

The National Sound and Communications Association presented the 1991 TOMMY Award for Innovative Product of the Year to Dr. Clay Barclay for his work in developing the IQ System® 2000. Given to Dr. Barclay during the May NSCA Convention in Cincinnati, Ohio, the award is one of a hand-

ful of TOMMY Awards bestowed upon individual members of NSCA each year.

The TOMMY Award takes its name from Thomas Edison in recognition of the many contributions the inventor made to the audio industry. According to board member Barry Glick, Barclay was

chosen as a TOMMY recipient because of the ingenuity he displayed in designing Crown's IQ System 2000. "The IQ System 2000 is the first device of its type to offer complete computer control and monitoring of multiple amplifiers in a sound system," he said. "As a concept, it has made a significant impact within our industry."



Scott Robbins is Mitch Sheckler's brother-in-law. Their families enjoy camping together, especially at Mary's Lake in Estes Park, Colorado.



A high percentage of success in life results from just paying attention. Although it is all too easy to get lost in the details of a situation, it is also true that noticing the details can help us see ways to make things work better.

In Jackie Gibson's case, she saw phones being sent out for repair work that she believed should be under warranty. Some further investigation resulted in an estimate of six phones per year being repaired this way, because there was no way to tell which phones were still under warranty and which were not. At an average cost of

\$150 for each repair, the PONC came to \$900 annually.

The fix was quickly determined. Receiving began attaching a label to each incoming phone that listed the purchase order number, the date received, and the name of the supplier. If any problems occurred later on, the label made it easier to check the warranty status.

In this situation, the short-term fix also served as the permanent corrective action. Thanks to Jackie for her work. Keep on doing it right!


No, this isn't an ad for DAK. We're talking about the new PZM-11 security and surveillance microphone.

The microphone reduces pickup of air-conditioning rumble and provides a clear, articulate sound.




Bennett House



Chili Cook-Off Recipes

Special Olympics Benefits

The chili cook-off proceeds of nearly \$200 were presented to Edna Schrock of Horizon Learning Center and two Special Olympians at a morning assembly in June.

Pop can recycling proceeds amounted to \$1100. **Sandy Ramsey** proudly presented both checks to Mrs. Schrock on behalf of the Employee Committee.

Hungry lunch eaters sampled the chili of nine in-house cooks. They paid \$2.50 each for samples and voted for the chili of their choice by returning the sample cup and requesting a bowlful. **Terry Frick's** chili received the most votes with **Laveta Randall's** a close second. Here are their recipes:

From Laveta:

Cook until browned:

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 1/4 cups minced onion

Add and cook 10 minutes:

- 1 1/3 C. condensed tomato soup (11 oz can)
- 2 1/2 C. cooked kidney beans (#2 can), optional

Make into a paste and blend into soup:

- 1 1/2 to 2 Tbsp. chili powder
- 1 Tbsp. flour
- 3 Tbsp. water
- 1 tsp. salt

Dilute to taste with V-8 juice.

Cook over low heat, stirring frequently for 45 minutes.

From Terry:

- 3 lbs. lean ground beef
- 3 medium size onions
- 46 oz. can V-8 juice
- 30 oz. can of dark red kidney beans
- 1/3 cup brown sugar
- 2 Tbsp. Chili powder
- 2 tsp. salt
- 2 tsp pepper

Brown ground beef in pan along with the diced onions. Drain grease on paper towel or in a strainer. While beef is draining, combine the rest of the ingredients in the pan and begin to simmer. Be sure that the beans are drained and rinsed before adding. Add the cooked beef and continue to simmer over a low heat for 1 to 2 hours. You may want to increase or reduce the chili powder, salt, and pepper to suit your taste.
