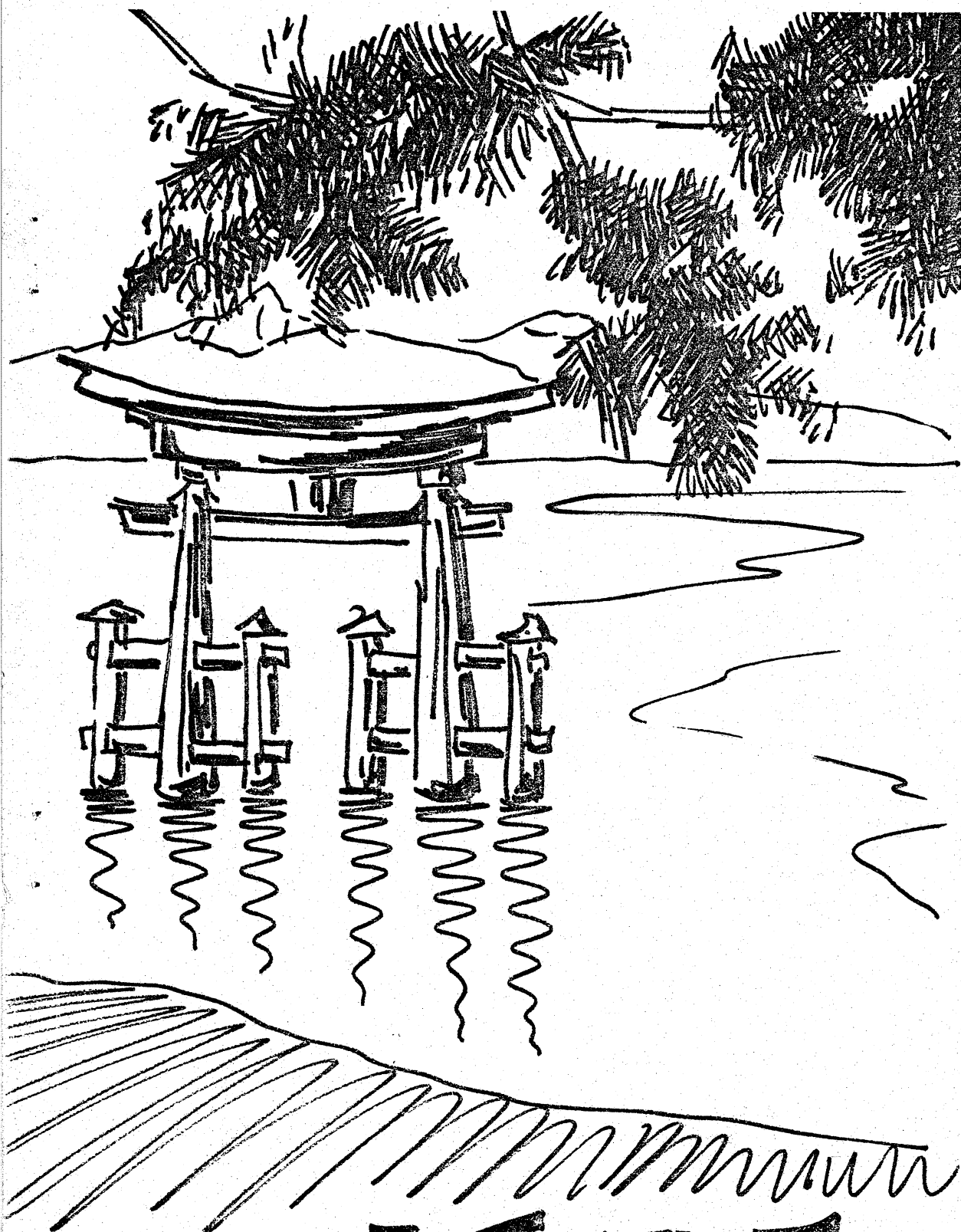


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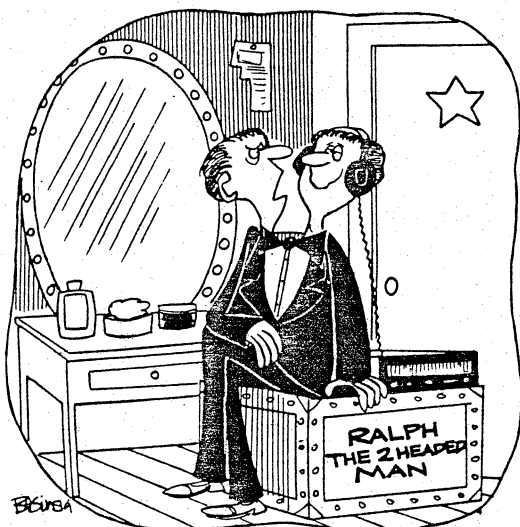

## GUEST EDITORIAL



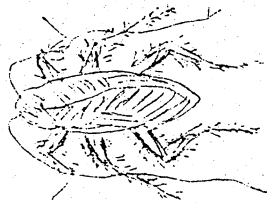
Recently on the International news scene, an event occurred of extreme significance. The setting in motion of the machinery to bring about an effective peace in the heart of the Mideast has meaning to us from several perspectives.

One area of consideration is simply the day to day lifestyle of living under the situation of war, or the threat of war. Never knowing when the call may come to go to war -- leaving family, community, job and safety behind. # Creative Potpourri



## COOKIES CHECK OUT

Play to win, and eat all the checkers as the victor. Here's how to play . . . Make a 20 inch square checkerboard with Con-Tact vinyl, and use Nabisco vanilla sandwich cookies and chocolate Oreos as the playing pieces. Want to make your own cookies? Well, no problem -- we've got the perfect recipe, as well as all the checkerboard how-tos, right here for you. It's an easy project that's fun to give to friends of all ages. If you're really running out of time, you can use buttons for the checker pieces.

### CHOCOLATE AND VANILLA CHECKERS

working time: 10 minutes  
chilling time: 2 hours or more  
baking time: 40 minutes

---

1 c butter or margarine  
2/3 c sugar  
1 t vanilla extract  
2 c sifted all-purpose flour  
3 T cocoa

In large mixing bowl, cream butter until smooth. Gradually add sugar and vanilla, mixing until light and fluffy. Add flour to form dough, beating well. Divide in half. Blend cocoa into one half of dough. Chill dough for easier handling. Sprinkle a sheet of waxed paper lightly with flour. Shake off excess. Shape dough into rolls 1 1/2 inches in diameter

and chill at least two hours. Cut into 1/8 inch slices. Place on lightly greased cookie sheets. Preheat oven, 400 degrees. Bake for 5 to 8 minutes, until edges are delicately browned. Cool on wire rack. Makes 60 cookies (50 calories each).

### TO MAKE THE CHECKERBOARD

Size: Finished size is 20 inches square.

#### MATERIALS:

\*20" x 20" piece of foam-core board  
\*18" wide Con-Tact self adhesive vinyl;  
1/2 yd. matte black, 5/8 yd. matte red,  
1/4 yd. shiny white  
\*8 Oreo chocolate and 8 vanilla creme sandwich cookies by Nabisco

#### PROCEDURE:

Center an 18"-square piece of black Con-Tact vinyl on the top side of the foam-core board. Apply. Cut four strips of red Con-Tact vinyl 20" long by 3" wide. Apply to edges of black Con-Tact, forming a 1" border. Miter red Con-Tact at corners, folding extra width to back of board. Cut 16 2 1/4" x 2 1/4" squares of white Con-Tact vinyl. Beginning at one corner, lightly mark off 2 1/4" squares over entire black surface. Apply white squares to alternate boxes, forming playing surface. There should be four white and four black squares in every row.

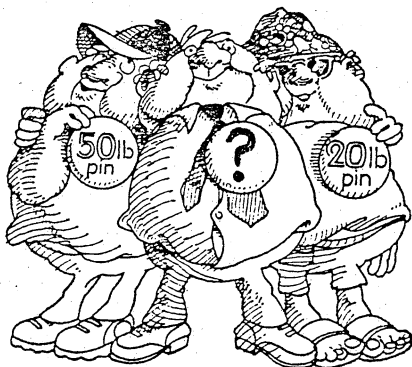

Mr. Tom Branch

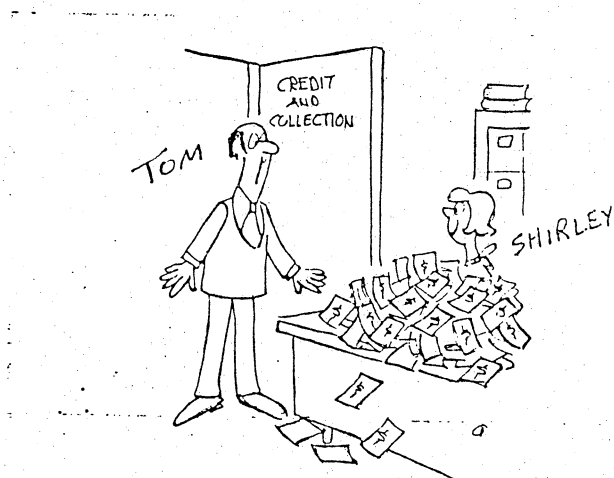
As Credit Manager, Tom oversees department operation, sets up new accounts, and makes decisions on policy and "exceptions".

Thanks for caring, Karen, we're glad you're here, too.

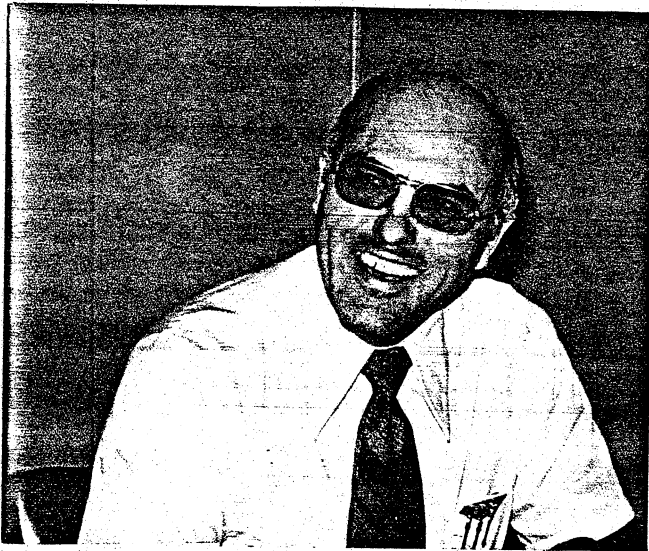

# Morsels from the King's Table



## OLD IS BETTER

It has often been said that "experience is the best teacher". Also, the expression of a person during a physical beating may cry out to his assailer, "Beat me harder, it will feel so good when you stop".

During a recent field trip, we visited one of CROWN's very fine dealers and held an "amplifier clinic" where owners of power amplifiers bring in their equipment and have it checked for performance. At the clinic there were what seemed to us an unusual number of valve (vacuum tube) type of amps. The commercially manufactured models in their day were the best, well designed amps that not only performed outstandingly well but were attractive too. The manufacturers of this very fine equipment have long since relinquished that technology for the newer solid state with all of its advantages. "Jim designed the amp," pointing to the tall, short haired middle-aged man.

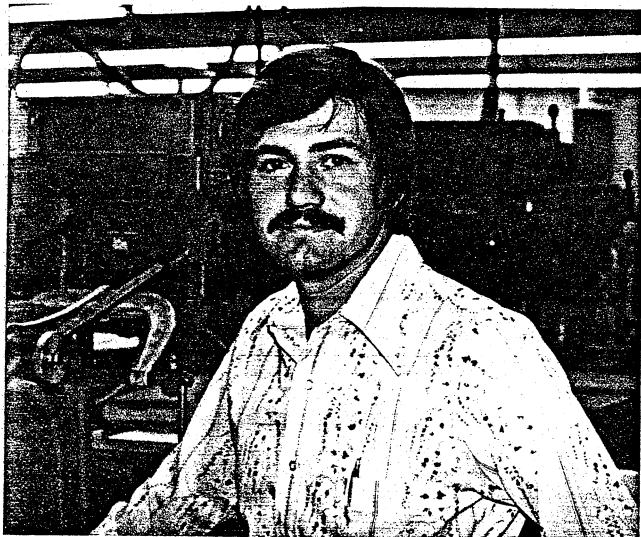
Later it was discovered that Jim was a long term employee of the telephone company -- of course it is obvious -- the specs of the amp that is.

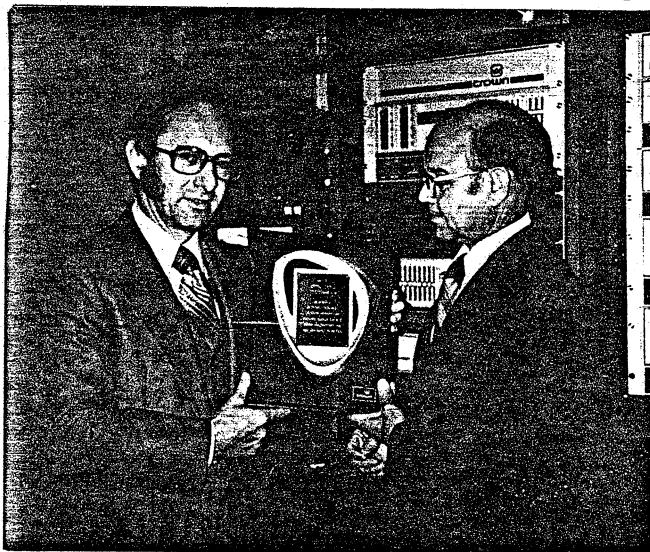

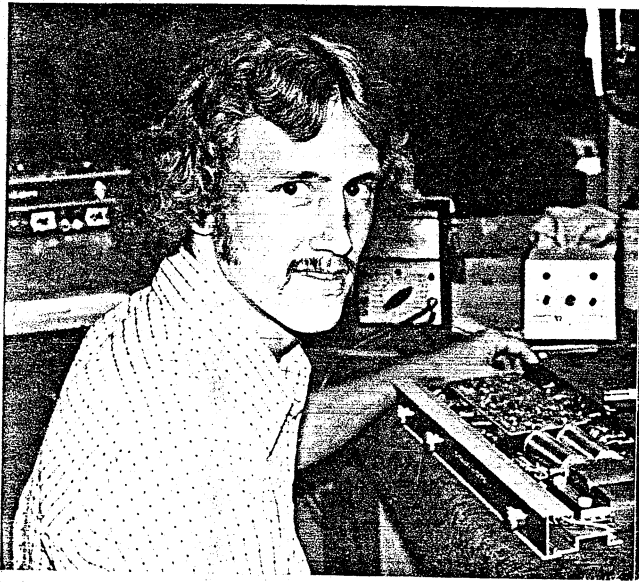
## New Faces

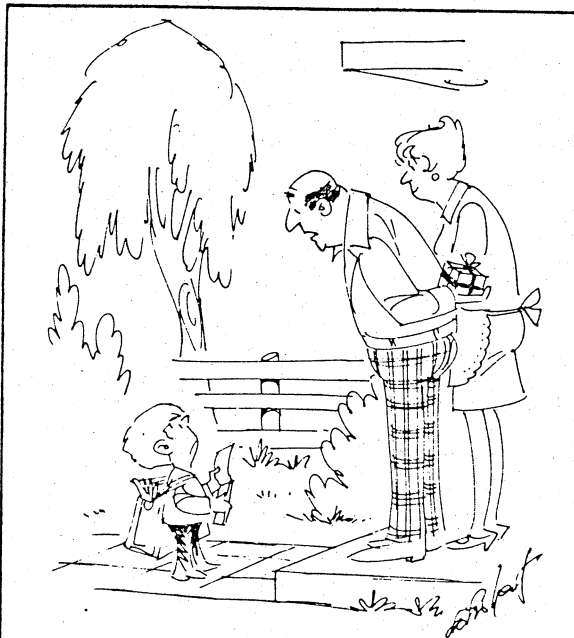
## New Faces

## SASSY SWEET AND SOUR MEATBALLS

5 Tsp Wyler's Beef Flavor Instant Bouillon OR

5 Beef Flavor Bouillon Cubes

1/4 Cup Water

1 C soft bread crumbs

1 egg

1/3 C ReaLemon Reconstituted Lemon Juice

2 Tbs soy sauce

2 Tbs cornstarch

Hot cooked rice

1-1/2 lbs lean ground beef  
3/4 C finely chopped onion  
1 (20oz) can pineapple chunks  
(drained, reserving syrup)  
3 Tbs firmly packed light  
brown sugar  
1 tsp ground ginger  
1 large green pepper, seeded  
and cut into bite-size pieces

In small saucepan, over low heat, dissolve 2 tsps bouillon in water. In large bowl, combine beef, crumbs, onion, bouillon liquid and egg; mix well. Shape into 18 meatballs. In large skillet, brown meatballs; pour off fat. In 2-cup measure, combine 1/4 C pineapple syrup, ReaLemon, sugar, soy sauce, remaining bouillon and ginger; add to meatballs. Cover and simmer 20 to 25 minutes. Combine remaining pineapple syrup and cornstarch; stir into meatball mixture. Cook and stir until thickened. Add pineapple and green pepper. Heat through. Serve with rice.

## PLUCKET CAKE

1 cake yeast

1/4 C lukewarm water

1 C scaled milk

1/3 C sugar

1/3 C butter

1/2 tsp. salt

3 eggs well beaten

4 C flour

Add the sugar, butter and salt to the scaled milk. When cooled to lukewarm add the dissolved yeast, eggs and flour. Cover and let rise until double in bulk. Knead down and let rise again. Roll small balls about the size of a walnut and dip in melted butter. Then roll the mixture of 3/4 C sugar, 1/2 C nut meats, and 3 tsp. cinnamon. Pile balls loosely in an ungreased angel food cake pan or bundt pan and let rise 30 min. Bake about 40 min. beginning at 400. for 10 min. then turn down to 350 until brown. Turn pan upside down and remove immediately. Let cool long enough till it is touchable. Then proceed to devour immediately.

## BAKED CHICKEN

1 chicken breast, boned and skinned  
Juice of 1 lemon  
Dash of paprika  
Dash of garlic  
Dash of pepper

Marinate chicken for 10 minutes in lemon juice, paprika, garlic and pepper. Place chicken, juice and seasonings in foil and seal tightly. Bake for 30 minutes at 350° F. Open foil and broil 10 minutes. Makes 1 serving.

To cook in crock pot, add chicken, juice and seasoning and cook 2 hours. To cook in microwave, place chicken, juice and seasonings in small baking dish or plate and cook 3½ or 4½ minutes until done.

## CHICKEN SOUP

1 chicken breast, boned and skinned.  
4 C water  
1½ C raw vegetables (use any combination of chopped cabbage, spinach, onion, celery and green beans to equal 1½ C)  
Salt and pepper to taste.

Cut chicken into small pieces. Bring water to boil; add chicken, salt, pepper and bring to second boil. Cover and simmer 1 hour. Add vegetables and simmer until vegetables are tender-crisp. Makes 1 serving.

## APRICOT FLUFF

1 pkg. orange diet gelatin  
1 C boiling water  
1 can (8 oz.) diet apricots,  
drained and chopped (reserve  
½ C liquid.)  
2 tsp. lemon juice

Add gelatin to boiling water. Stir until dissolved. Add ½ cup of liquid from apricots, lemon juice and flavorings. Mix well and chill until partially thickened. Place bowl in pan of ice water and beat until thick and fluffy. Fold in apricots and chill until set. Makes 2 fruit servings.

## PINEAPPLE CHEESE DESSERT

15 oz part-skimmed ricotta cheese  
Juice of 1/2 lemon  
1 can Dole crushed pineapple (yellow can)  
3 packages of Sweet "n Low  
1 tsp vanilla  
1 egg  
1 package of Knox Gelatine  
cinnamon

Mix together egg, vanilla, Sweet "N Low, lemon juice--until smooth. Add cheese, mix until smooth. Drain pineapple juice into glass and add crushed pineapple to mixture and mix until smooth. 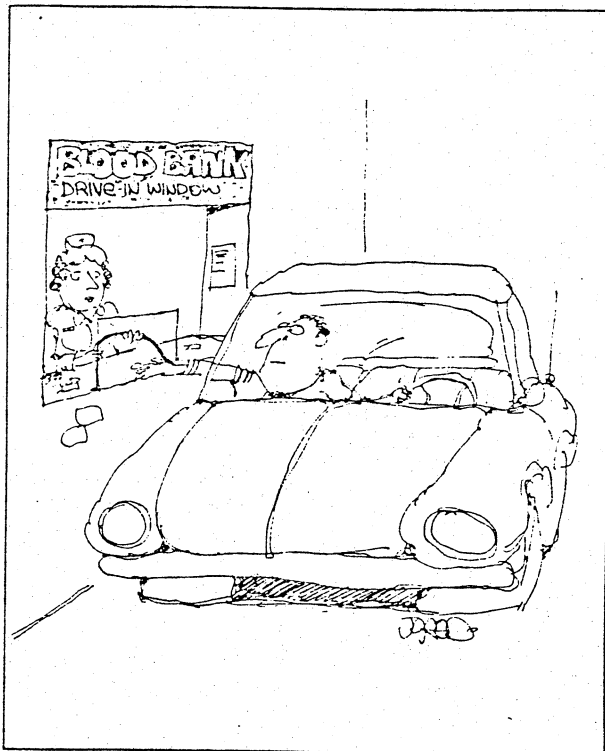

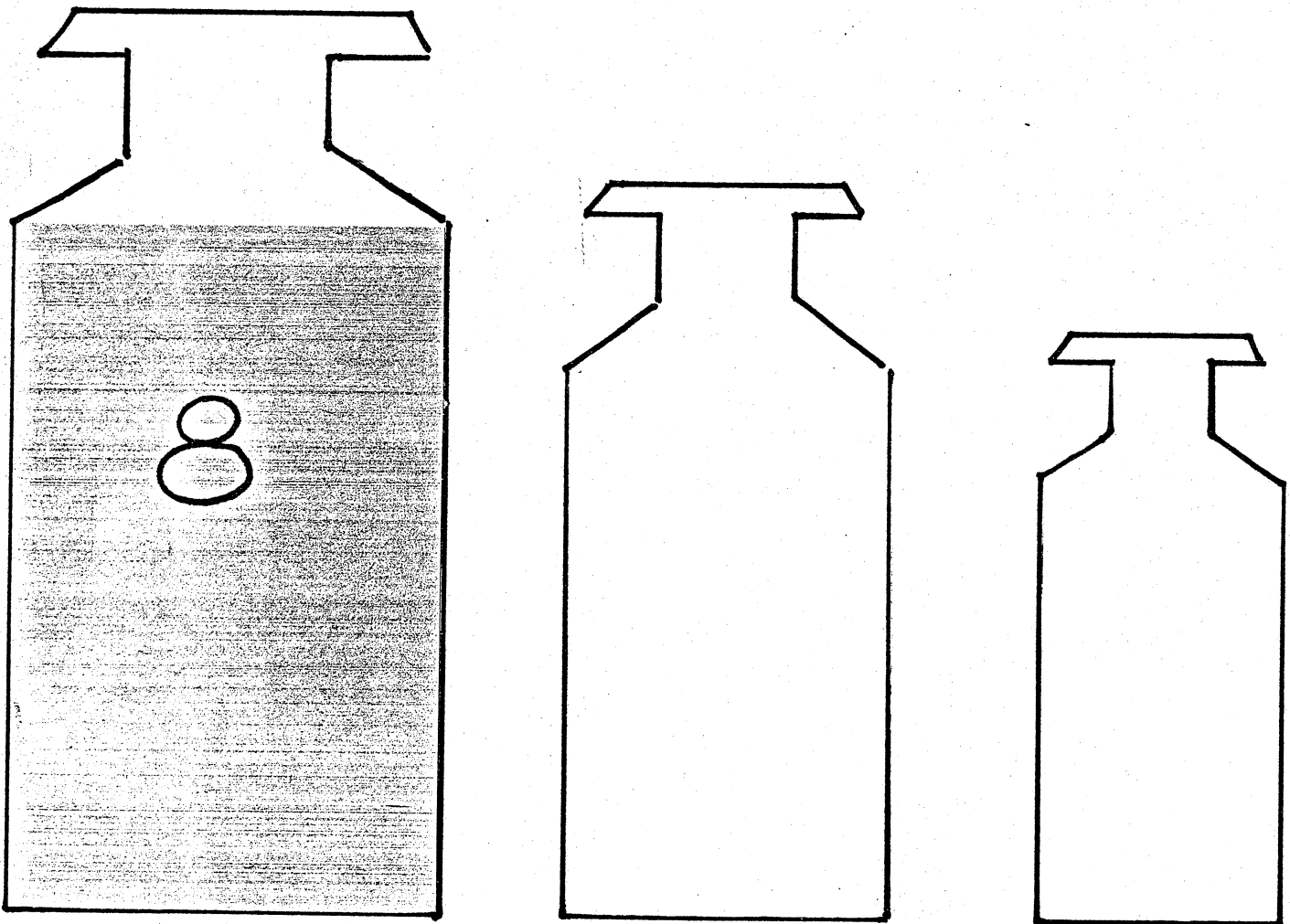
## "The Spilling of Milk"
