HCJB fellowship dinner

HCJB hosted an evening of fellowship Friday, Nov. 6, at Nelson's Golden Glow in Wakarusa. Over two hundred Elkhart area residents came to share dinner and learn what God is doing through HCJB in presenting the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the world.

According to DAVE PASECHNIK, Technical Director of the current transmitter project here at Crown, it was exciting to see so many friends of HCJB and to see the excitement and interest in the work of HCJB and World Radio Missionary Fellowship of which HCJB is a part.

HCJB President Ron Cline explained their goal. By the year 2000, they plan to have the capability to reach the entire world with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Anyone, anywhere in the world will be able to turn on their radio and hear the message of salvation and make a personal commitment to serve Christ.

Barb Cline, Ron's wife, interviewed Dave Pasechnik, bringing out the story of his 16 year commitment to missions. Dave is of Ukrainian descent and grew up in Canada. He was a part of the crew which built the first 500,000W transmitter for HCJB at Crown.

The current transmitter project is playing a very important role in HCJB's goal. Transmitters such as these will help spread the Gospel throughout the world. The present 500,000W transmitter in Quito has effective radiated power (ERP) of 100,000,000 watts with the antenna.

mighty team.

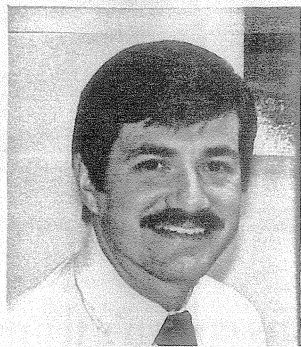

HAUN, Stockroom, on her new daughter.



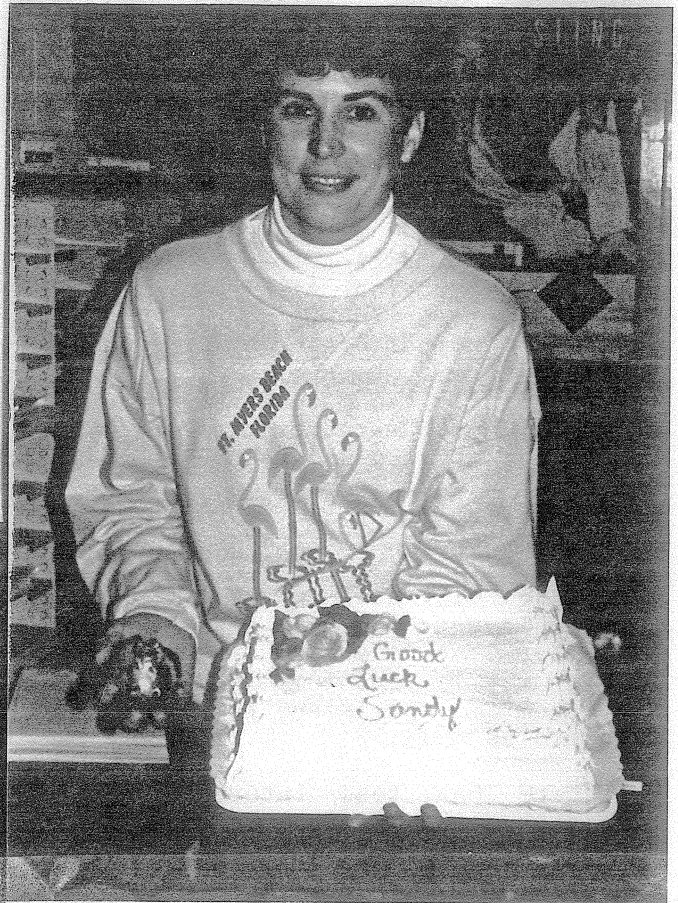
"GOD'S GRACE IS MORE THAN SUFFICIENT."

building going up!

It's all business in the new addition at the north end of Plant 2 of Crown. The 31,500 sq. foot addition is going up very fast according to **DON FLOREA**, Quality Assurance/Maintenance Manager, who is in charge of the expansion program. The shell is up except for one end and the roof is on. Plumbing and electricity are installed under the floor level; the floor will be poured beginning this week with completion in about two weeks. Then the end wall will be built and it will be a building.

Lighting, flooring and office set-up are being investigated. Don predicts the plant move can start January 1, 1988, with the office move following by about a month.

The electrical capability of 208 volts, 3 phase, at 3,000 amps, will be one of the largest input power usages in the city. The product testing room (Heatrun) will be capable of running at least 50 of the largest amplifiers at one time with a power draw of approximately 1,000 amps, 208V, 3 phase. The Heatrun Room will be vented in such a way that most of the building's heating will be generated from there.

This new addition to Crown will house all of Production Assembly, including the assembly lines, module building, wire cut and cable assembly, microphone testing area, and Heatrun. Production Engineering, HCJB manufacturing and offices, and Manufacturing offices will be housed there also, as well as a break area for Production.

Recreation and fitness have been considered. Each restroom in the new building will have two showers for use of employees who may desire to jog, bicycle, etc. during lunch breaks. These may be used for emergencies such as chemical spills and for Maintenance workers as well.

There has been interest shown in finishing the natural track around the buildings for joggers and walkers and a picnic area is being considered for those who enjoy outside eating.

Projected costs for the new building and renovation of the existing plant are approximately \$1,100,000.

POPCORN AND FRUIT CONFECTION THANKSGIVING CENTER PIECE

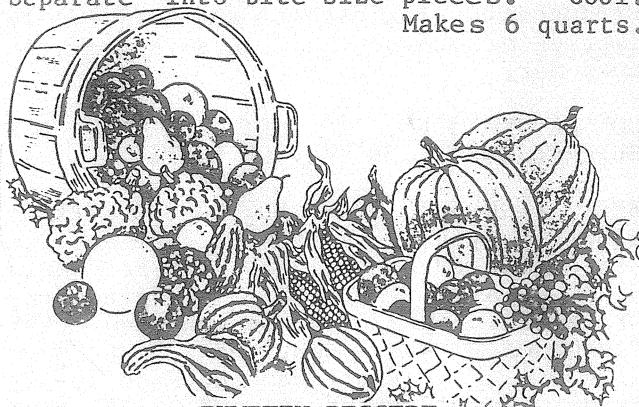
Popcorn will be cascading from a horn of plenty.

Combine 4 quarts of unsalted popped popcorn and 2 cups whole salted cashews in large buttered bowl--mix. Measure 2 cups chocolate covered or plain raisins.

Combine in saucepan:

3 cups sugar 2 cups light corn syrup
1/2 C. water 1/2 C. butter or margarine
1 1/2 tsp. salt

Heat to boiling, stirring until sugar melts. Cook to hard-crack stage, about 290-295°. Pour syrup in fine stream over popcorn and nuts. Stir carefully until corn kernels are evenly coated with syrup. Sprinkle raisins over mixture--stir and spread on large buttered surface or waxed paper. Separate into bite size pieces. Cool.
Makes 6 quarts.



PUMPKIN DESSERT

24 Graham crackers, crushed
1/3 C. sugar 1/2 C. milk
1/2 C. butter 1/2 tsp. salt
2 eggs, beaten 1 T. cinnamon
3/4 C. sugar

1 envelope plain gelatin
8 oz. cream cheese
1/4 C. cold water 2 C. pumpkin
3 egg whites 3 egg yolks
1/4 C. sugar 1/2 C. sugar
1/2 pt. whipping cream

Mix graham crackers, 1/3 C. sugar and butter and press into 9 X 13" pan. Mix beaten eggs, 3/4 C. sugar and cream cheese and pour over graham cracker crust. Bake 20 minutes at 350°. Cook pumpkin, egg yolks, 1/2 C. sugar, milk, salt, and cinnamon until mixture thickens. Remove from heat and add gelatin, dissolved in cold water. Cool. Beat egg whites, 1/4 C. sugar and fold in pumpkin mixture. Pour over baked crust. Top with whipped cream.
