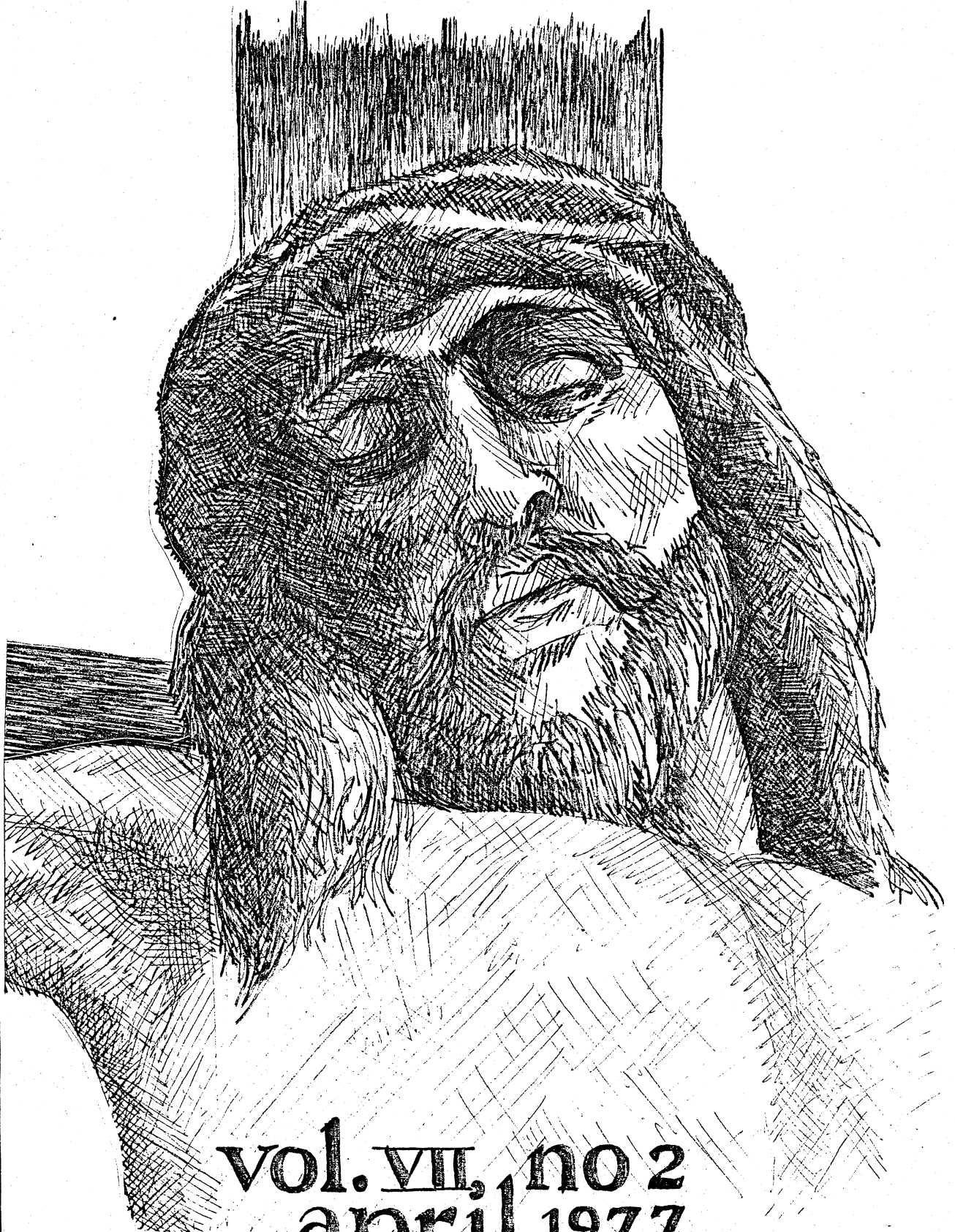

## Editorial

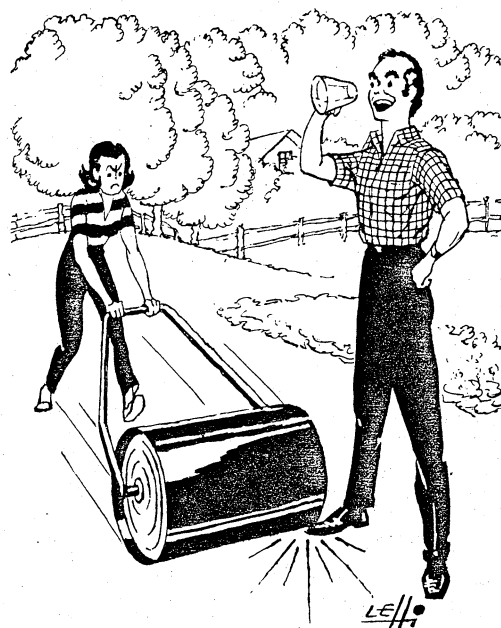

Cooperation is doing with a smile what you have to do anyway.

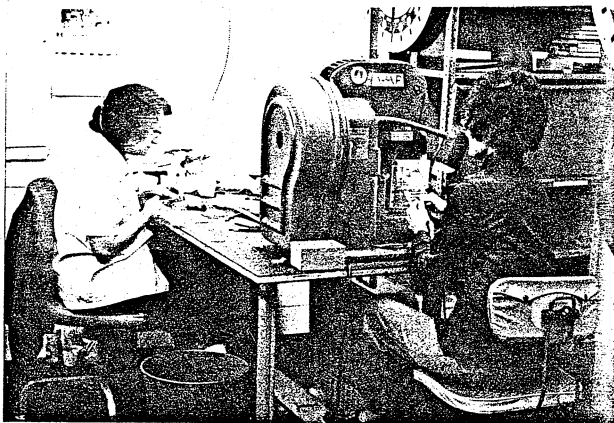

The incoming inspection department started at plant 2 right after our fire. John Bachman took an assortment of jobs that no one else wanted.

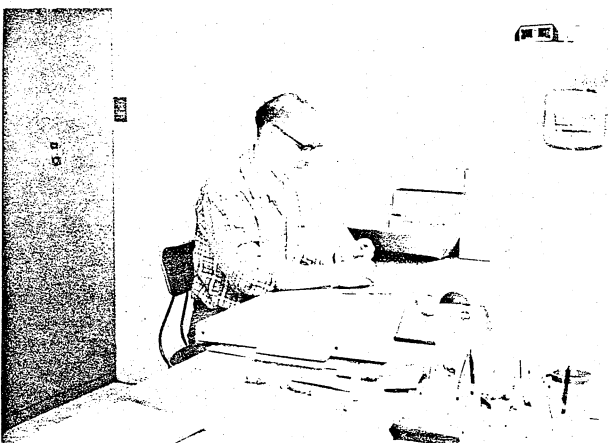

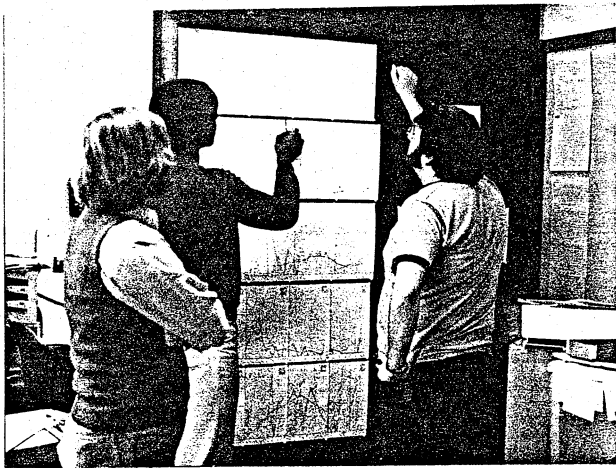
We also take care of line scrap and try to keep the scrap parts store in reasonable order.

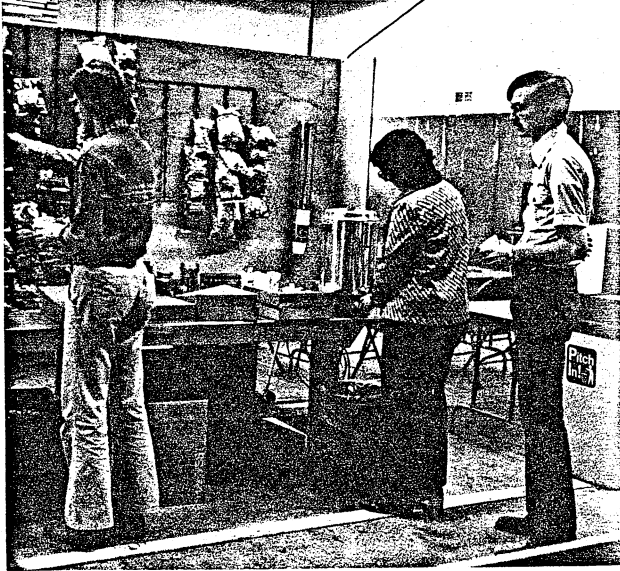
### GET MARRIED, LIVE LONGER

Singles are therefore advised to consider marriage or at least stop reading statistics.

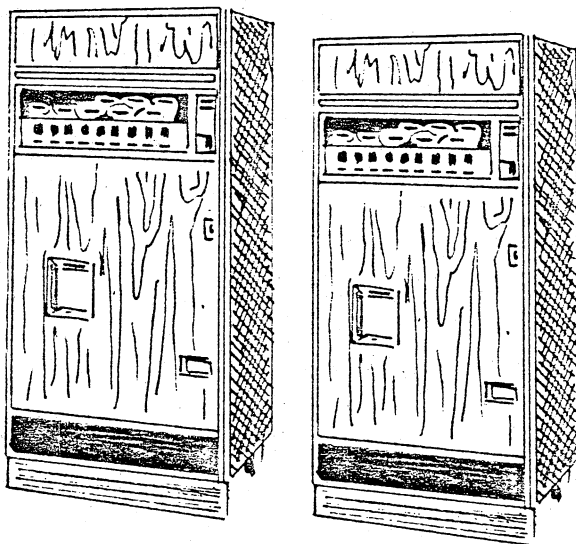

1. Mark in, as shown, the facts that Mr Baker is not the baker and does not wear a brown shirt, etc.
2. Mark in also, as shown, the facts given that Mr Hunter is not the walker, that the hunter did not wear a brown shirt, and that Mr Carpenter was the baker. (Note that from this last, positive, information we can deduce, as shown, that Mr Carpenter is not the hunter or the walker, and that the baker is not Mr Hunter, or Mr Walker.)  
(These facts are marked in. The reader is advised to mark in other facts as they are discovered.)
3. By elimination Mr Baker was the walker.  $\therefore$  by elimination Mr Walker was the hunter.  $\therefore$  by elimination Mr Hunter was the carpenter.
4. Since the walker was Mr Baker, who did not wear a brown shirt,  $\therefore$  the walker did not wear a brown shirt. Similarly Mr Baker did not wear a white shirt. By elimination the carpenter wore a brown shirt.  $\therefore$  Mr Hunter (who is the carpenter) wore a brown shirt.
