Guest Editorial

The following Guest Editorial has been rekindled from the CROWN Crier archives. This editorial was originally printed in the October 21st, 1974, issue and was written by the Editor, Sylvia Eger:

HALLOWEEN: Where Did it Come From?

According to Collier's Encyclopedia the "popular secular observance of Halloween, falling on the night of October 31, is derived from the rites of the Druids celebrating the day of Saman, when the Lord of Death called together the souls of the wicked who had died during the past year. The theme of the harvest, which runs through modern Halloween celebrations comes from both the old druidic celebrations and the old Roman festivals in honor of Pomona, goddess of fruit, which were brought to Britain during the Roman occupation".

In Celtic and Anglo-Saxon tradition, October 31 was the eve of the new year and significant in several areas. The fire festivals associated with the return of the herds from pasture occurred at this time. They attempted to placate supernatural powers to gain protection for the herds from the demonic influences of the corn spirit. It was also important as the time to renew laws, land tenures, and rekindle fire for the year. It was further considered the most favorable time of year for divinations both for communication with dead souls returning to homes and also those concerning marriage, luck, health, death, etc. Many of the games played to ascertain spouses and facts concerning them are the forerunners of the games played with apples in our modern Halloween festivities. Traces of sacrificial October 31 marks the beginning of the barren half of the year, goblins, ghosts, witches and other evils quickly became associated with Halloween by these pre-Christian era peoples.

Most of the activities carried on today, including pranks and all sorts of mischievousness, trick 'n' treat, etc., came to us from Ireland. For example, legend tells us that a certain fellow named Jack could not enter heaven because of his extreme miserliness nor could he enter hell because of the practical jokes he had played on the devil. Therefore he was forced to walk the earth carrying his lantern until the judgment day -- thus



the "jack-o-lantern". The druids contributed the concept of black cats we associate with Halloween -- they believed that cats were once people who had been changed as punishment for their evil deeds.

Although many tricks are still played today, Halloween is primarily a time when small children have fun dressing up as imaginary characters and going from house begging for treats and "threatening" a trick if they don't receive any. Halloween is a lot different now than in the days when it consisted only of festivities of pagan peoples.

And poplars, brightest gold.


When stately firs and lofty pines




Ruth and husband, Paul, have six children; five girls and one boy. They live in Osceola and are avid "Penn" fans.

MEATBALLS

2 lbs. ground beef; (I use 1b ham and 1 lb fresh pork, ground together)
2 tsp salt 1/4 tsp pepper 1 small onion, chopped
1 C cracker crumbs 1 egg 1/3 C milk

Mix ingredients together and form balls. Brown and put into sauce in crock pot, low at least 4 hours.

SAUCE

1/2 C butter 1/2 C vinegar 3/4 C brown sugar
1/4 C soy sauce 1 C catsup 1/4 C water
1tsp dry mustard 1/4 tsp garlic salt 1/4 C lemon juice

Mix all together until well blended and put in crock pot.


2 C sugar 1-1/2 C vegetable oil 4 eggs

FROSTING:


1- 3oz package cream cheese 1/2 stick butter or margarine
1/2 box powdered sugar.

Combine sugar, oil and eggs. Beat lightly. Combine flour, salt, cinnamon and soda and add to the first mixture. Add remaining ingredients and bake in a 9x13 inch pan or 2 9-inch pans for one hour at 300 degrees. Combine frosting ingredients and frost baked cake.


CROWN has been the only industrial team that has placed. The run will be aired over WCMR.

Wild sumac shows its fire.


