BBS now on-line

A new service is now available for Crown employees. The Crown Link Electronic Bulletin System is now available. Just as a regular Bulletin Board is a convenient method to share information, the Crown Link exists for the same purpose. With 400+ employees, numerous reps, dealers, vendors, customers, etc. communication is always a difficult task. The Crown Link BBS will help with some of this communication.

Presently the Bulletin Board has "conferences" for Crown employees, Crown Reps, Crown products, Sysgen users, a Technical Conference, a "For Sale" Conference, and Electronic Message Conference and a conference for MacIntosh users. Each conference has information specific to that area of interest.

For example, the Crown Employee Conference has messages congratulating people on the birth of children, Employee Committee election results, the last few CROWN CRIERS, Employee Computer Purchase Policy, etc. This conference is accessible to Crown Employees only.

In the main section of the BBS there are many good "Public Domain" (or "shareware") programs that are available to download. Many files involve learning about computers. Other files available are such things as communication programs, a tax estimator, loan calculator, picture of the Statue of Liberty, Spanish tutorial, the entire Bible, games and humor. There are approximately 200 files presently and more being added on a regular basis. Most files are for IBM compatible personal computers.

The most recent addition to the BBS is a conference for Apple MacIntosh users. Files for MAC users are being added to this conference.

Feel free to access the BBS. All you need is access to a personal computer (or terminal) a modem and a telephone line. One advantage to an Electronic Bulletin Board is that it is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The number to call is 875-8430.

The future direction of the BBS will be determined by input from the users. If you have a thought about how the BBS can better serve Crown employees and associates, leave the comment on the BBS or see me.

GOLDEN FRUITCAKE

1 1/2 C. butter	3 1/2 C. flour
2 C. sugar	1/2 tsp. salt
6 eggs, separated	2 C. golden raisins
1 C. milk	1/2 tsp. cream of tartar
1 C. chopped, dried apricots	
1 tsp. Brandy extract	
1/2 C. chopped, candied orange peel	
1 tsp. vanilla	
1 C. coarsely chopped walnuts	

BEAT butter until light and creamy. Gradually add sugar, beating until smooth. Beat egg yolks together lightly and add. Combine milk, brandy, and vanilla. Mix flour and salt together. Alternately add milk mix and flour mix to butter mix. Fold in fruit and nuts. Beat egg whites with cream of tartar until stiff but not dry. Fold in fruit and nuts. Beat egg whites with cream of tartar until stiff but not dry. Fold whites into batter gently but thoroughly. Pour mixture into 2 buttered and floured 6 C. molds or pans. Bake at 275° for 2 1/2 hrs. or until tests done. Cool. Unmold.

TOFFEE SQUARES

1 C. butter or margarine	2 C. flour
1 C. packed brown sugar	1/4 tsp. salt
1 egg yolk	3-4 milk chocolate bars
1 tsp. vanilla	1/2 C. chopped nuts

HEAT oven to 350°. Mix butter, sugar, egg yolk and vanilla. Stir in flour and salt until dough is well blended. Spread in a 13 X 9 pan and bake 25-30 minutes. Crust will be soft. Remove from oven. Immediately place separated squares of chocolate on top. Let stand until soft; spread evenly over entire surface. Sprinkle with nuts. Cut in

small squares while warm.

SEE'S FUDGE

PUT IN BOWL:

1 1/2 c. chocolate chips
1 tsp. vanilla

1/2 C. butter

1 C. walnuts, chopped (opt.)

MELT IN TOP OF DOUBLE BOILER:

1 Tbsp. water

10 marshmallows

BRING TO BOIL and boil slowly for 8 minutes:

2 C. sugar

1/2 C. evaporated milk

ADD this to melted marshmallows; then add chocolate chip mixture. Beat to desired consistency; pour into a buttered pan. Cut in squares.
