### VEGETABLE PIZZA

2 pkg. Crescent Rolls - Spread out rolls to form a crust on a pizza pan or cookie sheet. Prick and bake at 350° for 10 minutes.

Mix: 2 - 8 oz. pkg. Cream Cheese

- 1 pkg. Hidden Valley Original Ranch Dressing mix

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## we need dads

"Peace is when my daddy's home," went one line in the children's record "The Music Machine".

I'm a dad, and I like that line.

But sometimes being a dad wears me out. The kids, the bills, the balancing of work and family demands, and the sheer exertion of always trying to have a game plan ready for the whole crew. It's tough.

Then I think of the absolute joy those children have brought into my life, and I'm glad to be a dad. I'm also super proud, and very grateful to God, now that those children are in their leaving-home-years, to see their accomplishments. They are good solid young people. It's been worth it!

The quiver will before long be empty, as the Lord's warrior hands shoot three arrows into battle. I'll bow my father-head and say, "You're right, Lord. I am blessedly happy!"

Too many fathers don't feel at all blessed. They're bored, or overstressed, or feel ridiculous in today's father-antagonistic world.

I just looked at a modern book on rearing children. Fathers don't get mention in a single chapter title, and they are referred to in only two subtitles, out of 117 subtitles. Mothers, schools, television, the state, and child care centers get more space in this book than do fathers.

We dads catch the message. If we'll just fork over the money and stay out of the way, everything will be OK.

The truth is: everything will not be OK.

A recent study indicated these negative long-term effects on the children of absentee fathers: higher delinquency rates, inability to adjust to new situations, lower rate of conscience and morality development (they object to rules, avoid blame and are more aggressive), less affectionate, more willing to join gangs, and they display sexual disorientation.

I would say a dad--a kind, loving, law abiding, think ahead dad--is crucial. If you aren't convinced, just ask a few single mothers if they'd like that kind of dad to share their family.

However, even in two parent homes, the average time father and child spend alone together during the week is 7 1/2 minutes.

It used to be, and still is in a few cases, that children could watch their fathers at work, and even help them--on

the farm, or in the small shop or store he owned. Those kids felt pride in what dad did. They knew him and his work.

Times have changed.



Dads, we've got to stay close to the family. For their sake. And for our sake. I've seen too many young and not-so-young men who left home and family to sow their wild oats. In later years all they had were husks from those wild oats.

The Bible teaches that we need dads. Ladies, don't be offended, but there are 1,384 references to "father" in the Bible, and 324 references to "mother." Our society has reversed that, and now psychologists and the press talk more about mothers than about fathers. Could that possibly be a clue to family ills today, and women's ills today? (If you are a 25 year old woman, you now have a 30 percent chance of ending up an impoverished single mother.)

We need to glorify responsible fatherhood. We should celebrate good fathers in our homes, in our churches, in our schools. Pray for them. Praise them. Hold them up as examples. Throw parties in their honor. Organize retreats to teach and encourage them to do an even better job. Make them realize it's worthwhile!

Paul taught that all filialness, all fatherhood in heaven and on earth, comes from God the Father. When society, or the television, or the kids or a wife ridicule dad, they're unconsciously striking at more than him. Dad may not be perfect--most fathers know that all to well--but he is meant to be the symbol of loving, protective authority.

Our children and mothers and churches and schools and nation need good dads.

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"I'M SORRY," the young boy said to his friend, "I can't come out to play right now. I've got to stay in and help my Dad with my homework."
