

PATTI PONTIUS (Parts) and family spent a weekend in North Carolina.


JENNY SCHIEBER (Stockroom) is still taking orders for the beautiful cloth frames she makes.



### SAUSAGE BREAD

1 pound of Italian sausage (browned & drained)  
2 Cups Mozerella Cheese  
Romano or Parmesan Cheese

Dough:

1 pkg yeast	2 Tbsp. Salad oil
1 C. hot water	1 Tbsp. salt (omit if using self-rising flour)
2 1/2 C flour	

Mix well. Let rest while browning meat. Split in half and roll out into rectangular shape.

Place 1/2 of meat down middle of dough; sprinkle with Romano or Parmesan; add 1 cup of mozerella. Fold over twice, repeat with other 1/2 of dough. Place on cookie sheet and brush with yolk of egg. Cook until brown (30 min.) in 350° - 400° oven.

Can be frozen and reheated in micro-wave.

### CARMEL CAKE

1 yellow cake mix (bake as directed on back of box).

### CARMEL ICING

1 1/2 C. white sugar      1 large size can Pet milk

Pour Pet milk and 1 C sugar in sauce pan, heat on low while browning 1/2 C sugar in skillet. Sugar may turn lumpy and syrupy when Pet milk mixture is hot. Pour in skillet with brown sugar, stir until thick. Let cool about 5 minutes before spreading on cooled cake.

### JELLIED EASTER EGGS

2 packages fruit-flavored gelatin	3 cups cold water
2 packages unflavored gelatin	12 eggs
Candle	

Stir fruit-flavored and unflavored gelatins together in saucepan, add water, stir to blend. Heat, stirring, until completely dissolved; set aside to cool. With a pin or fork tine, puncture a small hole in narrow end of egg; turn and puncture wide hole in broad end. Hold egg over bowl, put lips to small hole, blow egg out of shell and into bowl. Reserve eggs to scramble, make omelets or cake. Wash shells with cold water. Blow all water out of shells. Light the candle and hold flame over smaller hole of each egg so the paraffin drips over it to seal the hole. Pour cooled gelatin into empty shells, using small funnel or spoon. Sets eggs upright in carton; place in refrigerator for 3 hours or longer, until gelatin is well set. To remove, crack shells by rolling on table, then peel gently, first wetting hands to handle. Refrigerate jellied eggs. Serve on a nest of shredded carrots or cottage cheese, or serve with whipped cream. Or nibble as a snack. Makes 12 jellied eggs.

## How I Learned to Talk Politics by Dave McLaughlin

I have never felt at ease discussing political issues. For one thing, most people I have listened to have not bothered to understand much about the subject at hand. I did not see how I could possibly know less than they did, and knowing more did not seem to count. These conditions eliminated me from effective political conversation until just recently when the secrets of this kind of discourse suddenly fell open to my understanding like a watermelon hit with an axe.

The occasion of my enlightenment was a political speech on television that usurped a MASH rerun. Missing MASH was annoying, but after I watched the speech for a few minutes I decided to make the best of it and try to see how the man operated. My observations after a half-hour amazed me for their simplicity.

The speaker was a masterful politician, although he seemed otherwise to lack interesting or useful items of character. His speech followed this pattern:

(1) He always pretended to be interested in the people listening. He worked at this by looking soulfully into the camera and smiling a lot. His voting record and personal conduct when not making speeches suggested that he was actually rafting through life without noticing much but himself, his personal prosperity, and his tie color.

(2) In the course of his speech, this man set up two contradictory positions and never bothered to discredit either one.

(3) Also in the course of his speech, he said, "analysis", "the people", "charisma", "tough", "brilliant", "honest", "absolute", "fundamental", "reality", and several other words about ten times more frequently than anyone would have in ordinary conversation. Furthermore he did not swear, which I had heard that he did in ordinary conversation.

Except for these three distinguishing characteristics, the speech was no more

entertaining than a grocery list or a sermon.

I had to try this out. A friend of mine who liked to talk about political stuff appeared at a social event I attended a few days later. Remembering my newly discovered rules before he could get his lips up to cruising speed, I shredded his political commentary with the following interjection ( looking as sincerely as I could directly into his eyes ): "I am convinced that a careful analysis of historical precedent and the New York Times editorial page will demonstrate that both a balanced budget and large government deficits are absolute fiscal necessities. The people objurgate those leaders who engage in the kind of irresponsible overspending that has gone on. No amount of political charisma can outweigh this imposing reality. At the same time, the most brilliant and objective political minds have indicated the absolute need for increased government intervention to ease the burden on the poor, the halt, and the lame."

Here I had to stop for a few seconds since I was talking faster than I was breathing, and was starting to get dizzy. My friend was staring at me in shock; he had never heard me talk like this. I was pretty pleased myself except for the lack of oxygen. I went on.

"Any honest analysis will have to support these conclusions, and anyone claiming to represent the interests of the people while ignoring these fundamental realities will be thrown out of office."


"That's tough, isn't it?" I finished as I remembered the last of the words I had wanted to slip into the conversation. It did not fit in at all, but I was new at this and wanted to use all of the political words I could.

After this inspired piece of elocution (I looked this up - it means, "Developing a great wind in public, especially from the mouth") my companion could only nod his head in agreement. He did not nod vigorously - he had not understood what I had said. For that matter, I had not understood much of it either, but of course I had not planned to. This was political discussion, not cooking school.

I realized I had gotten the upper hand in my first real political discussion. The discussee no longer had a clear view of anything we had covered, and was trying to remember what color his car was so he could leave.

Who knows where all of this will lead? I have never wanted to live in the White House and give up playing racquetball at the Y. It is easy to see how so many people could want to do that, though, now that I see how easily the basic skills can be learned. Of course, political skills do not qualify a person for any useful work, so I urge you to be careful how you use what I have just revealed to you. I would not have shared this if I did not trust your discretion.


### LIVE THIS EASTER
