




What light has to do with winter blues

Many people feel a little blue around this time of the year, but for some people winter really produces dramatic lows. Every fall, as the days get shorter, they sleep more, eat more, and gain weight. They withdraw from family and friends and lose interest in work. Then, as the days lengthen and spring arrives, they bounce back.

Psychiatrists studying people who have Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD), now think they know the reason for the depression: light starvation.

Daylight in winter may be shortened by up to six hours. Many people get up in the dark, come home from work in the dark, and live in artificial lighting that is dim compared to sunlight. Human beings, like animals, respond to

darkness by producing *melatonin*, a hormone that induces sleepiness. In susceptible people decreased light in winter appears to "switch on" the process.

Can increased light switch it off again? At the National Institute of Mental Health Dr. Norman Rosenthal has used light resembling sunlight with promising results. For three hours in the morning and three hours later in the day his SAD patients sit in front of a box containing eight Vita-Lite tubes (full-spectrum fluorescent lights) while they read, write, or sew. Most perk up within days, he reports.

Dr. Rosenthal stresses that depressed people shouldn't treat themselves: they should see a doctor. But people who just feel a little blue might try brightening their homes with extra lights.





SECRETS OF THE SNOW

December 1984

You got snow, I got snow, all God's children got snow...at least all of us in Northern Indiana. Do not ask whether we're going to get snow, or how much. Ask, "What am I going to do with it when it gets here?" If you have no answer for that question by now, you have trouble. Deep trouble.

Effective snow-fighting is an art not understood by many otherwise useful human beings. Research has convinced me that a few simple principles of equipment selection will remove the mystery. I realize that no one has told you this before, so here are the simple Secrets of the Snow. Pay attention to the word simple.

Begin with the simplest snow tool - the shovel. You will find, as I have, that you can watch other people work a snow shovel for a long time without becoming overly tired. If you use it yourself, you will quickly become exhausted. For, through reason, you should think harder about selecting the person who will use the shovel than you do about the shovel itself. However, to cover yourself against the (possible but hopefully unlikely) event that you might be using the shovel yourself, pick a size that meets two important criteria. Get one small enough to be picked up without strain when filled with snow (about 8 X 10 inches), yet large enough to allow you to finish a 20 foot walk in less than 2 hours (about 2 X 3 feet). You choose.

Rock salt will help you fight ice and snow on your sidewalk and driveway. Salt describes the basic character of this stuff, while rock refers to its consistency after you have left a bag sitting in a damp garage for a month and a half. If your sidewalk gets icy, sprinkle rock salt on it about the way you would throw corn to a collection of poultry. The salt will cause the ice layer around it to soften and melt. Then your guests can safely walk on it and track the salt into your house. Later on you can sweep the rest of it off the walk so it can kill your grass. This is known as an ecologically unbalanced system.

To winterize your car you can approach any auto salon and acquire anti-freeze, dry gas, snow tires, a tune-up, and the phone number of five towing services for \$322.98. The really crucial items, however, will cost you \$2.79 each and you'll need a bunch of them. These items are window scrapers, and you'll need a lot because most will be lost during the average winter. An easy winter is a "3-scraper", which means you lost at least 2 per car. A tough winter might be an "8-scraper".

The design of the scraper shows the inventive genius of the human mind at its most treacherous, so choose them carefully. Two kinds of scrapers are long and short. Short scrapers work well cleaning ice from windshields, but do not help much if you need to get two inches of snow off the car. Also they get lost immediately after use. You can find them by moving your seat back and forth and listening for the cracking sound as the scraper breaks up in the seat tracks. Long scrapers have brushes on one side of the handle and a scraper on the other. The scraper blade does not work on ice since it is too far from the handle for the application of any pressure. The brush works fine for snow. Long ones do not get lost as easily as short ones, but after a week when the blade has broken off, you will not be able to decide whether to keep it for the brush, or just throw it under the seat with the other broken pieces.

Your last ditch, let-it-all-hang-out snow status symbol used to be a pair of genuine alligator snow shoes. No more. Today this coveted position has been taken by the snow-thrower. This machine does what you as a child were often punished for doing - it throws snow. A first-class, gilt-edged, leather-bound 80 horsepower snow-thrower with all the options will clear your walk, clear your drive, replant your lawn, and set you back by about enough to secure 50 gallons of your favorite flavor of Haagen-Dazs. It will sling snow from your yard into lower Michigan without strain.

Fortunately, you do not need one of these deluxe items. Just measure the farthest distance from your walk or driveway to your neighbor's yard. That's all the further you want to throw the snow. If your neighbor has a hedge or fence, increase the power a little in order to clear those obstacles.

If you insist on taking winter seriously, that's all there is to it. You need a shovel and some one to use it, a large bag of the finest aged rock salt, a good selection of scrapers (for each car), and a snow-thrower meeting the minimum requirements. With these tools ready to go in your garage you can sink into your chair by the fire when the cruel January winds are tearing out your shrubbery, and wish you were in Phoenix like everyone else.







From the Kitchen of Libby Marshall

CHEESE BALL

12 oz. Phil. Cream Cheese	6 - 8 oz. grated sharp cheddar
4 oz. grated Old English or	1 5 1/2 oz. jar O.E. spread
1 5 1/2 oz. jar Kraft Roka Blue spread	
(1-2 oz. crumbled Bleu Cheese if you like!)	
1 T. Worcestershire sauce	3 dashes Cayenne Pepper
1 tsp. lemon juice	1 T. finely chopped pimento
Dash garlic salt	1 T. grated onion

Softens and mix thoroughly in mixer. Chill. Grease hands and form into ball or log and roll in chopped nuts, chopped fresh parsley, finely chopped chipped beef.

CHERRY-WALNUT BARS

Mix until crumbly:

2 1/4 C. sifted flour	1 C. soft Imperial Marg./butter
1/2 C. sugar	

Press into 13 x 9 x 2" pan.

Bake at 350 degrees, 20 min. 'til lightly browned.

Blend: 2 eggs	1 C. brown sugar, firm. packed
1/2 tsp. salt	1/2 tsp. baking pdr.

1/2 tsp. vanilla

Add: 1, 2 oz. (about 10) jar maraschino cherries, drained	
and chopped. (save juice)	1/2 C. chopped walnuts

Pour on top of baked crust.

Return to oven for about 15 min. until just set.

Cool.

Combine: 1 T. soft. Imperial marg/butter

1 C. Confectioners sugar

Frost. Sprinkle with flaked coconut.(opt.) Cut into bars.

SUGARED NUTS

1 C. firmly packed brown sugar	1/2 C. water
2 Cups pecan or walnut halves	

Combine sugar and water in saucepan. Cook to firm-ball stage (244 F.). Remove from heat. Add nuts. Stir until coating on nuts becomes sugared. Spread on buttered cookie sheet. Cool. Variation: for light sugared nuts, substitute granulated for brown sugar.

HENRY BANES SAUCE

For steaks and roast beef, especially; good on ham, too!

1 C. Heinz's Tomato Catsup	1/2 C. Lea & Perrins
Worcestershire Sauce	Few drops Genuine Tabasco (up to 1/4 bottle, if you like it HOT!)
1/2 C. Major Grey's Chutney	Salt to taste

Put all ingredients in a blender very briefly. If sauce is too hot for you, add catsup or chili sauce before serving. Keeps forever in the refrigerator.
