



### AN ELEPHANT OF LUCK

I remember once in particular watching someone pull off a feat of unbelievable good fortune. It was something that should not have worked once in half a million attempts, but this time it did.

When everything was over but the explanations, the person in charge of being lucky modestly suggested that there had been "an element of luck" in his successfully brazen flight in the face of probability.

"Element" has such an unassuming, inconspicuous sound to it. An element is a part, and often, we would guess, a small part of whatever it connects to. The problem is that when element refers to luck, it often becomes wildly inaccurate.

"Yes," admits the player who just discarded a three, a six, and an eight, and received three aces in return, "...there was an element of luck in that hand."

"Of course," says the politician who pulled off a narrow, last minute victory at the polls when it became general knowledge on election eve that his heavily favored opponent had once financed a pleasure tour of the planet by embezzling a dozen widows' life savings, "an element of luck went into this victory."

We need new terminology in these cases in order to limit further abuse of our language and our common sense. We need to begin acknowledging "An elephant of luck" - a large, powerful, inexorable outpouring of good fortune that pries success out of the jaws of reality. "An elephant" will much better describe the last-minute, length-of-the-court, spinning shot that hits the rim, bounces twice, and drops through the net to win the game. Or the 68 foot putt through a puddle, over a squirrel's tail, and around a small boulder into the cup. Or the discovery by a wife that the husband who has run off with another woman accidentally left his plane ticket, their life savings, and his American Express Gold Card on the kitchen counter next to his goodby note.

These and thousands of other incidents do not benefit from an "element" of luck anymore than going over Niagara Falls on an innertube would have an "element" of danger. These are elephants - huge, galloping herds - of luck.

Good fortune, inasmuch as we can predict it, is a random influence on the human race that we suppose always benefits someone else. When it strikes us personally, we do not like to identify it as luck, preferring instead to focus on our superior skills or character traits as reasons for the benefits. Using our new terminology will help us to avoid these little pitfalls of immodesty.

The next time the transmission of your old car falls out on the road on top of a Brinks bag full of cash, or you hit the lottery by purchasing one of 18 million available tickets, admit it: you have encountered an elephant.
