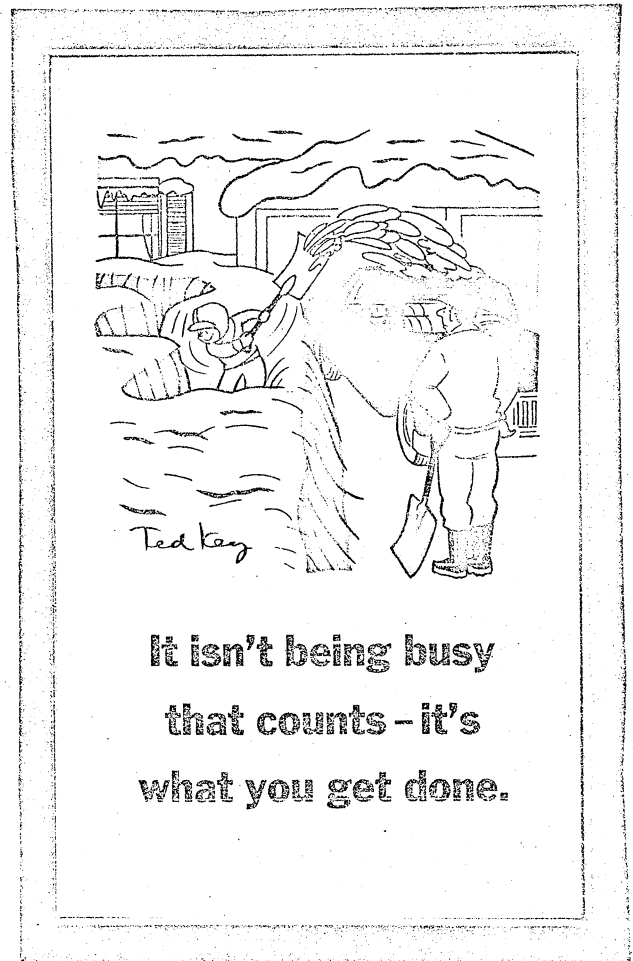
Of course, not everything that hap-

Answers to Issue 28's Problems

Suppose there are n letters, and consider an unterminating random series of the letters; the chance that any particular letter will be a specified letter is $1/n$. The question is, what is the average length of the run in such a series for every letter to appear at least once?

In such a series the expected run required to reach one of $P(Sn)$ specified letters is n/P , say $1/p$.

For the chance that the first is one of the P is p . The chance that the second is one of the P but the first is not, is $(1-p)p$. The chance that the third is one of the P but the first two are not is $(1-p)^2p$ and so on. Thus the average length of run is:

$$p+2(1-p)p+3(1-p)^2p+\dots$$

$$=p[1+2(1-p)+3(1-p)^2+\dots]$$

$$=\frac{p}{[1-(1-p)]^2}=\frac{1}{p}, \text{ as stated.}$$

Hence, if at any stage there are P letters left to be obtained the average length of the run required to get one of them is n/P . Moreover, the runs are independent. Hence the length of run required to get all the letters is

$$\frac{n}{n} + \frac{n}{n-1} + \frac{n}{n-2} + \dots + \frac{n}{1}$$

$$=n(1 + \frac{1}{2} + \frac{1}{3} + \dots + \frac{1}{n})$$

By adding the reciprocals we find that, for $n=19$, run $=67.4$; for $n=20$, run $=71.95$ (corresponding to age 70.95).

Hence there are 20 letters.

Birthday Party

Let x be the number of people.

The number of ways they can have birthdays is 365^x .

The number of ways they can have different birthdays is $365 \times 364 \dots (365-x+1)$.

Thus the chance that a number of birthdays are alike is

$$\frac{365 \times 364 \dots (365-x+1)}{365^x}$$

$$=1(1-\frac{1}{365})(1-\frac{2}{365})\dots(1-\frac{x-1}{365})\dots 1$$

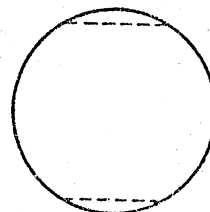
and this is to be less than $\frac{1}{2}$.

We may either work through this question until we arrive at a figure that is less than a half, or we may use an approximate method.

Since x is relatively small compared with 365.

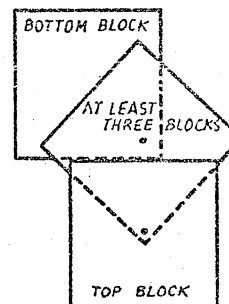

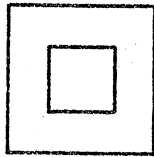
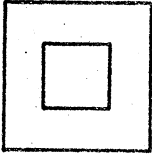
This problem may be solved with a minimum of five bricks (or cubes) thus:—

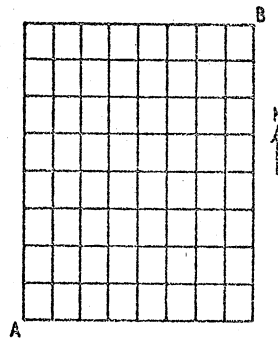
Which is the longest word you can give in which all consonants are in alphabetical order?

Halloween: Where Did it Come From?

According to Collier's Encyclopedia, the "popular secular observance of Halloween, falling on the night of October 31, is derived from the rites of the Druids celebrating the day of Saman, when the Lord of Death called together the souls of the wicked who had died during the past year. The theme of the harvest, which runs through modern Halloween celebrations comes from both the old druidic celebrations and the old Roman festivals in honor of Pomona, goddess of fruit, which were brought to Britain during the Roman occupation."

In Celtic and Anglo-Saxon tradition, October 31 was the eve of the new year and significant in several areas. The fire festivals associated with the return of the herds from pasture occurred at this time. They attempted to placate supernatural powers to gain protection for the herds from the demonic influences of the corn spirit. It was also important as the time to renew laws, land tenures, and rekindle fire for the year. It was further considered the most favorable time of year for divinations both for communication with dead souls returning to homes and also those concerning marriage, luck, health, death, etc. Many of the games played to ascertain spouses and facts concerning them are the forerunners of the games played with apples in our modern Halloween festivities. Traces of sacrificial rites for the sake of atonement have been found in Scotland. Since October 31 marks the beginning of the barren half of the year, goblins, ghosts, witches and other evils quickly became associated with Halloween by these pre-Christian era peoples.

Most of the activities carried on today, including pranks and all sorts of mischievousness, trick 'n' treat, etc., came to us from Ireland. For example, legend tells us that a certain fellow named Jack could not enter heaven because of his extreme miserliness nor could he enter hell because of the practical jokes he had played on the devil. Therefore he was forced to walk the earth carrying his lantern until the judgment day--thus the "jack-o-lantern." The druids contributed the concept of black cats we associate with Halloween--they believed that cats were once people who had been changed as punishment for their evil deeds.

Although many tricks are still played today, Halloween is primarily a time when small children have fun dressing up as imaginary characters and going from house to house begging for treats and "threatening" a

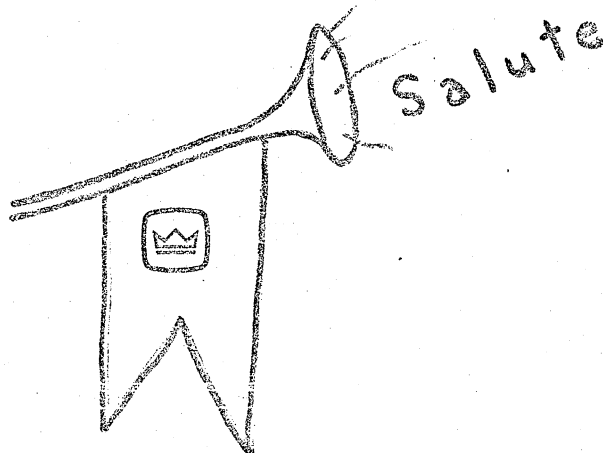
