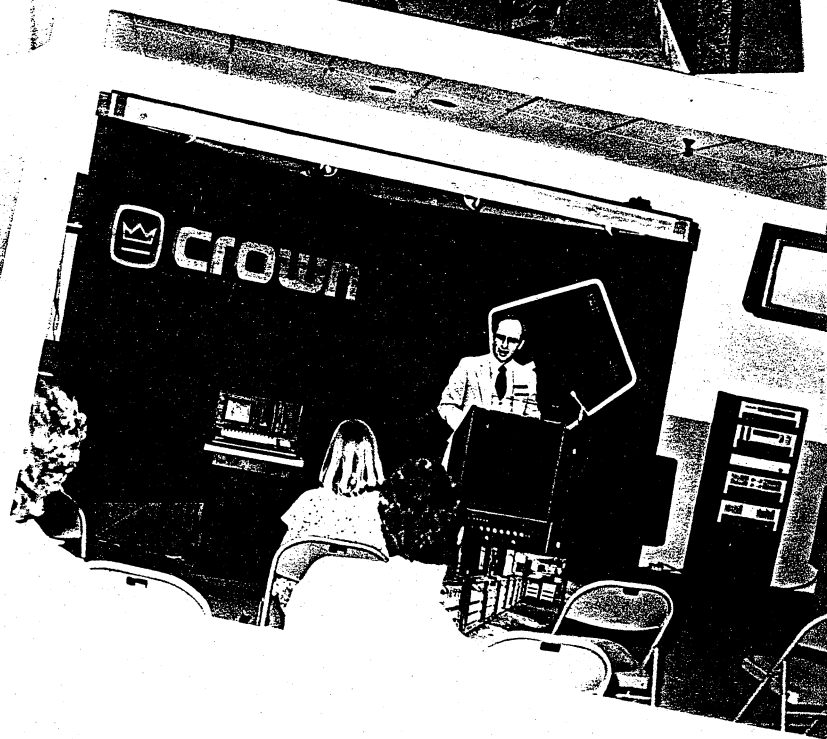
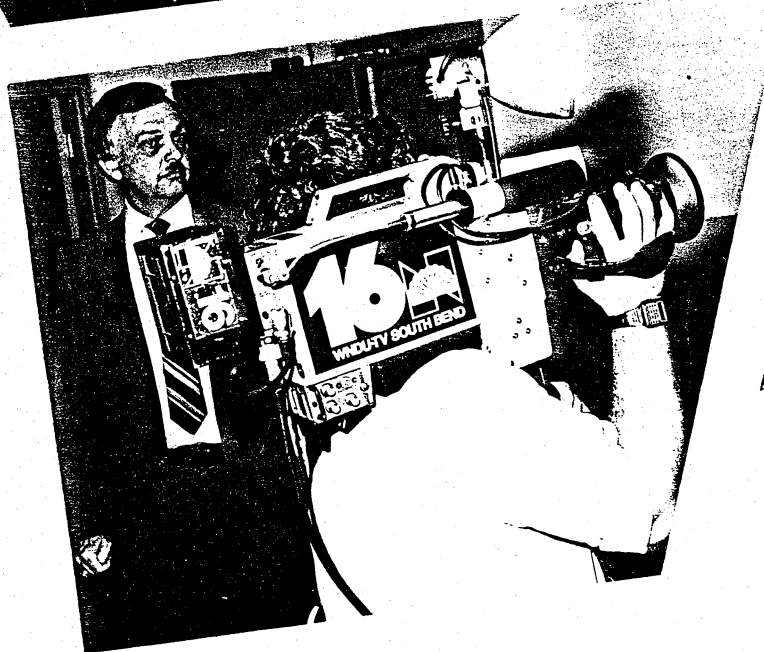
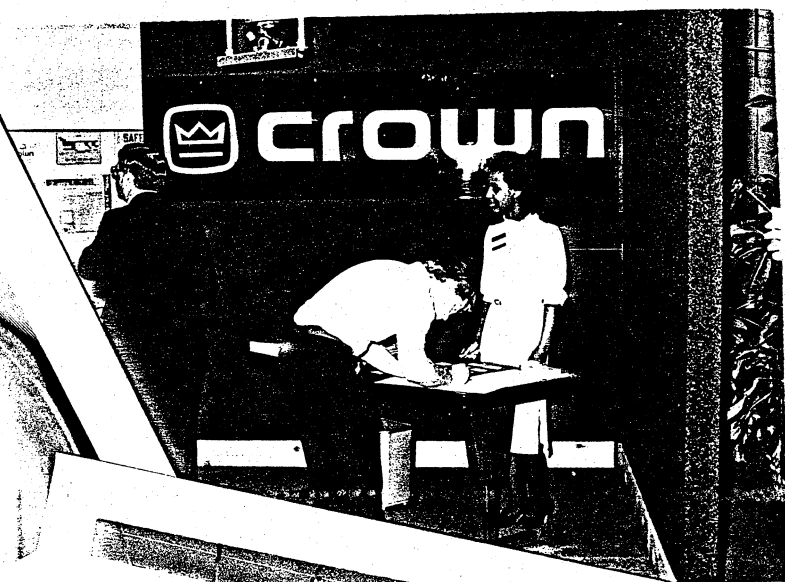

TRAVEL WITH AN OPEN MIND. Leave your prejudices at home.

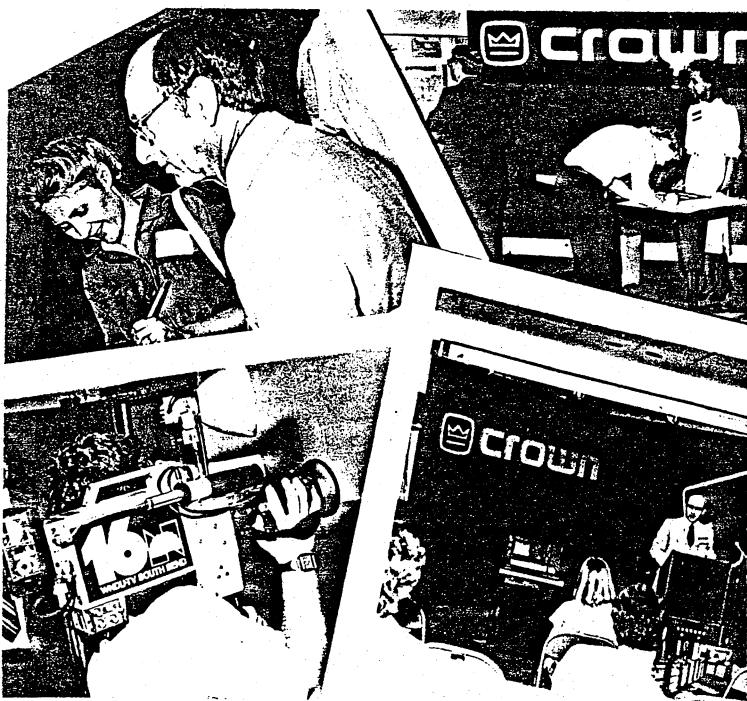

Crown Breaks Ground

A groundbreaking ceremony was held Thursday for a new building which will house a portion of the operations of Crown International, 1718 W. Mishawaka Road. Thursday, June 23, 1983 Crown International became a spokesperson for high-tech industry in the Midwest. And, we did it at a press event which attracted news media representatives from television, radio, newspaper, and the wire services.

"We think high technology is an area where maximum growth is going to take place and we're proud to be a part of it", Max announced at the mid-morning press conference. "Crown is proof positive that high-tech industries can survive and flourish in Indiana and, more specifically, the Midwest", he stated.

David Bowell, Industrial Development Division representative of the Indiana Commerce Department reinforced Scholfield's remarks with new information related to high-tech in Indiana and commented, "Crown is a part of the current marketing plan for Indiana that will take the expertise of Crown and high tech companies like them around the world."

John Harman, chairman of the Industrial Development Committee of the Greater Elkhart Chamber of Commerce, said the chamber's message to prospective industries is "Elkhart is an attractive setting for high-tech. We sometimes fail to give ourselves credit (for what we have) but Crown brings it to our attention," he said.

The press conference marked the first event in a public relations program designed to help the local community understand and appreciate Crown.

Jim Beattie was master of ceremonies at the event where Don Eger and Howard King announced the formation of TECRON and demonstrated the TEF System 10. John Bachman explained PZM technology, demonstrated the Sound Grabber and provided a unit for one television reporter to use as she prepared the evening's lead sound track for the six o'clock news.

All of our distinguished guests participated in a tour of the facility, visiting the construction site of Crown's 36,000 square foot expansion where sophisticated manufacturing and paint line are planned.

Our goal with the new public relations program is to help the community understand what Crown has done and the important work we are continuing to do. While we enjoy a worldwide reputation as a leader in the audio field, we also want to share this important information with our friends, neighbors, family, and co-workers here at home. "New Computer Improves Concerts, Finds Oil"

Elkhart, IND. (UPI) -- Crown International said Thursday production will begin in August of a sound-analyzing computer that can fine-tune the acoustics of concert halls and recording studios and help prospectors find underground oil and minerals.

The company said it already has sold out the first two months of production, about 75 units, of the \$14,500 TEF System 10.

Prototypes of the machine, which tests and analyzes the Time-Energy-Frequency relationships of direct and reflected sound waves, have been used to study and solve acoustical problems in concert halls, auditoriums and ocean-going vessels, company officials said.

"The System 10 makes it possible for us to see and analyze sound waves in action," said James Beattie, General Sales Manager. He said it can drastically cut the amount of time needed to analyze acoustical problems and the amount of money needed to correct them.

Acoustical engineers might spend "hours and hours" looking for the source of a sound reflection problem that the new computer can uncover in 15 minutes, said Don Eger, General Manager of Tecron, the Crown Division building System 10.

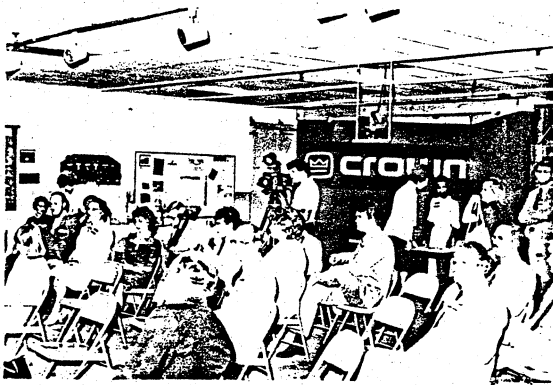
He said the machine can pinpoint the location of the problem more precisely, so sound designers can create less drastic, cheaper remodeling to correct acoustic deficiencies.

Crown said its engineers are working on programs that will allow the System 10 to analyze sound waves bounced underneath the earth's surface by prospectors looking for underground deposits of oil, natural gas, or minerals.

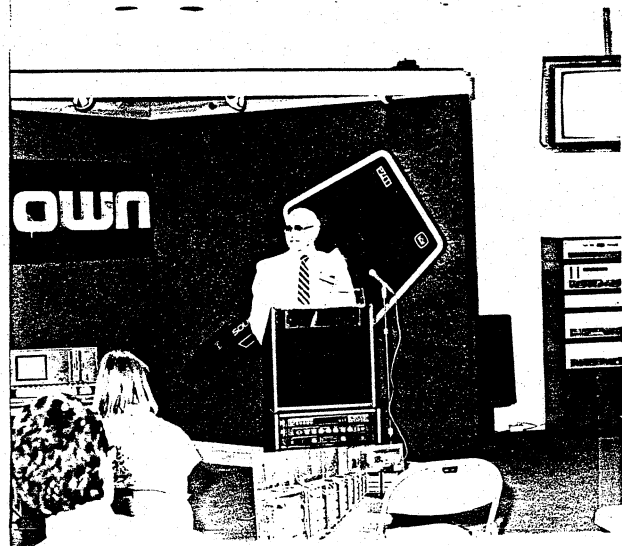
The company also expects the computer to be used in research on acoustics and human perception of sound, in the testing audio and other electronic products and in a variety of other applications.

Tecron is a new division of Crown International, a company that until recently concentrated on building amplifiers and other audio electronics for recording studios and home stereos. Company spokesmen said industrial applications are now the fastest growing portion of the company's business.

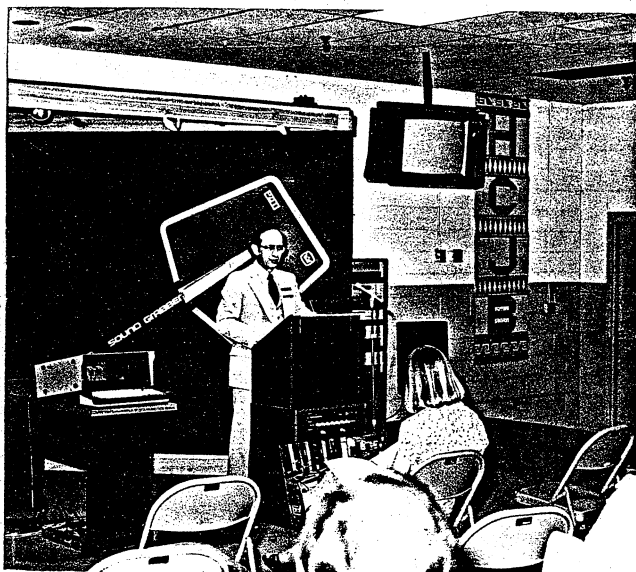
The System 10 is being produced under a license from the Jet Propulsion Laboratories of the California Institute of Technology, where much of the research and development on the project was performed.

Howard King talks about TECRON and the TEF System 10.



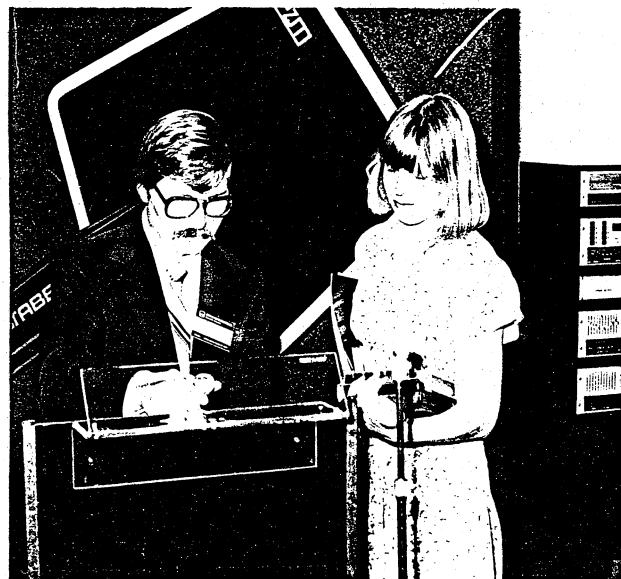

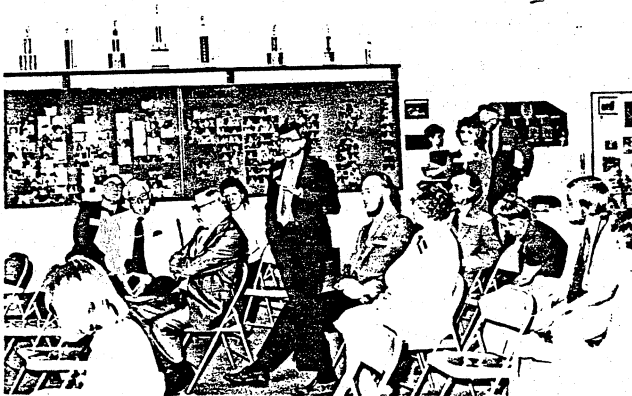

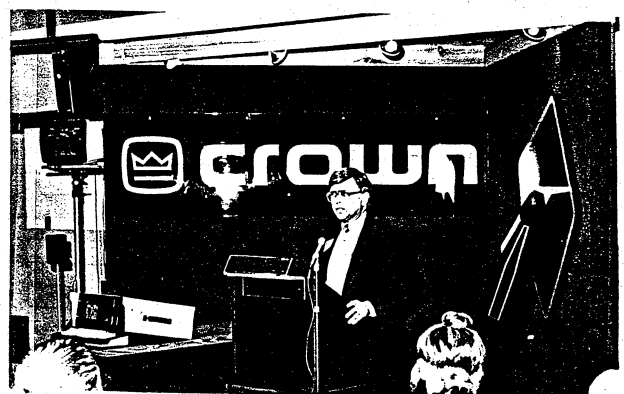

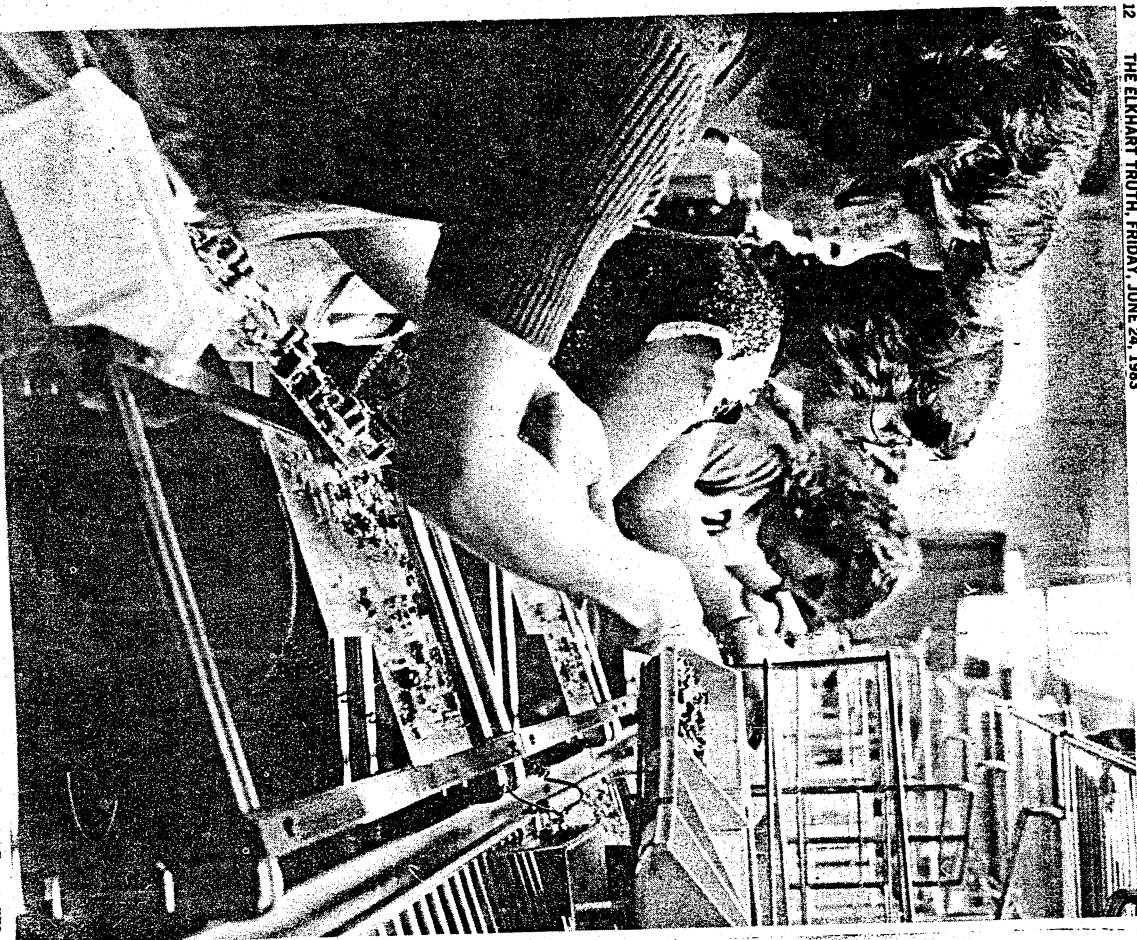

Can Michiana Area Be A High-Tech Hot Spot?

Crown International is "proof positive" that high-tech industries can thrive in the Michiana area, says Max Schofield, president of the electronics components manufacturing firm.

Crown, which has a reputation for keeping a low profile in the industrial community, sponsored a "high-tech awareness program" Thursday morning. On hand for the event, which also served to introduce two new products, were representatives of the local chamber of commerce and David Bowell, a high-tech specialist with the Industrial Development Division of the Indiana Department of Commerce.

Crown makes electronic products sold worldwide for home audio systems, professional recording studios, large-scale sound reinforcement systems, and radio and TV broadcasting stations.

Crown is expanding its Elkhart facilities, located at 1718 W. Mishawaka Road, with a new 36,000 square foot addition that will house sophisticated automatic production equipment, Schofield says. Groundbreaking for the addition is set for next week, but earthmovers are already at work preparing for the construction.

ACCORDING TO SCHOLFIELD, "Michiana provides an excellent base to operate" and export to world markets. In addition, "The best technical brainpower of anywhere in the world" is available. Crown's engineering and technical talent is "home grown, not imported from the Silicon Valley," in California, he said.

John Harmon, chairman of the Industrial Development Committee of the Greater Elkhart Chamber of Commerce, said the chamber's message to prospective industries is "Elkhart is an attractive setting for high-tech." "You don't have to go to California to find high-tech," Harmon said. "We sometimes fail to give ourselves credit (for what we have) but Crown brings it to our attention."

Because of companies like Crown, Indiana "is going to be a significant center for high-tech industries, not only in this country but in the world," Bowell told those attending the program. He also noted that a recently announced \$200 million expansion by Delco at Kokomo is the largest and most expensive expansion by a high-tech company anywhere in the country. Delco recently beat a Japanese company in winning a contract with a Japanese manufacturer, "and I say hooray for Hoosiers," Bowell said.

SCHOLFIELD SAYS his company has held a position of leadership in the industry for more than 30

years. The company's growth has not been without risks, he says, but Crown's efforts "are starting to pay off."

The company was founded by Clarence Moore 1947 when Moore, recently returned from mission work in Ecuador, developed a new tape recorder that was suitable for mission work.

From that beginning, Crown has grown into multi-million dollar company with about 230 employees. Important product developments came in 1949 when Crown introduced the first tape recorder with built-in power amplifier; in 1964 when the company brought out the first solid state stereo amplifier in 1 1/2-inch panel or "pancake" format; and in 1971 when Crown made the first solid state stereo amplifier with over 100 watts output.

Since that time, products have included the first power amplifier to use on-board computers and the development of the first microphone not based on Alexander Graham Bell's original version, the pressure zone microphone.

One of Crown's new products is the Sound Grabber P2M microphone. The Sound Grabber is a consumer version of Crown's professional microphone line designed for use with video and audio cassette recorders. The other new product is the TEF System 10, an analog/digital computer with applications in a field where vibration phenomena need to be analyzed such as acoustics, structural analysis, geophysics and fatigue testing.

Schofield says there are opportunities for growth outside the audio field, and Crown has made a commitment to those areas by establishing the TECROC division, headed by Howard King. TECRON is providing design and marketing of electronic components suitable for industrial users. For example, Crown amplifiers are suited for driving transducers in vibration tables.

TECRON is hosting the first meeting of its new formed sales representative organization next week. Representatives of 27 companies comprising the organization will gather at the Midway Motor Lodge for meetings on corporate policies and objectives, sales and marketing methods and an introduction to the new analog/digital computer and demonstrations of industrial amplifier applications.

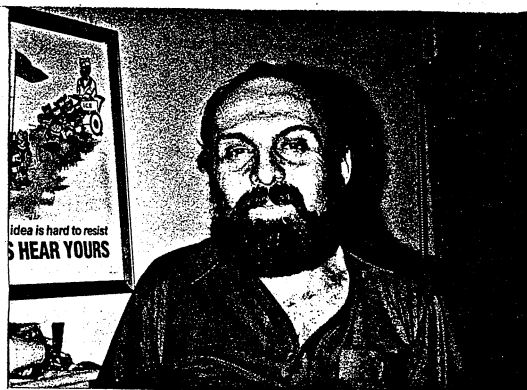

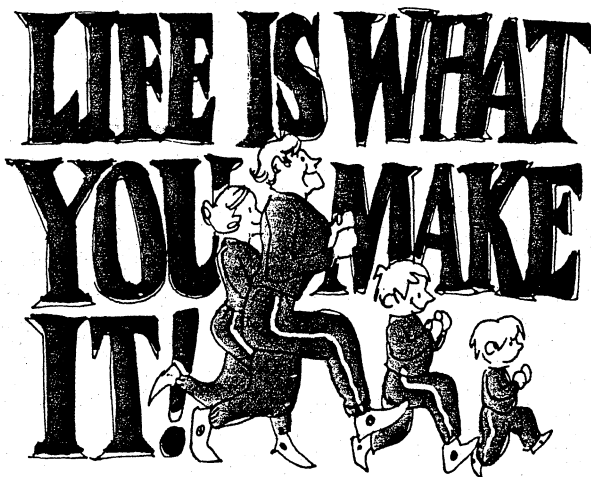
