flight plan on file

Dear Crown Employees,

I want to thank you for the Extra Special Exit party. The Cake, Ice-Cream, Homemade Pies, Cards, Notes, Gifts, all made me realize how much you really care. "YOU ARE SPECIAL PEOPLE". I would like to leave with you a story which has meant a lot to me. It is entitled, "Listening and Obeying".

Lots of flying stories start: "I'll never forget the time I was at 10,000 ft. and...I"

But really, I won't.

I was at 10,000 ft. on my way to Minneapolis on an instrument flight clearance when... But, let me back up.

Before takeoff on an instrument flight the pilot must have a clearance. That's the pilot's flight plan, approved, put into the computer, and issued by the air Traffic Controller to confirm that everybody in the system knows, and understands just what the pilot plans to do. Once the pilot accepts his clearance he must obey it.

Now back to 10,000 feet on my way to Minneapolis. About 120 miles out the controller gave me an ammended clearance to a different airway for reasons of traffic flow. Ten to fifteen minutes later I made what could have been a fatal error. When I crossed the navigation fix identifying the new route, I totally forgot to change to the new clearance and proceeded blithely up the wrong airway - the one I'd originally requested. For twenty miles or so I followed the wrong track before the Controller (watching my boo-boo on his radar screen) asked my heading, (his genteel way of asking where I was going!) All of a sudden I came to. I was going the wrong way on a one way street! I hadn't obeyed my clearance. It could have been a fatal mistake, but the controller was watching and directed me out of danger.

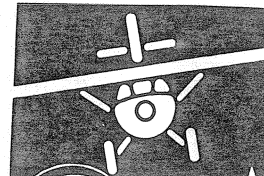
I find my Christian life is a lot like that. The Lord will keep me on course in clear airspace if I Listen and Obey His Instructions.

One of God's earlier fliers affirmed it when he told the whole world: "Lord, you will show me the path of life. You chart the path ahead of me, and tell me where to stop and rest. Every moment you know where I am. You know what I'm going to say before I say it. You both precede and follow me, and place your hand of blessing on my head. This is too glorious, too wonderful to believe." (Psalm 139:3-6 LB)

I'm in the Psalmists Camp. Years ago when I filed my flight plan with the Master Controller, He gave me a clearance to my requested destination with the route spelled out and a map and all the navigation fixes I would need. That was God's promise when He cleared me for takeoff!

But once in the air, I have the responsibility to fly right. If I reject His plan for my life and His control, I'll be nothing more than an accident headed for a place to happen. He will vector me around the Thunderstorms, and make sure I miss the Mountains and bring me out on course and right side up as long as I'm willing to follow His instructions. The consequences of anything less are too terrible to contemplate.

May the Lord Bless each of you as you file your flight plan with the Master Controller. If perhaps you haven't taken time to file a flight plan with the Lord I would encourage you to do so. I have Never regretted doing so, and now I'm cleared for takeoff - under His Control.

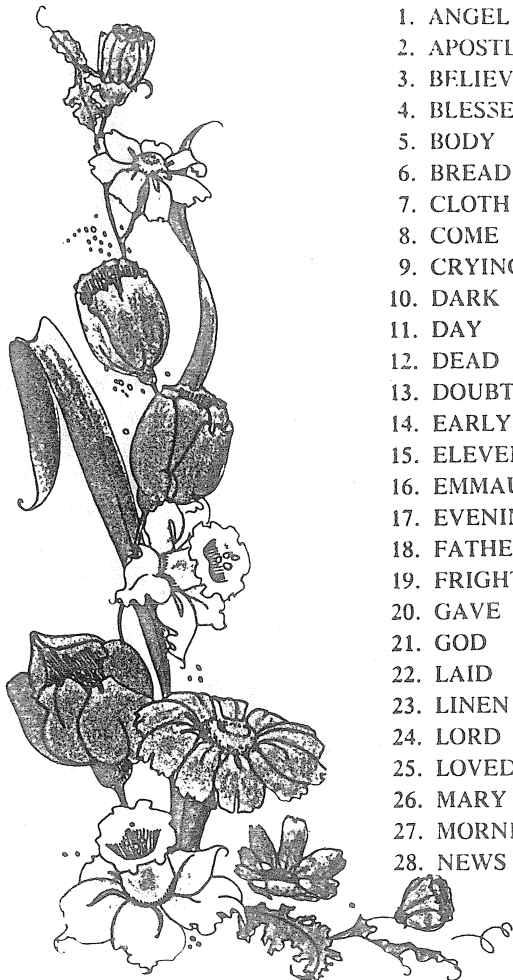
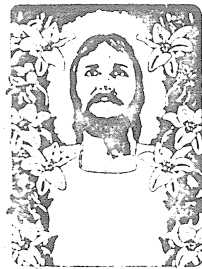
Easter

Located in the Service Entrance Lobby at the East front corner of the building, they will be in business these hours and days:

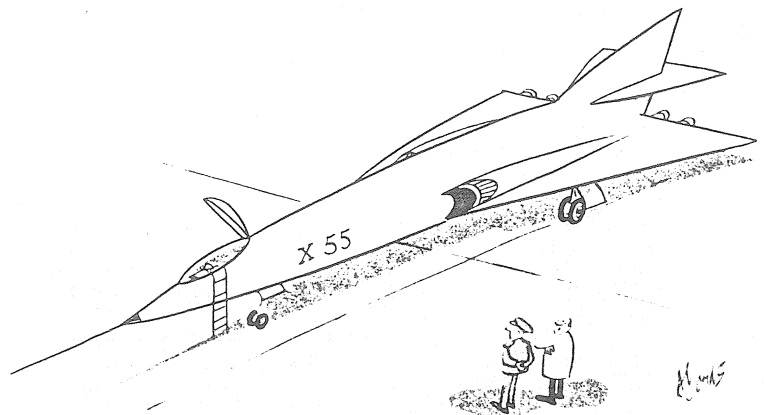

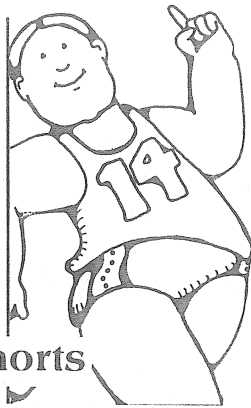

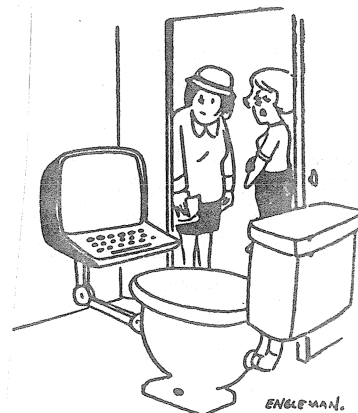

THE MAYO CLINIC HEALTH LETTER is a new monthly publication with "Reliable Information for a Healthier Life". The CRIER office has received two issues to date, which are available for borrowing. We will list the subjects covered in each issue. At this point there is a great variety of topics, some common and some rare. However, they are all illustrated and written for the lay reader in clear and concise language.

A typical article is this one from the March issue about a new treatment for hay fever. "If you suffer from hay fever, here is good news" discusses a new drug called terfenadine (the trade name is Seldane). For adolescents and adults only, this drug clears the itchy, runny nose symptoms of hay fever as well as older medications, with less drowsiness. It is expensive - one month's supply (60 mg twice daily) will cost from \$29 to \$35 in most pharmacies. In contrast, a month's supply of one standard, older antihistamine (chlorpheniramine, 4 mg three times daily) costs from \$2 to \$3 when dispensed as a generic preparation.

Astemizole another new antihistamine, is not yet available for treatment of hay fever in America, but soon may be.

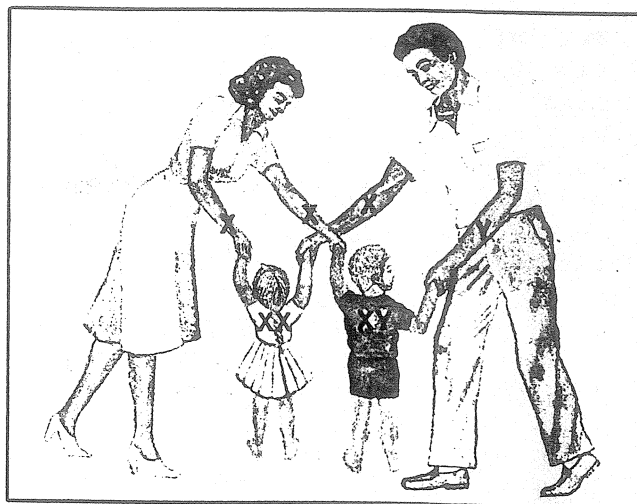
Neither medication is approved for children in the U.S. and should not be used during pregnancy or by women who are breast-feeding infants.

The combination of chromosomes decides the sex of a child. The mother's egg carries only an X chromosome, but each of the father's sperm carries either an X or a Y chromosome. When the father's X fertilizes the mother's X, a girl results. When the father's Y fertilizes the mother's X, a son is produced. Technology now makes it possible to separate X- and Y-containing sperm and develop a concentrate of each. Couples who want a child of one sex or the other can have the concentrate artificially inseminated into the woman's uterus. Nature's odds for a child of either sex are about 50:50. This method increases the chance to roughly 75 percent.

CORN SPOON BREAD

- 1 (1b.) can creamed corn
- 4 eggs, slightly beaten
- 1 C. melted butter or oleo
- 2 pkg. Jiffy corn meal muffin mix
- 1 can whole kernel corn, drained
- 1 pt. sour cream or IMO
- 1-2 small cans chopped green chillies,
depending on how hot you want it!

Put all ingredients in large bowl and mix very well. Grease 9 X 13" pan. Bake at 350° for 45 minutes to an hour or when knife inserted in center comes out clean. You may also bake in large 3-4 qt. casserole, but baking takes much longer. Delicious when used in place of potatoes. Serves 8.

CHILI RELLENOS

- 1 C. chopped green chilies
- 1 lb. Monterey cheese
- 1 lb. Cheddar cheese
- 4 egg whites, beaten stiff
- 4 egg yolks
- 1 Tbsp. flour
- 2/3 can milk
- salt and pepper

Put grated cheeses in baking dish. Mix all other ingredients and pour over cheeses. Bake 1 hour at 350°. Serves 6.

REFRIED BEANS

- 4 C. water
- 1 lb. dried pinto beans
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1/2 C. margarine
- 1 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 C. shredded cheddar cheese

Mix water, beans and onion in sauce pan. Cover and heat to boiling; boil 2 minutes. Remove from heat; let stand 1 hour. Add just enough water to beans to cover. Heat to boiling; reduce heat. Cover and boil gently, stirring occasionally, until beans are very tender, about 1 1/2 hours. (Add water during cooking, if necessary.) Mash beans. Stir in margarine and salt until margarine is absorbed. Stir in cheese.

REUBEN SANDWICH FILLING

- 1 - 12 oz. can corned beef, chopped
- 8 oz. shredded swiss cheese
- 1 16 oz. can sauerkraut, drained
- 3/4 C. mayonnaise or salad dressing
- 3 Tbsp. chile sauce or taco sauce
- Rye bread and butter
- Combined corn beef, cheese, sauerkraut, dressing and sauce. Cover and store in refrigerator.

To serve, spread filling between bread slices. Butter outside of bread and grill.

APPLE DANISH

- 3 C. flour
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 C. vegetable shortening
- 1/2 C. milk
- 1 egg yolk, beaten

Mix flour and salt; cut in shortening. Combine milk and egg yolk; add to flour mixture. Roll out half the mixture on floured surface to fit 11 X 16 X 1/2" jelly roll pan; place in pan.

FILLING:

- 6 C. peeled sliced apples
- 1 1/2 C. sugar
- 2 Tbsp. flour
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/4 C. butter or margarine
- 1 egg white, slightly beaten

Arrange apples on crust. Combine sugar, flour and cinnamon; sprinkle over apples. Dot with butter. roll out remaining pastry; place over cinnamon mixture. Brush pastry with egg white. Bake at 375° for 45 minutes.

GLAZE:

- 1 1/2 C. conf. sugar
- 1/8 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 2-3 Tbsp. milk

Mix all ingredients; spread on warm Apple Danish.

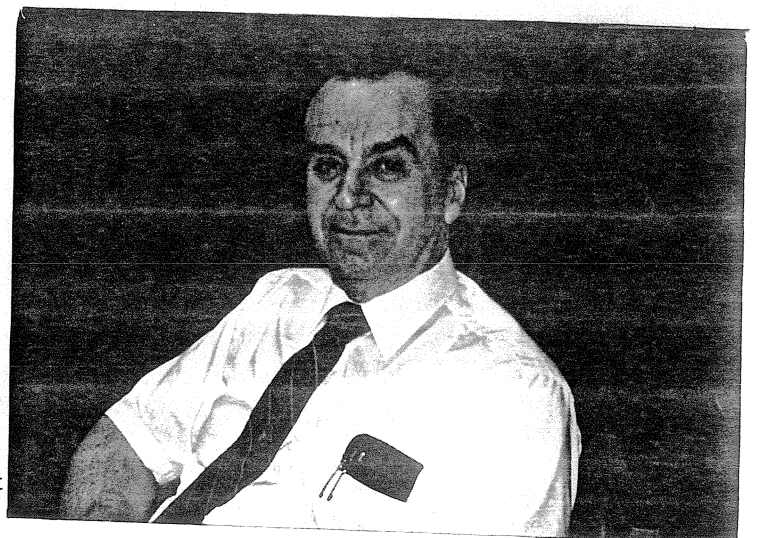

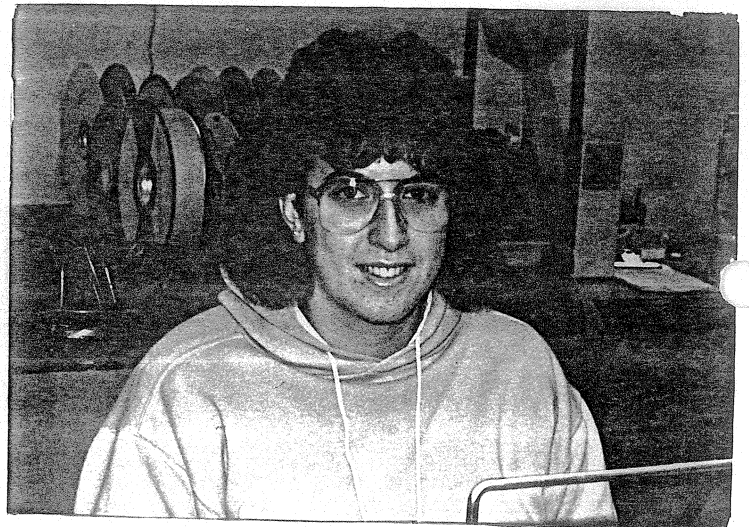

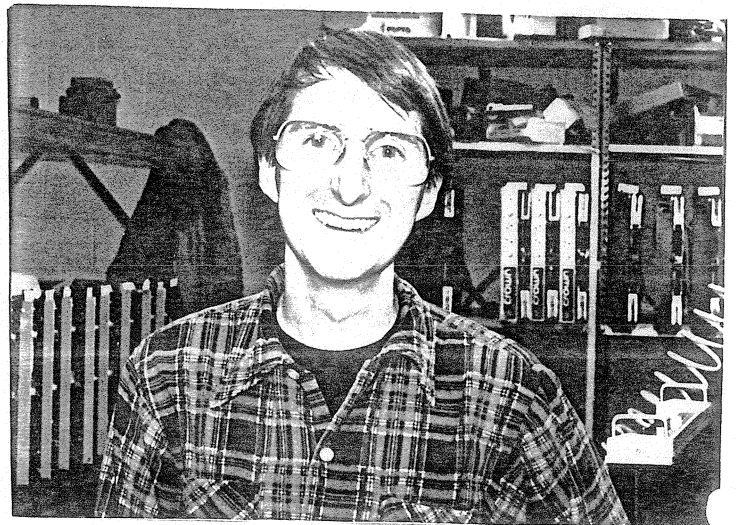
