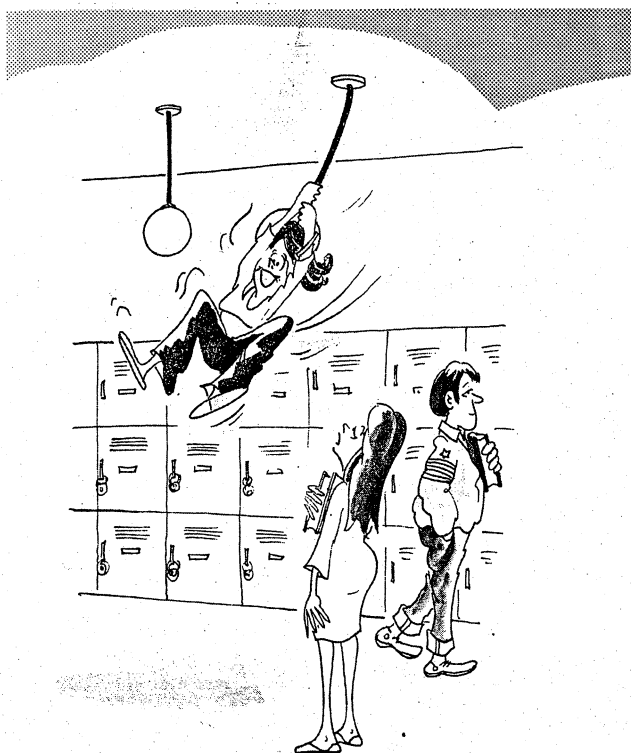

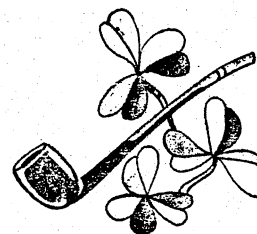

The Feast of St. Patrick

Did you know our policy has coordination of benefits, which means our insurance company coordinates with another group insurance that you may be covered with for payment of claims. For example, if your spouse has dependent coverage where you work you would be covered under another group insurance, however, your children's bills should always be turned into the father's insurance first. The policy holder is the primary carrier which means the bills should be turned into the patient's insurance company first and then the balance of the bills along with an explanation of payments by primary carrier, can be sent to the second group carrier for additional coverage.

it grew and changed its form.

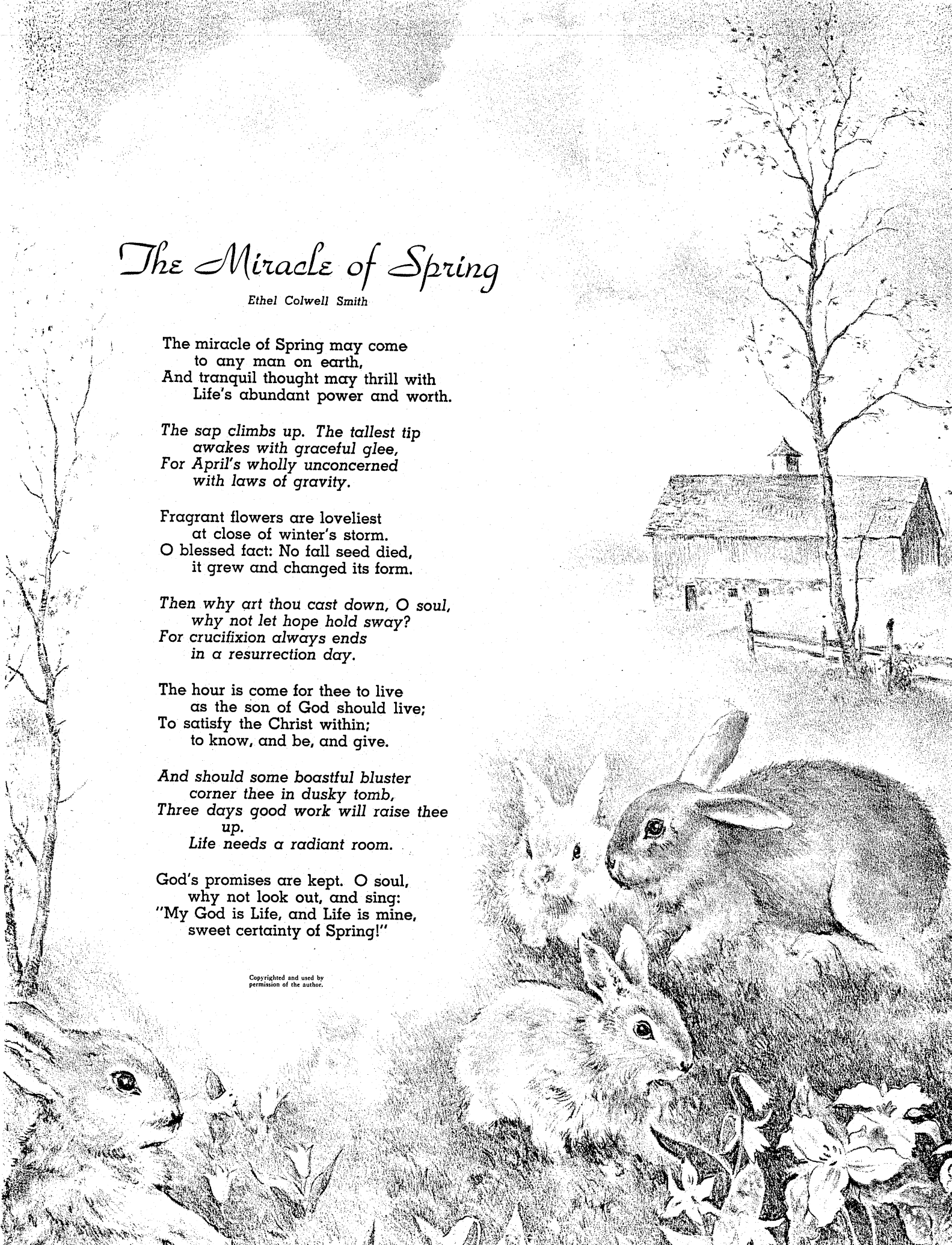
Then why art thou cast down, O soul,

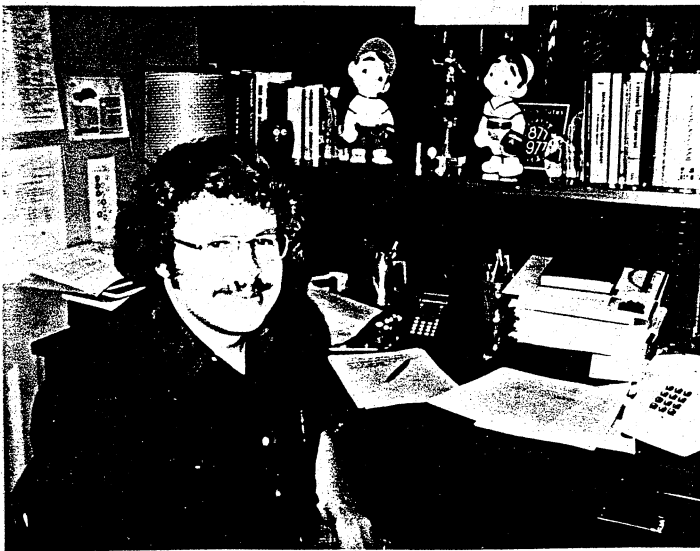
This young man is a REAL asset to the "bored" state of mind.

On the Other Hand



I used to think that inflation just meant things would cost me more money. That myth has charmed more than one generation of innocent American inflationees. The final line of the story came from Calvin Coolidge or Herbert Hoover or some other equally naive American Great who growled, "What this country needs is a good five cent nickel!" The truth itself could not have been more disastrous.

In our headlong rush to ferret out and extinguish the life of each root and trace of inflation, we have not yet thought of what we might do if success unexpectedly struck. Never mind for now that we haven't discovered the first useful clue to effective ferreting and extinguishing, for despite this lack of direction and success, we naively insist on continuing the attempt. What will follow if something we try should suddenly work? I submit that economic, cultural, and individual chaos will result as surely as pigs love the mud.

If you ever hear on the evening news that inflation has finally been conquered, do not sit there to see how the program comes out. See immediately to your savings account, your life insurance, your will, and your backside, because the next day will not resemble anything you have ever seen before.

Imagine that tomorrow all inflation were to go away suddenly with today's newspapers. You will notice some of the following strange and wonderful effects.

Early in the morning on your way to work you will notice fewer people hanging around gas stations. The reason would come to you without undue mental strain: the man who had been continually walking around the pump turning the prices to higher levels on the hour and humming "The Sheik of Araby" would be standing in an unemployment line humming "Easy Come, Easy Go".

When you go shopping, supermarket aisles will open up like an October corn field. The hourly stamping of new prices on cans and packages will ease, and the companies who have been turning out millions of those clever little price stamping machines (the ones that print "46wed\$wow3" on the top of a can of corn) to replace the millions worn to junk metal every day, will also go the way of the whooping crane.

New car dealers will no longer have to use a tent, three neon signs, a hot air balloon carrying clowns throwing candy and pantyhose to the masses, and six searchlights just to attract a little attention. In all likelihood, they will be able to sell an occasional car with no more than the tent and the clowns, since they will no longer need to blur the fact that the \$7892 quoted on the phone 20 minutes ago has become \$8321. There, of course, go the neon sign, searchlight, and hot air balloon businesses, hard on the heels of the price changing people and equipment. If this suggests Great Depression II, read on.

Buying, owning, and selling a house will turn from a relative hassle into a fully qualified nightmare. "Mr. Woolblanket, your \$129,000 domicile, due to a deplorable shortage of inflation last year, increased in value the buyer will own the heavy negotiating artillery - i.e. the money and the knowledge that the price isn't going anywhere. The sales force will somehow have to communicate the value of the item in question to the potential buyer. This will open up whole new concepts of buying and selling.

Language will also change as the argot of inflation fades. For example, "Cola" will once more describe a soft drink instead of a compensation scheme. In today's inflationary language a COLA (Cost of Living Adjustment) works to compensate for the inflation rate by automatically raising wages to match inflation, thus raising costs and further increasing inflation, thus activating the COLA machinery again, and so on and so forth and so there. This mechanism is a practical result of the fooling in Congress that, for the average problem the symptoms are more fun to deal with than is the problem itself. (Congress itself actually reflects this in another way if you look at the individuals as symptoms and the overall operation as the problem).

Political digressions aside, the implications of these few examples shine with the brightness of a pre-copper dime. We have no business removing an evil and leaving nothing in its place. If we dump inflation we will require a replacement. The following suggestions merit further study as candidates: (1) A federally funded lint control program; (2) A countrywide commitment to knock down everything higher than 250 feet; (3) The development of a means to convert lawn mulch directly into a tasty snack food that could be picked up from your lawn directly after mowing. Put these on the next country-wide ballot. If inflation passes on from boredom, inadvertent government action, or old age, we can be ready with a new national obsession that can take its place alongside British tea taxes, land swindles, rock music, and eating too much. Delay will be fatal. Write your Congressman today! Use short words so he can read what you write.

CHOCOLATE DELIGHT

3/4 Cup butter or oleo, melted
3/4 Cup finely chopped pecans
1 Cup powdered sugar
1 (3 3/4 oz.) vanilla instant
pudding mix
1 (4 1/2 oz) chocolate instant
pudding mix

1 1/2 Cups all-purpose flour
1 (8 oz.) cream cheese, softened
1 (13 1/2 oz) carton frozen whipped
topping, thawed and divided
(I used Cool Whip)
3 Cups milk
Chopped Pecans

Combine butter, flour, and pecans, mixing well. Press into a 13x9x2 inch pan. Bake at 375 degrees for 15 minutes; cool completely. Combine cream cheese, powdered sugar, and 1 1/2 cups whipped topping; blend thoroughly. Spread over crust; chill. Combine pudding mixes and milk; beat 2 minutes with electric mixer at medium speed. Spread over cream cheese layer. Spread remaining whipped topping over pudding layer. Garnish with pecans. Refrigerate. Yield 15 servings.
