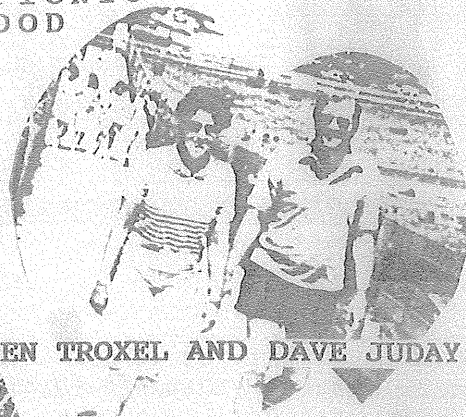

## notary public services

As a benefit to employees Crown provides Notary Public Services free of charge. PATTI SMITH, Purchasing Manager, and LIBBY MARSHALL, Secretary to the V.P./Manufacturing, are both notaries for the State of Indiana.

The purpose of notarizing documents is to prevent fraud. The notary is responsible for making sure the person signing a document understands the document he is signing and is who he says he is.

Before you bring a document to be notarized:

1. Be sure you understand it.
2. All blanks should be filled in with correct information; there should be no blank spaces.
3. Be aware you must sign in the presence of the notary, so the notary knows it is, in fact, your signature.
4. Be aware that if two or more signatures are required, all parties must sign in the presence of the notary.

A Notary may:

- Acknowledge oaths
- Take Affidavits
- Take acknowledgements of deeds, conveyances, powers of attorney and other instruments of writing.
- Take and certify depositions and affidavits.
- Take and perpetuate testimony of witnesses.
- Protest foreign bills of exchange or to draw any marine protest.

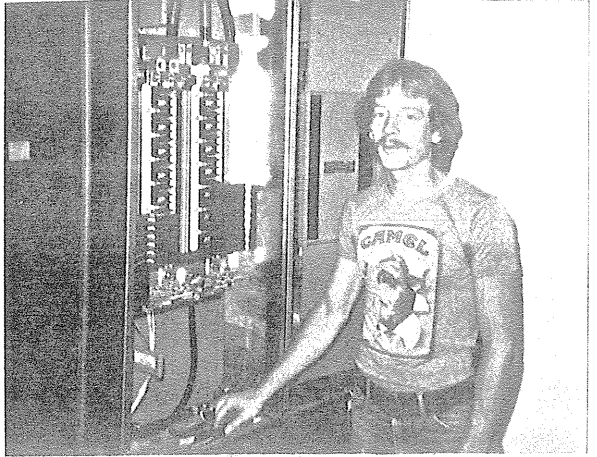

## kalorie korner

### ZUCCHINI PATTIES

1 or 2 medium zucchini (grated)  
1 egg, beaten 1 carrot (grated)  
1/2 C. Colby cheese, grated  
1 small onion, grated  
Chopped green pepper (amount to taste)  
1/4 to 1/2 C. flour  
Salt and pepper to taste  
1 1/2 C. Cornflakes crumbs  
Mix all ingredients except Cornflakes.  
Shape into patties and roll in flour  
(1/4 C) and Cornflakes crumbs. Fry in  
hot oil in skillet until brown.

### ZUCCHINI PIE

#### CRUST MIX:

Mix together 4 C. flour, 2 C. sugar, 1  
1/2 C. margarine, 1 tsp. cinnamon.  
Pat 1/2 mix into 9X13 pan and bake at  
375° 10 minutes.

#### FILLING:

Peel and seed 8 C. zucchini and cook  
with 2/3 C. lemon juice until tender.  
Add 1 C. sugar, 1 tsp. cinnamon or 1/4  
tsp. nutmeg, and 3/4 C. crust mix.  
Mix and cook until thick.  
Pour over baked crust and sprinkle with  
rest of crust mix and cinnamon (opt.).  
Bake for 30 min. at 375°
