


He allows an average of ten minutes each day for religious activities.



Carol enjoys the people she works with and has found out when you need someone in a crisis they are generally there to help. She doesn't hold any records, but says her greatest title is MOM.





Floodlight

BOARD DEPARTMENT

This month we are Floodlighting the Board Department which is also still called the Board Room from when our first experimental efforts at producing printed circuit boards was set up in a single small isolated room. Our department has since expanded in size and now also includes the once separate silkscreen area which is now linked to printed circuit work by UV etch resist solder mask and board legend screening. In addition, the silkscreen area still is responsible for fab part screening as well as ever expanding new screening applications such as Lexan labels, serial tags, and drafting symbols.

Because of the departments hopscotch layout many employees find it confusing as to exactly where all the areas of the Board Department are and where individual pieces of equipment might be found. Also confusing is what order of operations are done to turn a piece of raw material into a finished printed circuit board. The following building diagram and flow chart may be of some help.


Everyone in the department is cross trained in nearly all operations and frequently move around following a particular batch of boards through several different operations and also pitching in where needed to help work flow or to solve various kinds of equipment or material problems that can arise.

Presently the following people can be found specializing and spending a greater percentage of their time on: Leona Foggin - NC drill, Evelyn Millsaps - touch up inspection, Lynn Scholfield - silkscreening, Steve Mills - spends his expertise evenly over the whole department, Bob Ryman the coordinator is spending more time lately in the ever expanding silkscreen area, oh! and Steve Scholfield specializes in supervision. Steve adds this comment on that job. "The supervision needs of a department are not met by one person shouting orders. Everyone can be involved in the supervision of each other and the ongoing processes and problems. This I feel is one of the greatest attributes of our present crew." The Board Department works with Fab in shuttling boards and Fab parts between each other. Our finished products also go through incoming inspection on their way to the stockroom to be sent to the lines, modules and outside contractors. Steve Peer interfaces with us as our immediate manager. Terry Frick is very much involved with our silkscreen area, having set up much of our present operation and is still involved introducing new innovations as well as making the silkscreens we use. Larry Dennison makes artwork for silkscreen and info tapes for our drill. His past PCB experience is also very valuable to us. John Landa also interfaces frequently with us on new board layouts and prototypes.

Now that you all know where we are located stop in and see our set up some time. Also we can be reached by phone at 263 which rings at three locations in the PCB area including Steve's desk, and at 296 which rings in silkscreen.





VERY TASTY: HAM-STUFFED BAKED POTATOES

4 large potatoes, baked	1 tsp salt
3 cups finely chopped or ground cooked ham	1/8 tsp pepper
2 eggs	2 T cream or milk (optional)
1/2 cup minced, peeled onion	1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese
1/2 tsp minced, peeled garlic	1 T margarine, cut in tiny pieces
1 tsp prepared mustard	

Cut potatoes in half lengthwise and scoop insides into a medium-sized bowl. Reserve potato shells. Mash potatoes. Mix in ham, then eggs, onion, garlic, mustard, salt and pepper. If mixture seems too dry, add the cream(or milk). When well mixed, spoon into reserved potato shells, mounding mixture and marking it with a fork. Sprinkle with Parmesan, dot with margarine. Potatoes now may be covered and refrigerated for 2 to 3 days or wrapped and frozen. (Thaw before baking.) Heat oven to 350° and bake potatoes until hot, about 15 minutes, if freshly made, 30 if from refrigerator. Makes 8 potato halves.

1 tsp vanilla
