




Now cut along the dotted lines to form a wedge-shaped piece. This is the required shape.




B₄/S

1. Put information about numbers of days in months in a more convenient form:

Cucumber 19

Strawberry 19

Tiddleywinks 17

Jinks 17

Pinafore 10

Collywobble $\begin{cases} 13 & (\text{even years}) \\ 44 & (\text{odd years}) \end{cases}$

Stephen $\begin{cases} 4 & (\text{if year's date does not end in 7}) \\ 6 & (\text{if year's date ends in 7}) \end{cases}$

Consider first piece of information.

From Funday, Strawberry 17th to Blissday, Tiddleywinks 8th is just over 7 weeks, \therefore Funday, Strawberry 17th to Funday, Tiddleywinks 6th is exactly 7 weeks (35 days). Of these days $8(2+6)$ are in Strawberry and Tiddleywinks, leaving 27 for other months. The only possibility in this year is Jinks (17) and Pinafore (10).

\therefore we have (i) Strawberry

(Jinks)

(Pinafore)

Tiddleywinks

These are consecutive months, but we don't yet know whether Jinks or Pinafore comes first.

Consider other information. There are 50 days from Collywobble 41st to Pinafore 7th. 10 of these days (3+7) are in Collywobble and Pinafore, leaving 40 for intervening months. Stephen only has 4 days this year, and the only combination of months that can produce 40 is Strawberry or Cucumber (19), Jinks or Tiddleywinks (17), and Stephen (4).

\therefore we have: (ii) Collywobble

Strawberry or Cucumber

(Jinks or Tiddleywinks)

Stephen

Pinafore

We do not yet know the order of the intervening months.

From (i) we know that Jinks comes before Tiddleywinks and from (ii) we know that Jinks comes before Pinafore. From (ii) we see that Collywobble and Stephen must, in that order, come before the four mentioned in (i). Since we know that Collywobble is the first month of the year, the remaining month, Cucumber, must be last.

Order is: Collywobble

Stephen

Strawberry

Jinks

Pinafore

Tiddleywinks

Cucumber

2. Collywobble 2nd comes before Strawberry 13th. Since it is the year 21 there are 44 days in Collywobble and 4 in Stephen. \therefore number of days is $42 + 4 + 13 = 59$ — i.e. 11 weeks and 4 days. 4 days before Workday is Joyday.


GRAVE PLIGHT



TAX TIPS from Ross

- A. Car Rebates - If a customer buys a new car and later receives a cash rebate from the manufacturer or the dealer, the cash rebate will not be considered as income. Instead it will be treated as a reduction of the purchase price which will reduce the buyer's basis in the car.
- B. Early withdrawal from time deposit savings accounts - Premature withdrawal of a time deposit results in the forfeiture of some interest as a penalty. This forfeiture is deductible on a 1040 tax return whether or not you itemize your deductions. The deduction is taken in the space next to "Adjustment to Income" (between lines 38 and 39) on page 2 of Form 1040. There you write in "forfeited interest penalty" and enter the amount.
- C. Retirement Fund - The new Pension Reform Law has introduced a brand new Individual Retirement Account (I.R.A.)--an innovative way to put away some of your income, get a current deduction for it, and let it build to retirement tax free. Anyone not covered by an employer plan is eligible to set up an I.R.A. by contributing 15% of his compensation up to \$1500 each year. The full amount contributed can be deducted off the top whether you itemize or take the standard deduction. The income earned from the I.R.A. is completely tax free until its paid out.

Each married person's earned income is treated separately so each may set up his or her own plan.

Most banks and other financial institutions, insurance companies and the like are available to set an I.R.A. up.



1/3 cup quartered maraschino cherries
1 cup heavy cream, whipped

Soften cream cheese; blend in pineapple. Add marshmallows and cherries. Fold in cream. Pile into 10x6x1½ inch dish or refrigerator tray. Freeze firm. Cut in squares; top with whipped cream. Make 6 servings.

A special thanks to our dear Carol Wiebe--for just being Carol and doing a great job on the front lines!


