





Trackbuster

The era of 150 mph trains fast approaches. How else would it approach? Japan has the Bullet, France has the Mistral, and now there are those promoting an equally speedy train in the U.S. Eat your breakfast as you flash through Des Moines, and your lunch as Pittsburgh flickers by. Call it the Trackbuster. If you think it's scary to sit next to a crossing when a fast freight flies past, thundering and screeching and swaying 20 feet away at 60 mph, wait until you experience something that size acting like A.J. Foyt on the straights. The prospect will breathe new life into the pacemaker market.

Of course, a few annoying technical, economic, and philosophical problems want solutions first. Some of these can be solved. The U.S. has always been handy at coming up with enough technology (sometimes just barely enough) to satisfy the wildest whims of our shakers and movers. Such items as electric knives and garden tractors amply illustrate this ability to make any process, no matter how well provided for, more expensive and technically elegant. So the technical details can be handled. As far as the economics go, the cost will fall into a range that only a senator could truly appreciate, but we have never let this stand in the way of any truly fun project. Philosophy remains the only obstacle that might relegate Trackbuster to that big roundhouse in the sky. The question will not come down to "Can we do it?", but "Why would we want to?".

Sooner or later, some innocent from the backwaters of our culture will ask "Why would I want to go 150 miles an hour on the ground? I'm liable to miss something. Worse yet, I might hit something. If I want to go fast, I'll fly. If I want scenery, I'll drive." Once this radical thinking strikes a few more people, Trackbuster will begin to resemble the Concorde without wings: a fast and magnificently inefficient way to go somewhere that must be preserved for reasons of national pride and ego.

At 150 mph, and with only a few stops to mark progress, a person could ride from Los Angeles to Chicago in 15 hours or so. He could also drive it in 3 days or so, or fly the distance in 4 hours. Now if a little polishing of the rails and spiffing up the engines would produce this third travel option, it might sound reasonable for those who can't stand to fly or drive.

The unreasonableness of this assumption appears when the differences between Trackbuster and Amtrak are examined. You've all waited at a grade level crossing while a trainload of coal, hogs, new Pontiacs, and hydroflouric acid ramshackled through, causing the rails and ties both to bob up and down like a sailboat in heavy surf. These are your basic old-time out-of-good-repair train tracks in general use across the land. They do their part to keep derailments on the rise and train speeds on the wane. At Trackbuster's speeds, these same tracks will be travelling themselves around the countryside, sending the trains off on frequent cross country jaunts through neighborhoods not designed for that sort of traffic.

It also happens that occasionally a foolhardy or inebriated or careless soul will cross some of these old tracks at such a time that a train will damage his vehicle and possibly himself. Given the low speed of the average train, and the long distance from which it can be seen, this happens fairly infrequently, although still more often than it should. If we produce trains that go 220 feet per second, they will win a lot more of the races to the crossing. Imagine what Trackbuster would do with a few head of cattle or a semi-load of potatoes. The results would look like MacDonald's at rush hour.

From these few instances we might conclude that Trackbuster will need a complete set of the finest and most carefully maintained continuous rails on the best available track bed, along with lots of shiny new bridges and overpasses. The words "finest", "best", and "lots" in this case represent a great deal of money that presently belongs to us. And if you've ever watched an overpass being built, or a track crew replacing or rebuilding a



Sooner or later this sobering total of time and money will run smack into the thrilling prospect of all that speed. Of course, the argument will be made that Trackbuster will make us more efficient and will save us time, but most of have heard that argument so many times we will know better than to listen. The occasions when additional speed actually benefits humans are extremely limited. Examples run to such things as a bear chasing hikers out of a national park. In almost all other circumstances, going faster is not more efficient, it is merely more exciting.

November, 1984 was the beginning of another musical tour for CROWN amps. Prince will tour for 6 months in the U.S. and Europe. Showco, the touring sound company, used 134 PSA-2 amplifiers and 28 Micro-Tech 1000 amplifiers for a total power exceeding 200,000 watts. 



## Ukrainian Eggs \*

A Pysanky demonstration, the art of making Ukrainian Easter Eggs, will be given by Mr. Gale Balmer on Thursday evening, April 4, from 7:00-9:00 pm at the Midwest Museum. This special Easter event will be an opportunity to view the craftsman at work while discovering the large array of designs and colors he employs. The demonstration is FREE to the public and finished work will be available for purchase.



The Ukrainian "Pysanky" (Pie-sahn-key) eggs are decorated and given as gifts. The bright colors and designs are symbolic and the batik-type process traditional. The design is etched in wax and dye and varnish applied to the eggs which are blown clean with a needle/syringe tool. Gale buys his materials from a Ukrainian gift shop in Minneapolis.

Gale began his art when he read an article in BOYS' LIFE magazine in 1969. At that time he bought a kit through the magazine and has improved his techniques since that time. It takes him about one to three hours to do an egg, depending on the design.

In addition to the annual demonstration at the Midwest Museum of American Art, Gale has appeared on WSJV-TV, and been the subject of articles in the ELKHART TRUTH, SOUTH BEND TRIBUNE, and THE PAPER. Of course he has appeared with his Ukrainian eggs at Crown, also, and many of us have at least one of our own. Gale Balmer can be found in the Quality Assurance Dept. at Crown.

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

# kalorie korner -- from kitchen of Shirley Parker

## Barbecue Sauce for Chicken

6 C Water	2 tsp. pepper
1/4 C salt	3/4 stick oleo or butter
1/2 C brown sugar	1 1/3 C cider vinegar
2 1/2 Tbl Worcestershire Sauce	2 Tbl garlic salt or 2 tsp garlic powder

Boil above ingredients for 15 minutes. Add chicken and simmer 20-30 minutes. Heat chicken on grill until desired brownness. The sauce can be used one additional time. Yields enough sauce for 2 chickens. Tastes like port-a-pit chicken.

## Pretzel Dessert

2 C crushed pretzels	1 8 Oz. pkg cream cheese
1/2 C sugar	1 large box Dream Whip (2 pkgs)
1 1/2 stick butter or oleo melted	1 can peach pie filling

Combine pretzels, sugar and melted butter or oleo. Press in dish.

Whip each pkg of Dream Whip separately with 1 Tbl sugar and 1 tsp. vanilla. Beat cream cheese into one mixture and fold this into the second. Put on top of pretzels and chill. Top with peach pie filling or any kind you prefer.






