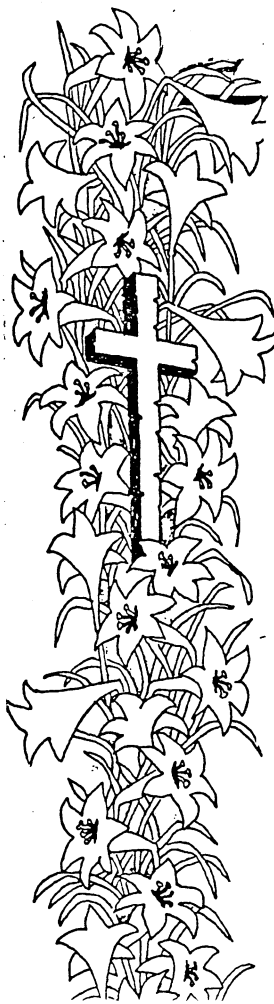

A Word From The President:

Several years ago, I presented a list of what I then called "Principles and Values of Crown International." The initial list, which is reproduced in this letter, was presented on an overhead projector in an Assembly Period. At that time I asked for input or comments about how well everyone felt that these principles and values fit.

As presented in November, 1984:

Principles and Values of Crown Int'l

- 1) God is the sovereign Creator & Sustainer of the Universe.
- 2) We affirm and respect the worth of each and every individual - and know it cannot be measured by ability or effort.
- 3) Honesty is absolutely essential.
- 4) Employment is to be -- fulfilling, enriching & fun & work.
- 5) The efforts of the enterprise shall be directed toward the common good of all its members and toward service of the greater world community.
- 6) Love for others is our highest goal.
- 7) Envy and contention is to be avoided.
- 8) Earning of Corporate income shall be looked on as the natural outgrowth of efficient effort and a necessity for continued existence but not as a goal in itself.

Over the intervening years, we have had a great deal of input and dialog with a number of people. The ideas were discussed, refined, rewritten and reorganized many times. The present status of this list is entitled simply "Beliefs."

It is important that we describe what our Beliefs really are rather than merely what we would like them to be. At the same time, it is not sufficient to leave it there. I feel there is a need to stick our neck out and establish statements that may take some stretching to attain or live with. I'm sure there would be little disagreement with beliefs and values that uphold human dignity and fairness but to make them a part of both our individual and collective life style takes a great deal

of dedication, commitment and hard work.

There is one belief I would like to highlight. No. 4 on both lists speaks about the nature of work. Well, not really work itself, but our attitude toward it.

I think it should be fun. I know you may say "Yes, but you are a workaholic and, besides that, your job is easier than mine." Those points are probably both true but I still think everyone's work should be enjoyable. The accomplishment of a task, however mundane, can be fulfilling if you let it; and all tasks have some personal interaction which again can be enriching and enjoyable.

If this line of reasoning fails to make sense, look at the only other alternative. Since most of us have no choice, work becomes a necessity - we will do it whether we want to or not. Thus, if we cannot make it enjoyable, we become enslaved and "it" makes us miserable. It is really not much of an alternative.

Finally, there is something called "synergy". When several persons work together and one person puts effort into making his or her tasks enjoyable, co-workers will find their interaction with this person more pleasant and enjoyable. The co-workers in turn will respond and increase the level of enjoyment for that one person; everyone wins. I want to do my part in contributing enjoyment to your work life here at Crown.

I present these beliefs not as a final pronouncement to be etched in stone and never changed (or thought of) again. They are presented as an attempt to jog our interaction to assess what our beliefs are and what they should be and to work towards defining and modifying both them and our behavior to best fit our group and our needs.

To this end, I would again call on everyone to look at these and determine if they are indeed what we want them to be. Talk about them and feed back your comments to me and others.

As a company, our most important activity is to direct the creative power of our minds and hands toward a common objective. We believe:

- 1) God is the sovereign **Creator** and Sustainer of the universe.
- 2) That **individuals** have worth and we know that it cannot be measured by ability or effort.
- 3) That life gains meaning through a deep personal faith in God and cultivation of personal discipline. Work and achievement then take a proper place in that life.
- 4) That **work**, however difficult, is to be fulfilling, enriching and enjoyable; and that accomplishments contribute to a happy, healthful life.
- 5) We have a **collective responsibility** to the common good of all members of the enterprise and toward service of the greater world community.
- 6) **Integrity** and **honesty** are absolutely essential.
- 7) Earning of **Corporate income** shall be looked on as natural outgrowth of efficient effort and a necessity for continued existence but not as a goal in itself; and that all persons within the enterprise both contribute to and benefit from the company's profit.
- 8) That the individual has a **responsibility** to fully utilize his skills in the job to be done, to cooperate with fellow workers in the common accomplishment of work, and to use the company resources of time, material and equipment wisely and effectively.

We have also attempted to describe our business mission. Why does Crown International as a manufacturing company exist? We have what we call a "Mission Statement," an attempt to describe what business we are presently in. This too is not a static statement but one that

describes our present state. Changes will be made as conditions change and as we make efforts to modify response to challenges, opportunities, and difficulties. The "Mission Statement" is simply as follows:

Crown International is an engineering, manufacturing, and marketing enterprise specializing in electronics principally supplying high quality, limited volume production for audio and other markets to consumers, professional and industrial customers.

Next time I would like to present a set of objectives or statements which support our Mission and Beliefs.

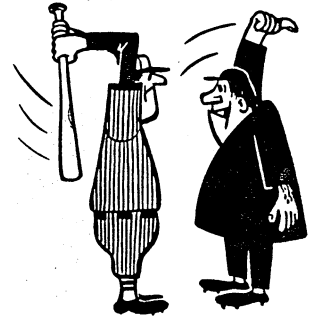

Remember

The fondest hope of the average person is that he be remembered by others. It would be infinitely more helpful if the average human could remember things himself.

Memory, it has been said, separates the human race from the animals. I believe this is true. The average dumb animal remembers far more useful information than the average dumb human. Animals remember things like what activities might kill them and what foods might poison them. Humans, on the other hand, continually engage in general warfare and eat a lot of Macwendychef's meatburgers, when just a mild attack of memory would scare them off such pastimes.

Two interesting aspects of memory concern its length and its accuracy. We reverence both of these artifacts for reasons that are entirely mysterious to me. Remembering things for a long time is a particularly useless activity. A popular proverb insists that "Elephants never forget". Do you know why people believe this? Because no one ever checks, that's why. And what works for elephants works for people. A person who claims to remember one of life's odd details from 20 years ago will always be believed by default. No one can prove him wrong (unless someone could produce a newspaper account of the subject of memory. But who saves newspapers for twenty years and can find the one he wants?). The way to operate a long memory is to keep it under six months for details and under two years for important stuff. Anything further away you might as well make up on the spot, since no one else will remember either.

The accuracy of memory sometimes relates to its length. When we are born, we each receive an inner, intuitive box of memory colors. Some of us get just black and white and maybe a red or blue. We do a modest job of coloring what we



do remember and forget the rest. Others, and we each have encountered a few of these, come equipped with the equivalent of the Deluxe 64 Color Crayola Set with the built-in Crayon Sharpener. Every memory that originally entered their minds as a dull, colorless item better left that way, comes out of memory as a rainbow-hued spectacular of color and brightness and flash. The longer the memory has been rolling around in their color-box, the more brilliant it becomes. It's hard to tell if they apply the colors deliberately, or suffer the effects of an unconscious process, but the results are always grand and entertaining.

Regardless of length and accuracy, memories are always selective. A person's children can remember each of 22 different gifts received by a friend at a birthday party in intricate detail, but not where they left their father's hammer or their brother's bicycle. I myself can remember batting averages of famous baseball players dead 20 years, but not where I left my kids.

These facets of the human memory process have delayed and frustrated us for thousand of years. We remember mostly unimportant stuff for an indeterminate period, and we decorate even those items until they can hardly be recognized.

Of course, I would not have told you all of these sobering facts if it were not for R. David's Six Rules of Total Recall. These will help you:

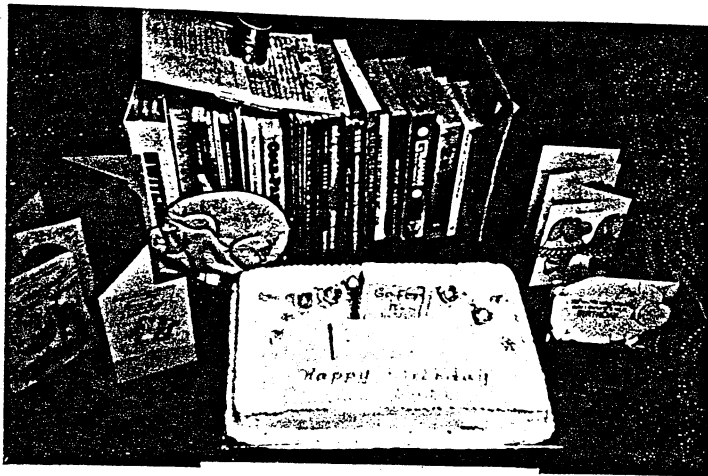
1) Never claim to remember anything if it will not make you a great deal of money or save your life.

2) Never even try to remember anything that does not fall into the above categories.

3) Learn to write.

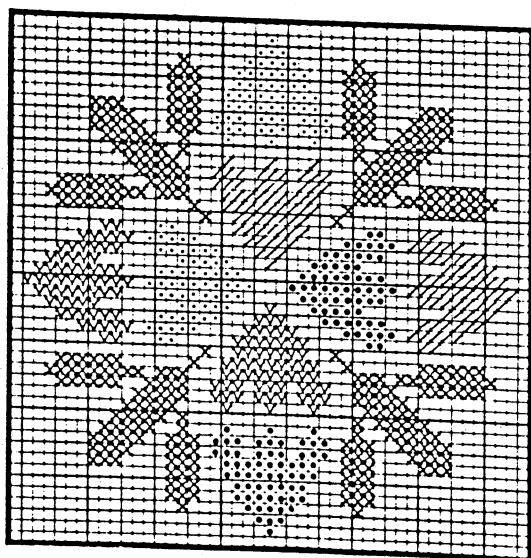

This design adapts well to COASTERS for the table. Finish edges with lace or piping.

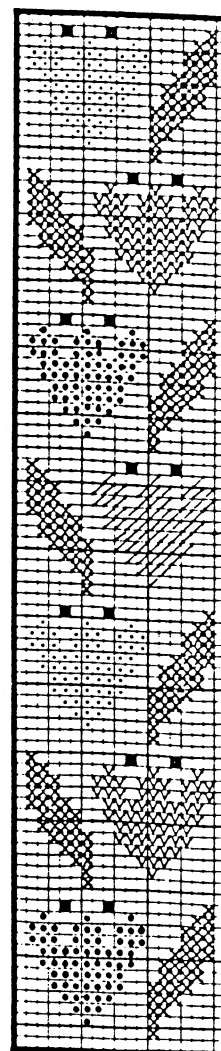

PLACEMATS to match the coasters can be made with this graph. Put design on one or two edges of the placemat.

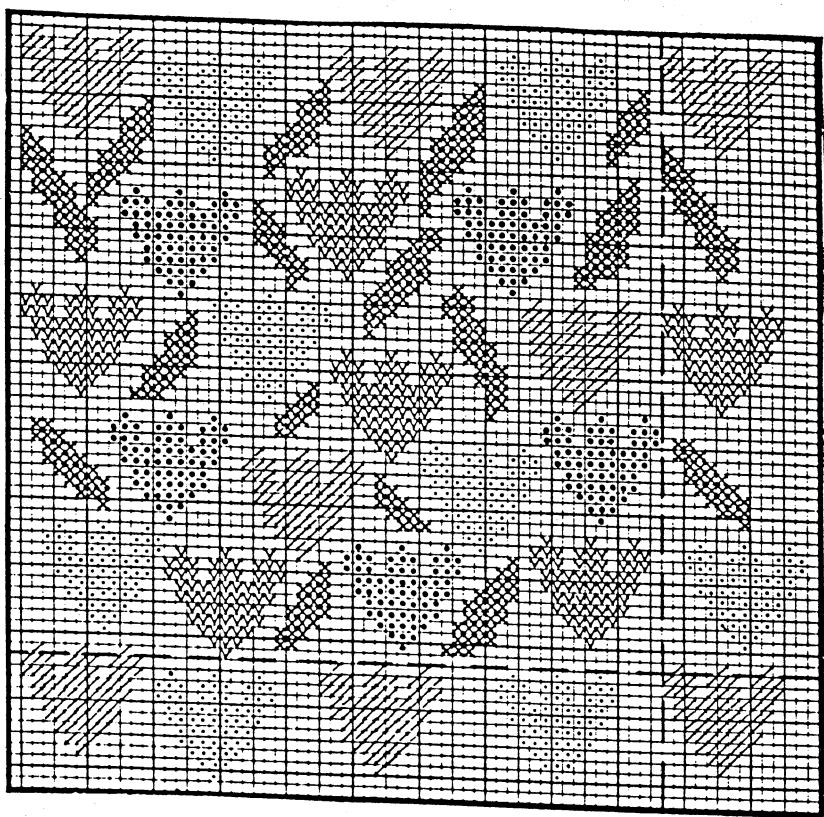
A corner of a bathroom would look dressed-up with a BELL-PULL stitched in colors from your bathroom. Sew a bead in the black squares above each tulip.

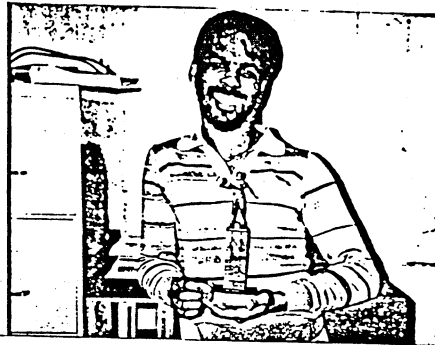
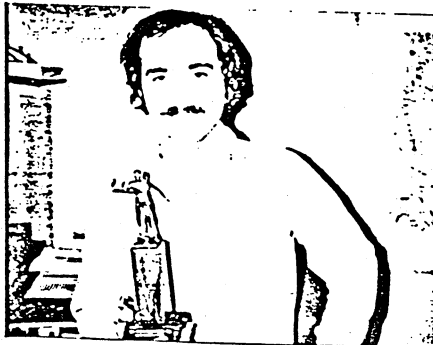

kalorie korner -- from kitchen of Larry Lanning

Larry's Wet Burritos

Brown 1 lb. fresh ground beef till partly done, then add 1 medium onion diced. Continue browning till done.

Add to this mixture:

1 pkg enchilada sauce or taco seasoning mix
1/2 C water

Stir Well.

Add: 1 16 oz. can refried beans and stir in well.

Reduce heat and simmer till needed.

Make wet sauce as follows in blender till smooth:

1 15 oz. can tomato sauce

1/2 - 3/4 C catsup

3-4 tiny hot peppers, added one at a time to taste.

Use small or large flour tortillas that are softened. May warm them in oven or set at room temperature for 30-40 min.

Fill each tortilla with the following:

Meat and bean mixture

1 - 2 Tablespoons chopped fresh or well drained canned tomatoes chopped

1 - 2 Tablespoons shredded lettuce

1 Tablespoon Wet Sauce

Fold tortilla over in half and spread 1 - 2 Tablespoon wet sauce over all evenly.

Mix together 8 oz. shredded natural cheddar cheese and 8 oz. mozzarella cheese with 1 teaspoon chili powder.

Lay each tortilla in oiled 9 x 13 baking dish close together as each are made.

Sprinkle cheese mixture heavy over the tortillas to cover all parts.

Bake at 350° for 15-20 minutes, till cheese is melted.

Serve hot. Makes 6 - 8 large wet burritos. Remainder of wet sauce can be used as a dip with corn chips.

Hillbilly Hot Dog Chili Sauce

3 lbs. hamburger - don't precook

3 large onions chopped

1 large can tomato sauce, 15 or 16 oz.

1 or 2 Tbl garlic powder

1 large can tomato paste 12 oz plus

1 can of water

3 TBL chili powder

Bring to a boil and simmer 2 hours. Add salt to taste. After it is cooked add 3 Tbl sugar

2 1/4 Tbl Louisiana hot sauce

Make a cream style cole slaw.

Put hot dogs on bun, add diced onions, chili sauce, and cole slaw.

Grape/7 Up Drink

Chill grape juice and 7 Up. Mix 1 qt. each or equal parts as needed. Mix together just before serving. Pour over ice and serve.

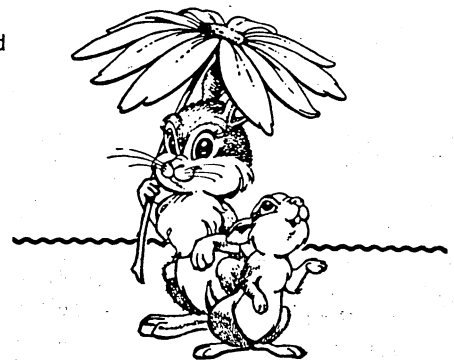

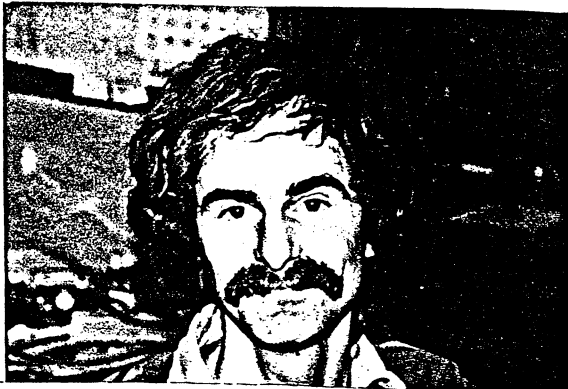

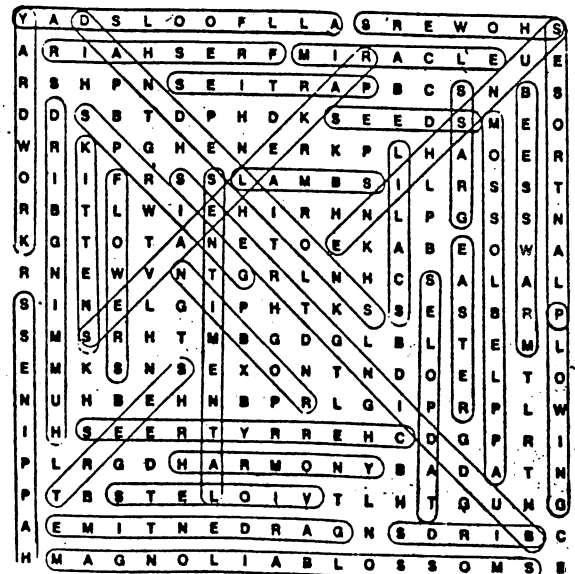
