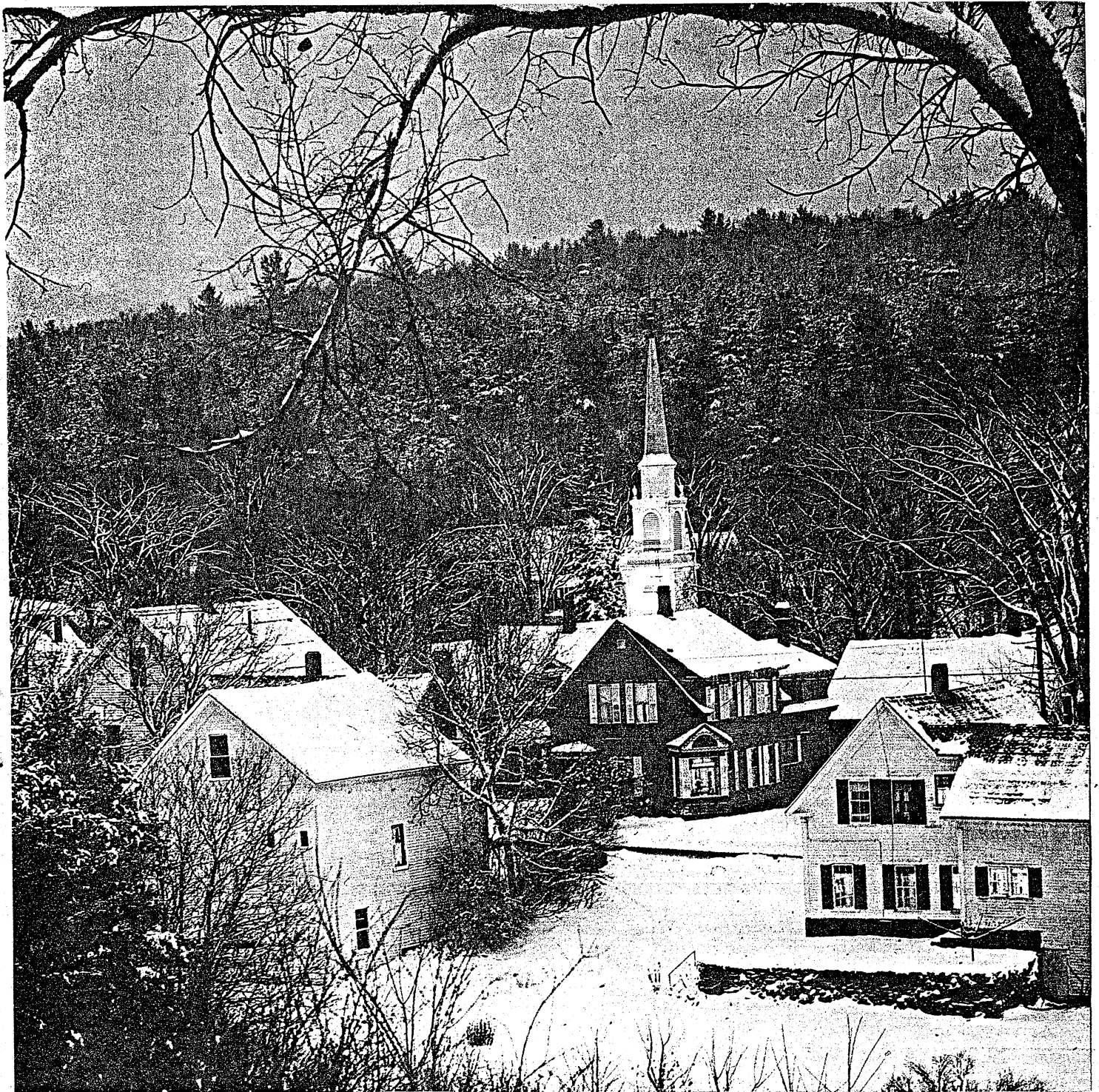

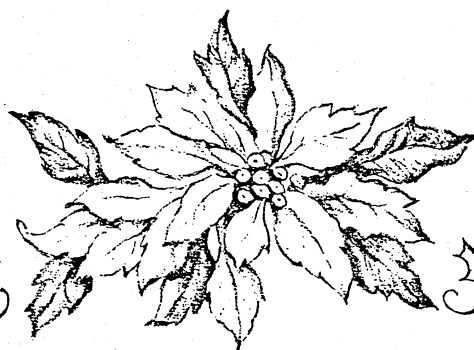

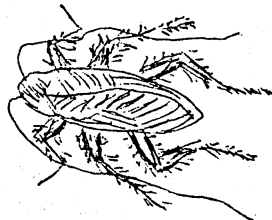

The final week of Christmas preparation at CROWN includes benefits and dangers not spelled out in the employee handbook. They illustrate easily.

Last December 22nd I chanced through the Marketing Department. (I work there and sometimes I chance through). The feeling became more pronounced while I was nibbling my way through Purchasing. Sausage and onion dip and potato salad and a six-layer pastry were featured. It seems to me these should make me feel better. They didn't, but I did hear of some meatballs, apricot cake, hot punch, and the usual cookies, fudge, nuts and cheese in Engineering. I was more than polite, and by the time I saw my office again, something was clearly not agreeing with me.

I soon realized what it was. In the informality of the sampling process I had eaten a lot of stuff in whatever order I found it. Pickled cauliflower and cheddar cheese and crackers had followed too soon after triple chocolate fudge with nuts, and so forth and three days of so forth. No wonder I felt strange

Clearly, however, the situation could be fixed up with more careful attention to what was being eaten.

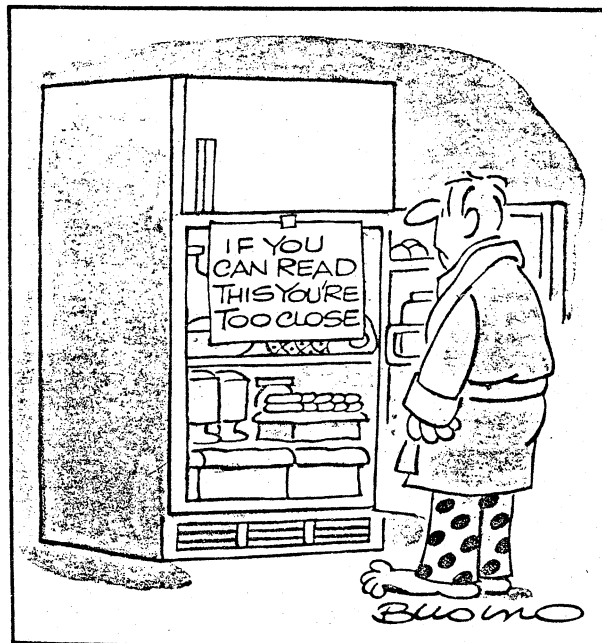

Suddenly at 4:30 it came to me! The right combination was ham, stewed fruit, party mix, and two pieces of chocolate peanut butter fudge. I got it and ate it; of course it worked, and I started feeling better immediately. Most of you would probably have thought of it sooner.

The lesson was surely worth remembering until next Christmas. In fact, you might want to remember it yourself. I pass it on to you freely.

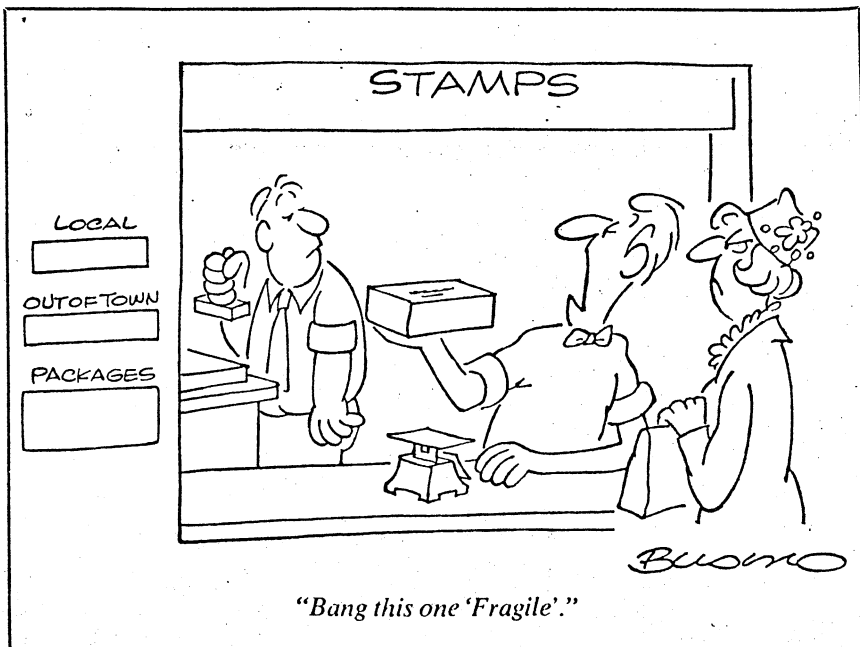

RECIPES FROM THE KITCHEN OF HELEN COSBY

LAYERED SALAD

Using 3 oz. boxes of Jello, repeat the process below for each of the following flavors, in order from bottom up: Cherry, Lime, Lemon, Orange, Lime, Strawberry. Add 1 cup boiling water to a 3 oz. box of Jello, stirring till dissolved. Take out one-half of that amount and add slowly to 1/3 cup sour cream. Stir together until smooth and pour into 9 x 13 pan. Chill for 25 minutes. Add 3 T cold water to remaining half of Jello and pour on top. Chill for about 15 minutes. Repeat above process for each flavor of Jello. After first, layer, layers can be added approximately every 15 minutes.

LETTUCE SALAD -- layer the following ingredients

- 1 head of lettuce (pour water over head and drain), break into pieces
- 2 cups of chopped celery
- 1 large red onion, sliced
- 1 box of frozen peas
- 1 pint of Hellman's Salad Dressing, stir and spread on layered ingredients.
- Top with shredded cheese and 4 to 6 strips of fried bacon, crumbled.

VEGETABLE SALAD

- 1 pkg. (24 oz.) of frozen mixed vegetables, cooked, drained and cooled
- 1 cup of celery (diced)
- 1/2 medium onion (diced)
- 1 small green (sweet) pepper (diced)
- 1 can (pint) dark red kidney beans, drained,

Dressing -- 3/4 cup of sugar
1/3 cup of vinegar
2T of flour
2T prepared mustard
1/3 cup water
1/4 t salt

Cook dressing until thick and cool. Pour over vegetables and chill overnight. I like double amount of dressing.

CANDY BAR PIE

- 4 5-cent Hershey almond bars
- 16 large marshmallows
- 1/3 c milk
- 1 c whipped cream
- 1 9 inch graham cracker pie shell

Melt almond bars, marshmallows and milk in double boiler. Cool. Fold in whipped cream. Pour into graham cracker shell. Chill 3 to 4 hours. Yield: 6 servings.

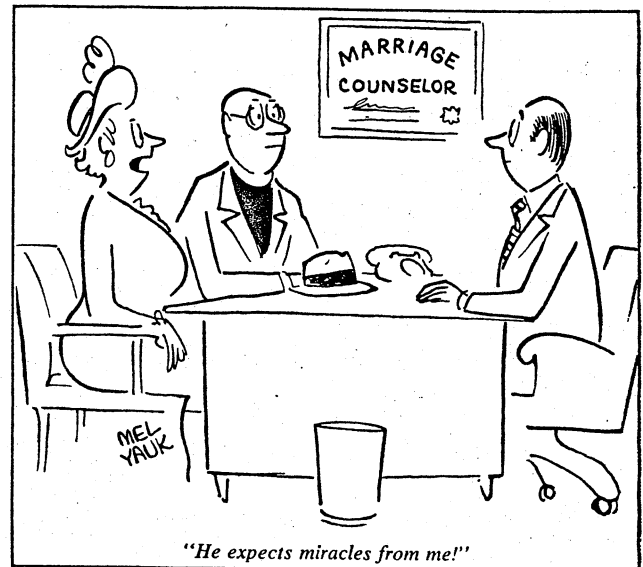

Potpourri

Christmas Projects

With the coming of Thanksgiving and Christmas, we all realize that the weeks grow shorter and shorter -- especially to those of us who bake and/or do needlework for the holidays! Ideally, much of this work is done before Thanksgiving rolls around. This month's column is meant to help anyone - like me - who intends to finish items early, only to procrastinate until Christmas Eve.

Following are ideas for quick last-minute articles. Each item is designed to be easy to make, with basic materials needed. Some are for tree or household decorations; others may be used as gifts for relatives and friends.

SKILL LEVEL: Elementary

WOVEN HEART ORNAMENT

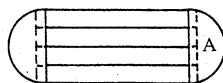


MATERIALS: Large scraps of two different calico fabrics, one light, one dark. Matching thread.

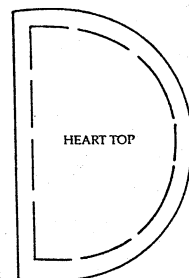
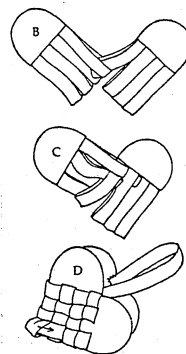
DIRECTIONS: Trace pattern and use to cut four heart tops each from light and dark calico fabrics. Press straight edges $\frac{1}{4}$ " to wrong side. With right sides facing and raw edges even, sew matching-color pieces together around curved edges. Clip curves; turn to right side.

Cut four $1\frac{1}{2} \times 6$ " strips from each fabric. Fold each strip in half with right sides facing and long edges together. Sew $\frac{1}{8}$ " from long edge on each, making eight tubes; turn to right side and press with seam centered on one side. Each strip should be $\frac{5}{8}$ " wide. Cut a $1\frac{1}{8} \times 9$ " handle from one fabric; make same as for strips, pushing raw ends inside and slip-stitching closed.

With center seams facing up, insert ends of four strips $\frac{1}{4}$ " into matching heart tops so strips are neatly capped at each end (see Diagram A); slip-stitch pressed straight edges of heart tops over strips. Fold strips in half, with seams inside, matching curved edges of heart tops. Press.

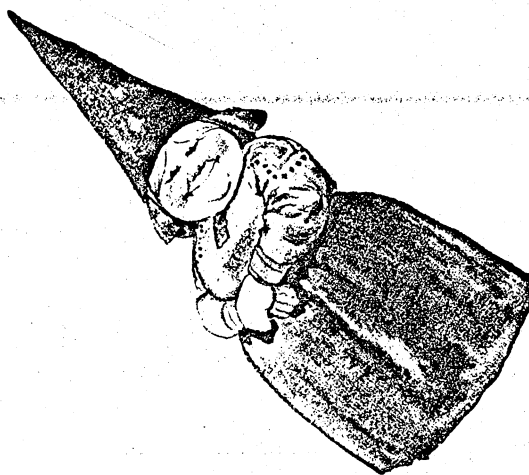


Position folded hearts on work surface as shown in Diagram B. Weave strips as shown in Diagrams C and D. When weaving is completed, straighten woven sections by pulling gently in both directions. Sew handle inside basket at inner points of heart as in Diagram D. Fill with candy and hang.



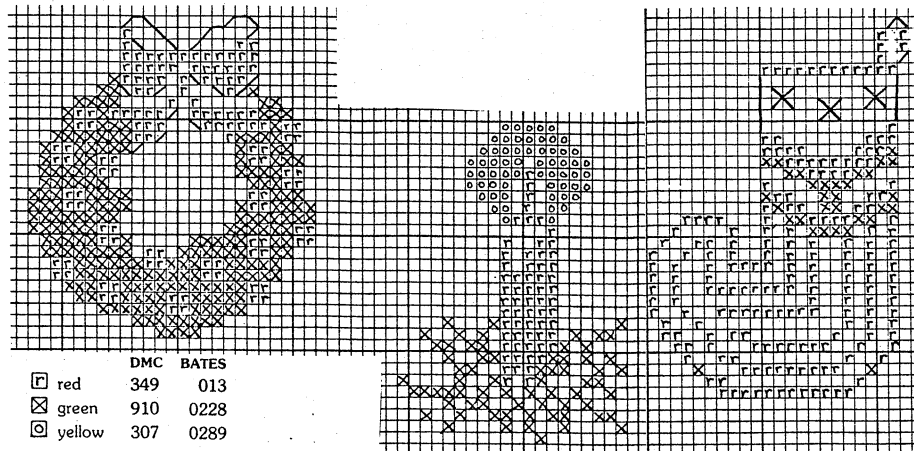
GIFT TAGS

Color (using felt-tip markers or crayons) prints and cut out. Glue to thin wood or cardboard, painting back of item if desired. Drill or punch hole near top for hanging. Baby prints are ideal for Baby's First Christmas ornaments. Varnish tag if needed, and thread ribbon through hole. Paint desired message on back of tag.



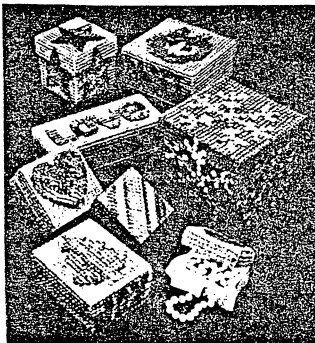
CROSS-STITCH ORNAMENTS

Here are a few more patterns for cross-stitch ornaments; or enlarge the design for wall hangings, pillows, or Christmas tablecloth and napkin set.



Backstitch heavy lines on stocking and wreath with red — 349, 013.

SEQUIN BOXES



Draw a simple design on a cardboard or wood box. Fill in design with sequins or beads a color at a time, using white glue and toothpicks. Leave item overnight to set glue; then brush with several coats of clear polyurethane, allowing each coat to dry.

CALICO-POTPOURRI ORNAMENTS

Using the following potpourri recipe (or one you prefer), stuff calico fabric shapes (circles, squares, or stars). Cut out 2 of each shape and sew wrong sides together; leaving opening for stuffing, and sewing in loop for hanging. Pink edges with pinking shears. Stuff, and sew remaining seam.

Recipe: Mix — 1 C dried orange, lime, lemon peels (remove membrane, cut into strips and dry thoroughly. Break into small pieces)

1 C whole rosemary

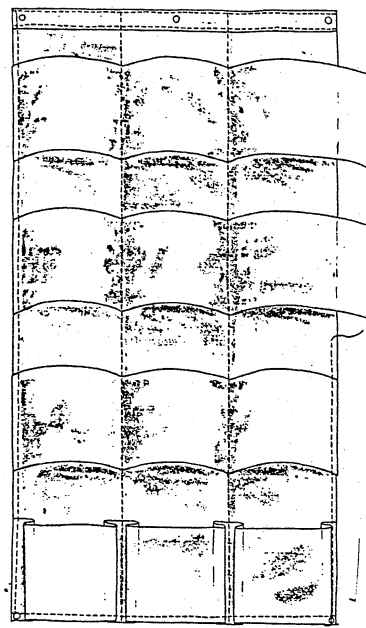
1/2 C dried whole basil

2 to 4 coarsely crumbled bay leaves

2 C coarse salt (coarse Kosher salt helps to hold fragrance)

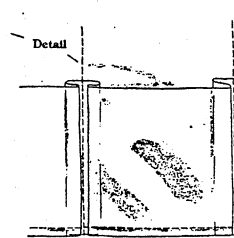

PANEL OF POCKETS



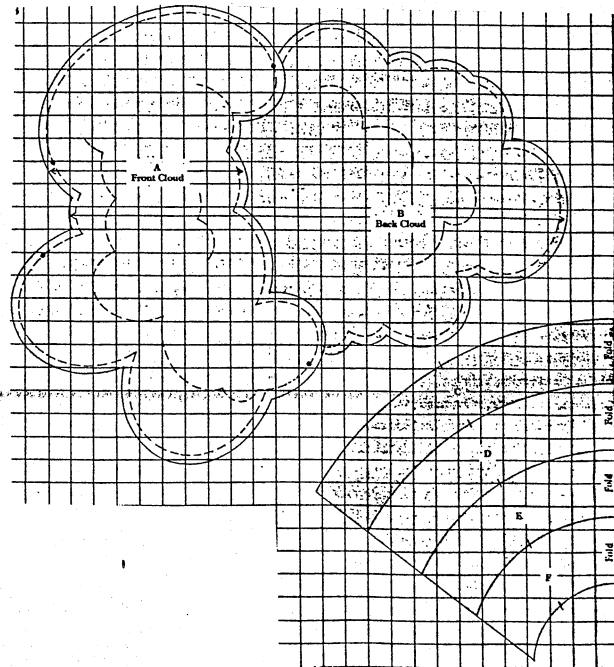
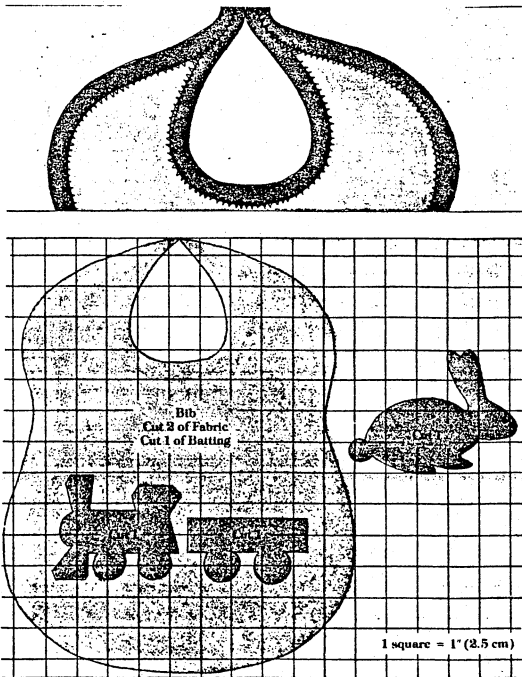
This is handy to have on a cupboard door for small items such as gravy mixes, Kool-Aid, etc. The same idea may be adapted for use in a child's room for toys, or as a shoe bag.

Use strong cloth, such as duck or canvas; or clear vinyl.



BABY BIB

Use colorful appliques (clouds, rainbow, cat, dog, ice cream cone) on fabric for baby bibs. Sew on bright bias tape around edges of bib, and attach button & loop or ties.

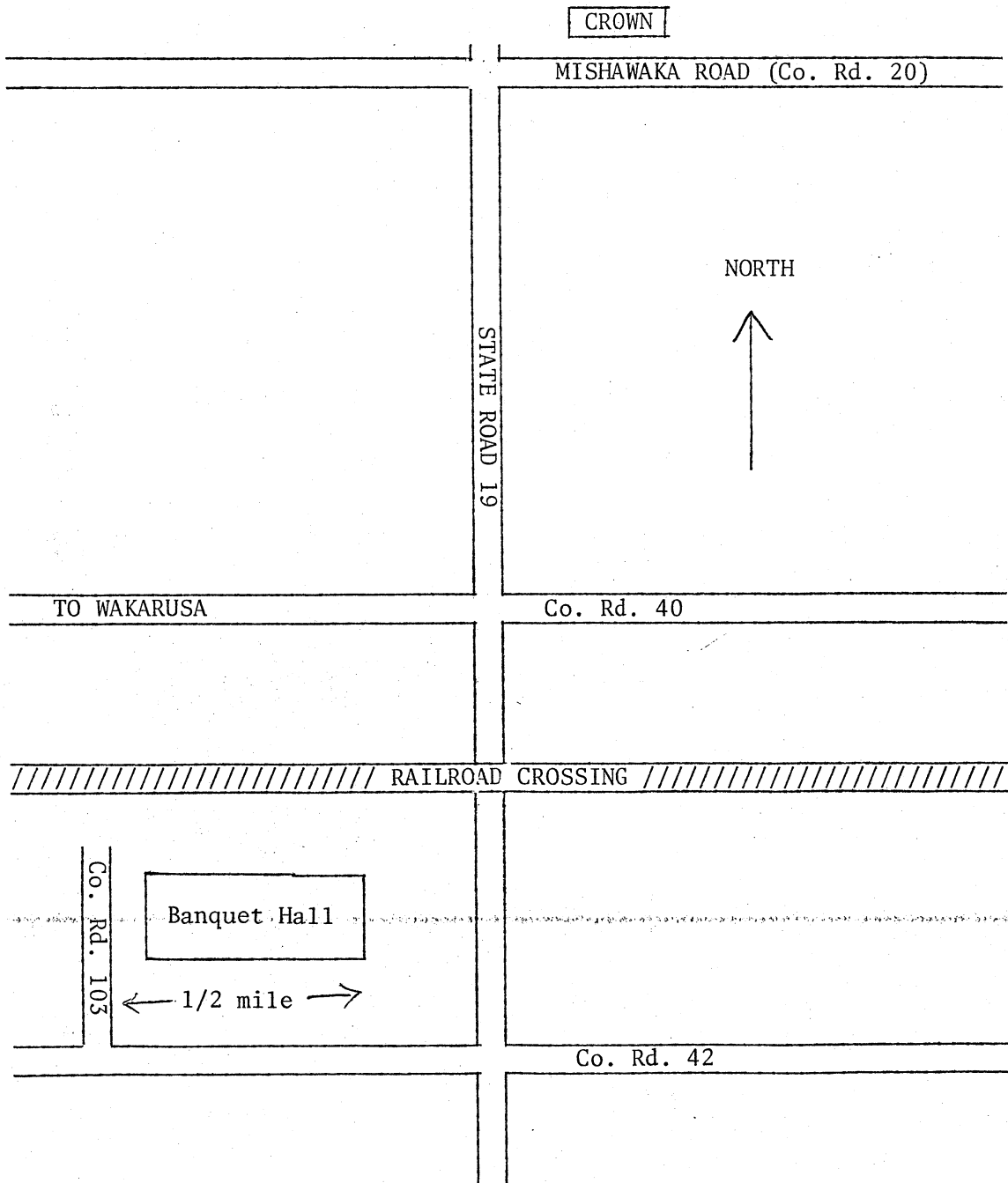
